U. N. Celebrates Tenth Anniversary

The United Nations which celebrates its tenth anniversary this year, can be proud of its many accomplishments. Its agencies have been a tremendous influence for world betterment. The United Nations Children's Fund is one of these organizations. The lives saved and the countries helped by UNICEF (the initials by which it is known) are a testimony to its success.

UNICEF is helping others to help themselves in countries and territories all over the world. For each two dollars spent by the UN, the countries helped have contributed three dollars. UNICEF shows the way.

UNICEF has shown the way to fight disease—yaws, a disease whose open sores eventually eat into the muscles and cripple, can be cured by 15 cents worth of penicillin; tuberculosis can be controlled and cured by medicine and education; malaria, the disease that afflicts 300 million and kills 3 million every year.

UNICEF shows the way to fight ignorance by teaching child care, training midwives, teaching sanitation and hygiene. It fights malnutrition by furnishing powdered milk to children and helping other agencies study the farm problems of the world. The United Nations can well be proud of its agency as can the children of Clarkston who, last year, shared their Hallowe'en with "all the world's children".

School News

FINAL PLANS MADE FOR HOMECOMING

Preceding the very important game with Clarenceville will be the crowning of the two queens, Marietta Neubacher and Kay Robinson, and presentation of flowers to the royal court. The band and "Wolverine" dance team will perform during the half time.

The Homecoming Dance will start at 10:00 with music by Fenton Weaver's Orchestra. The Queens, Maids, and escorts will enter during the first intermission followed by a Grand March.

NO SCHOOL DUE TO TEACHERS INSTITUTE

SOME SALK VACCINE AVAILABLE SOON

The Oakland County Health Department is cooperating with the Michigan State Health Department to allocate available Salk polio vaccine to eligible Oakland County children. The first group to be inoculated will include all kindergarten and first grade children. Blue cards containing the instructions will be sent home from school on October 24th. Parents must assume responsibility for contacting their private physician in accordance with the instruction.

As soon as adequate supplies of vaccine are on hand vaccination of all children through 9 years of age will be started. Those children whose series of inoculations are incomplete will be included in this program.

Further planning is dependent on rulings from the Michigan State Health Department, according to Dr. John D. Monroe, Director of Oakland County Department of Health.
