WHALES ONCE SWAM GREAT LAKES WATERS U-M PROF. REPORTS

It may come as a surprise to Michigan land lubbers to learn that whales once cavorted in the Great Lakes!

Russell C. Hussey, professor of geology at The University of Michigan, points out that whale skeletons have been found in the Lower Peninsula.

And in case you think this is just a tall tale about "the big one that got away", several finds have been made. "One whale skeleton was found near the town of Oscoda where an excavation was being made for a new high school; another was made near Tecumseh. A portion of a fourth skeleton was found in a swamp south of Ann Arbor", the professor says.

"These bones were in place. They showed no evidence of having been brought in by the ice of prehistoric glaciers and there was no possibility that they had been carried by human beings", he continues.

Whales are marine animals today and can not live long in fresh water. The question immediately arises, how did they get from the ocean to Michigan, for this is exactly what they managed to do.

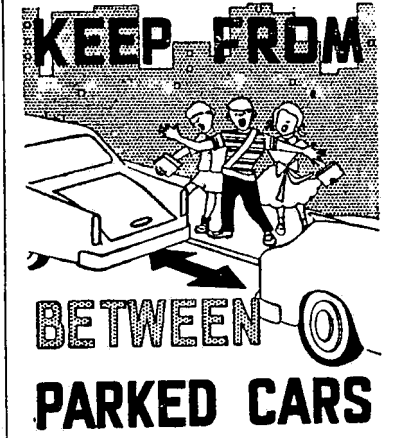
According to the University geologist, the problem may not be so difficult, after all.

"When the ice started to melt, great quantities of water poured out from the ice front, and collected in depressions on the land surface, eventually forming a great system of glacial lakes. This water covered portions of Michigan and drained into the Atlantic ocean by a variety of channels that formed at different times.

"There was, then, after the Ice Age, a fairly direct water way between this state and the ocean, and the big sea-rangers followed up one of these old water connections and eventually reached Michigan where they perished of starvation", he concludes.

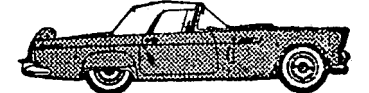

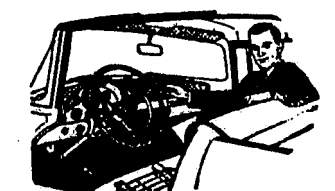

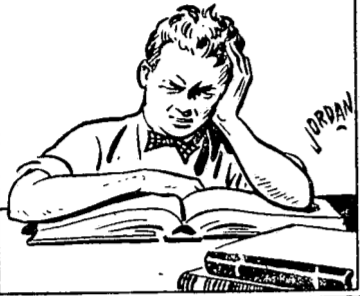

A campaign for a recreational resort for Goodwill Industries handicapped employees will get a send-off October 23 through October 26, when the Junior Group of Goodwill holds its Eighth Annual Antiques Show and Sale.

The show will open on Sunday at 2:00 p. m. and will be open from 12:00 noon until 10:00 p. m. on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. The show will be held at the Goodwill Industries work-
shop at 6522 Brush St.

In the past, proceeds of this show have been used to purchase equipment for the handicapped and to improve building facilities so that the worker now has adequate and pleasant working conditions.

This year the money will start a fund for the benefit of the handicapped during vacation periods. It is hoped that a rec-

reational center can be built in the near future, designed to give the handicapped the best in vacation pleasures.

Thirty antiques dealers will participate in the show this year bringing all types of antiques, not only from Michigan, but from eastern and midwestern states.

An American room is being built and will be ready for the show. Here lunches and dinners will be served to the public. This room is a 1,200 square foot addition to the Goodwill Building, and after the show it will be used as part of the Goodwill Industries retail store area. Feat-

ured in this novel room will be a fireplace above which will hang a scroll with Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. In the center of the room will be a table setting depicting a scene from early American history. On the walls of the room will be murals showing the landing of the Pilgrims. Members of the Junior Group will serve as hostesses

in the Americana Room. They will wear costumes in keeping with the atmosphere of the room.

The Country Store will once again be a feature of the show. Junior Goodwill members, in costume, will sell old-fashioned style candies, cheese, apples and other items popular in great-grandmother's day.

At the recent Bi-annual Delegate Assembly of Goodwill Industries of America at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, the Junior Goodwill Group was presented with an award for being the outstanding Women's Auxiliary. EXTENSION NEWS

Hunters and trappers take approximately 7,000 tons of dressed

meat each year in Michigan. Much of it is eaten but a large quantity never reaches the table.

If you are lucky enough to get some ducks this season, here's a good way to prepare them: First, clean the duck and wash it thoroughly. Fill the duck with about two cups of peeled, quartered apples, then sew it up and tie in shape. Next, rub with an onion slice, salt and pepper. Roast the prepared duck uncovered at 325 degrees F, allowing 20 to 30 minutes per pound. Strips of bacon may be placed on the breast to keep the bird from becoming dry, or you can baste the duck every ten minutes with 1 cup of orange juice.

You will find this recipe and many others for a variety of small game including rabbit, squirrel, opossum, raccoon, muskrat, beaver, as well as recipes for cooking pheasant, wild goose, grouse and duck in the bulletin "Good Eating from Woods and Fields". This bulletin also tells

how to dress game soon after killing and how to cook it. Recipes were tested by the Foods and Nutrition Department at Michigan State University.

FOOD SCOOP

Heavy offerings of pigs for the fall pork run have brought average prices down to the lowest point since 1946. Food handlers report that with these peak supplies top quality is coming, for the volume shipments which are arriving are the small tender animals. Both fresh and smoked cuts wear the blue ribbon for economy.

All grades of beef are adequate but the choice grade is in better supply. The blade chuck roast and ground beef should be in demand. Corned beef in cryovac packages are at unusually low prices. It should be sliced exactly at right angles or perpendicular to the grain for maximum tenderness.

Supplies of the better grades of both veal and lamb are still scarce, but the quality is slowly improving as prices slowly decrease. Shoulder roasts are the best buy.

Plentiful supplies of fresh Lake Erie perch, blue pickerel and white bass have brought prices down. There is also much evidence of fresh ocean cod on the counters. Abundant supplies of such frozen fish as cod, haddock, and ocean perch, are being featured at very low costs.

Prices of all eggs are slightly lower in most markets again this week. Supplies of the medium sizes are most heavy and they are the best buy in weight and quality.

Weather conditions have been more favorable to the growth of Michigan cauliflower and ample supplies are coming into the markets in peak quality again this week. Abundant supplies of locally grown potatoes which are smooth, clean, and which cook-up well are an outstanding value this year. Food shoppers will also be glad to hear that a heavy harvest of California head lettuce of excellent quality is swamping the markets at extremely low prices.

Because cooler weather is most favorable to volume production of good, green cabbage, plentiful supplies of this most economical vegetable are arriving in the markets. Moderate to heavy supplies of many varieties of fall squash are still adding color to the vegetable counters at low prices. Vegetable variety in menu planning may easily be obtained by the selection of brussels sprouts.

McIntosh and Jonathan apples are in most abundant supply and may be found at economical prices. Delicious apples are best for just eating out of the hand because they are softer, less tart, and do not cook as well.

Peak supplies of Tokay grapes are also on the counters. Heavier supplies of Florida Duncan grapefruit, known for their delicious sweet flavor, are beginning to arrive. There is a steady decrease in price.

Plentiful supplies of Bartlett pears may also be found at very reasonable prices. Bananas are a frequent addition to the market basket and many stores are selling them for unusually low costs. Fall weather and the approaching

holidays always suggest the use of cranberries in many forms. Moderate supplies of fresh cranberries have already dropped in price to near holiday levels.

MICHIGAN A CHEESE PRODUCER
Importance of cheese manu-

facturing in Michigan is being accentuated by proclamation of national dairy interests that October is Cheese Month. Sale of fluid milk in Michigan about equals the amount of milk used in manufacturing but with in the state are 40 cheese factories, it was stated by F. M. Skiver, chief of the Michigan Department of Agriculture's bureau of dairying.

Skiver said Michigan ranks 8th in both milk production and cheese production. About 31 million pounds of cheese a year are produced, mostly of cheddar and colby types, although some Italian varieties are also made. The Federal government at present buys about three carloads a week, which is graded by the bureau of dairying. In production of cream cottage cheese, Michigan places 4th among the states.

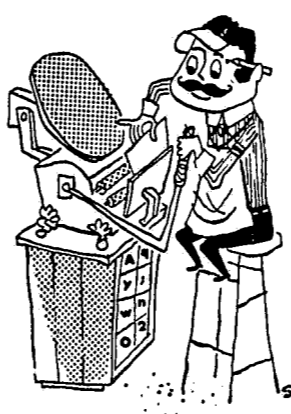

Makes 12 to 15 medium-sized muffins.
