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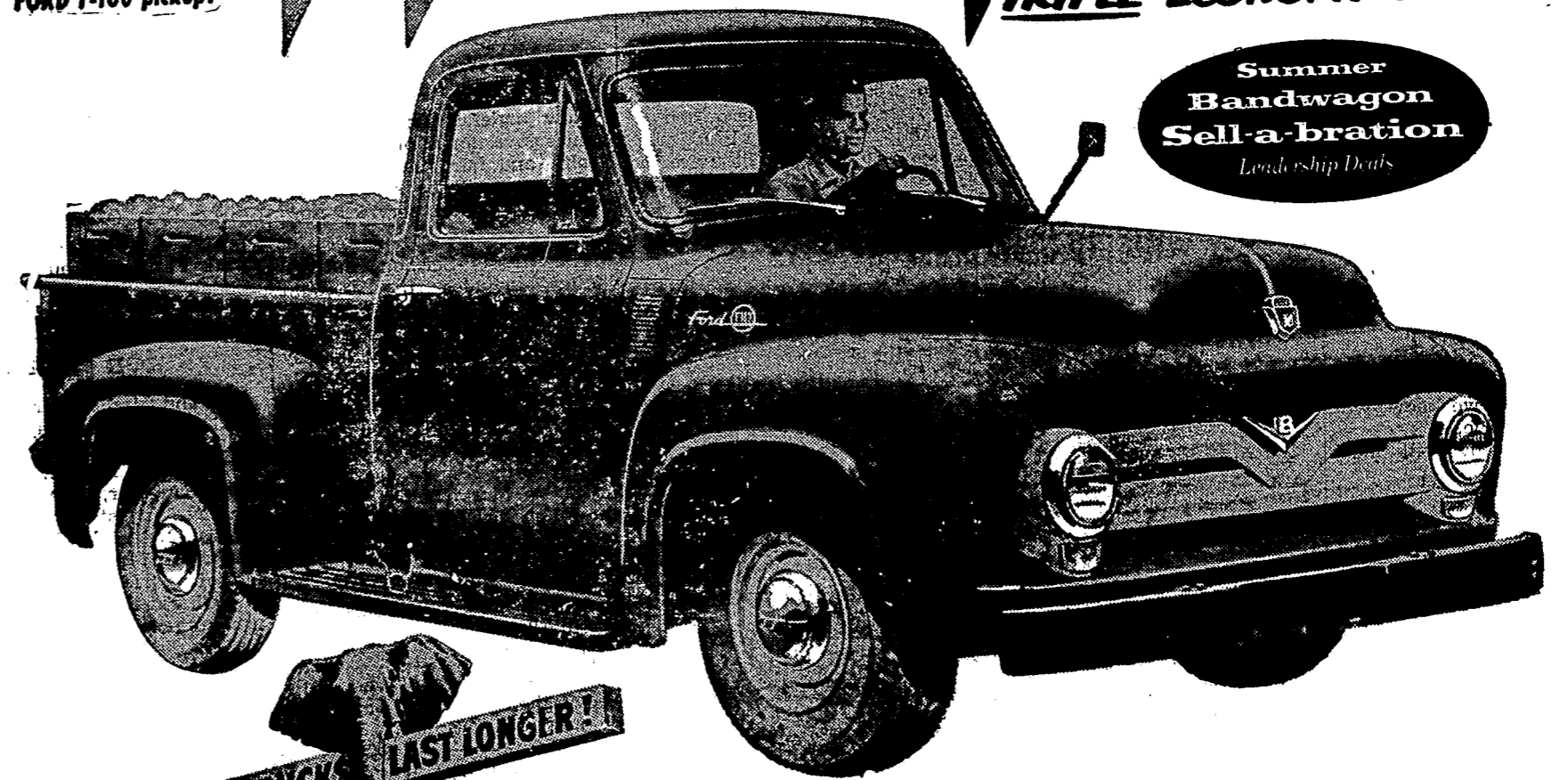


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**REPORT ON RAGWEED HAY FEVER**

A good breeze can blow no good—for ragweed hay fever victims, that is.

The Michigan Department of Health today said that by mid-August, when the ragweed pollen count reaches 100 grains per cubic yard of air per day, there

are literally tons of pollen in the air, and even if a region is ragweed free, the pollen may be blown in by prevailing winds. State health officials, getting the seasonal high of inquiries about Michigan's "hay fever relief" areas, once again reviewed findings of a ten-year ragweed pollen survey in Michigan.

On the bright side, the northern third of the southern peninsula and most of the northern peninsula were found sufficient free from ragweed to be comfortable for the average hay fever sufferer.

And while you may be allergic to house dust, silk, glue, certain animals, roses or even to air molds, nine out of ten times, hay fever in Michigan is caused by ragweed pollen.

The health department is glad to try to help hay fever victims, but authorities said that inquiries about job opportunities or good hotels in hay fever regions "are not quite in our line".

Because in many cases it's at least possible to ease the discomfort of hay fever, the health department urged victims of the allergy to consult their doctors.

**FROSTY MELON**

1 package Raspberry gelatin

1 cup hot water  
 3/4 cup fruit juice and water  
 1 medium cantaloupe or honeydew melon  
 1 cup blueberries (fresh, canned or frozen)  
 1 three ounce package cream cheese  
 1 tablespoon milk  
 (Other fruits can be used in

place of blueberries, along with other flavors of gelatin.)

1. Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add fruit juice and water to make 3/4 cup. Chill until slightly thickened.

2. Peel melon, leaving it whole. Cut a slice from one end, scoop out the seeds and drain well.

Place melon upright in a bowl.

3. Fold fruit into slightly thickened gelatin and fill melon cavity. Replace cut slice, fastening it with a toothpick. Chill.

4. Before serving melon, com-

bine cream cheese with milk. Beat until smooth and fluffy.

5. Cut a thin slice from the under side of melon to make a firm base and place on plate. Spread cream cheese over entire surface. To serve cut in slices.

**For Better Fruit**

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**FOOD SCOOP**

Now is the time for home grown vegetables.

The second picking of Michigan tomatoes will begin this week and supplies are expected to improve in quality. As long as there are heavy supplies, prices are expected to be low. New Michigan potatoes are in abundant supply at lower prices than potatoes shipped from other states. Shoppers are reminded that the first immature potatoes need careful storage to keep properly. Quality of Michigan sweet corn was helped by recent rains, so quality remains good while prices are still low. Shoppers will find a few cents difference in favor of locally grown celery. There is plenty of squash at reasonable prices of 7 1/2 to 15 cents a pound.

Michigan cantaloupe, much improved by rain, will be at their peak in supply and flavor this week. Heavy coarse netting, a yellow color, and fragrant odor are hints to better selection. Hale Haven and Golden Jubilee peaches, two of the best varieties for freezing and canning, are being harvested now. Shoppers waiting for late varieties will find very few this year. Watermelon is still big news with Indiana furnishing most of the melons in this area. Weighing 24 to 34 pounds they will be priced as low as 60 to 70 cents in some stores. All small fruits with the exception of cherries are available at reasonable prices.

Shoppers wishing to economize will check pork cuts for savings in the meat department. With the prices about 20% lower than a year ago, wise shoppers will compare pork loin, Boston butt, and picnic shoulders with other kinds of meat. To save on the beef budget, chuck roasts, hamburger and short ribs are real money savers. The veal markets remain steady, however shoppers will find the leg or shoulder roast good buys for the money. Well finished lamb is available at reasonable prices. Shoulder chops are very economical compared to many other lamb cuts.

Fryers are a favorite choice for summer. Hot weather has caused a short supply of small birds. Prices remain about the same as last week. Hot weather has also cut the supply of fresh water fish, however there are plenty of frozen fish at reasonable prices.

Production of large and medium-sized eggs is declining and prices of large eggs have advanced

**CONTESTS OVER; PICK WINNERS FOR 4-H SHOW**

For more than 2,000 Michigan 4-H'ers the next two weeks will

be chock full of putting the finishing touches on projects, demonstrations and exhibits for the 40th annual State 4-H Show. These boys and girls will work hard at it because they'll be com-

peting for money and award trips. These 4-H'ers selected to represent Michigan's 60,000 4-H Club members, were chosen at the final training and elimination meetings held in various districts in Michigan during the past month. The judging school eliminations applied to members judging dairy, livestock, poultry, crops, vegetable garden, home improvement, food preparation, canning and clothing. Winners in archery, public speaking and talent acts were also elected.

Going into its 14th year on the Michigan State University campus, the show is scheduled Aug. 30 through Sept. 2. The four-day competitive event has been held on the M. S. U. campus since 1942 when the State Fair in Detroit was abandoned during the war. Since then, the boys and girls have wanted to return to the campus to hold their final state-wide show each year. In the 14 years it has been held at M. S. U. the state show has more than tripled in size.

Premiums totaling \$18,000 and award trips to the International Dairy Exposition, National 4-H Club Congress, International

Livestock Exposition, all in Chicago; Waterloo Dairy Cattle Congress, National 4-H Camp in Washington, D. C., and the Toronto Exposition will be given. About 5000 individual exhibits will adorn four buildings on the campus. Friends and family of 4-H are welcome to attend the programs and exhibits. They will see 1100 head of livestock, 300 chickens, 150 rabbits and 25 wool fleeces, besides the other displays of home and garden.

Hot weather time is fruit punch time. To keep ice cubes from diluting the punch, try freezing some of the fruit juice in ice cube form and adding them to the punch.

Look for brown silks when you buy sweet corn, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Silks that are still green at the tips indicate corn that has not matured enough to have well-filled kernels and the best flavor.
