CLARKSTON WIN FIRST IN SIX YEARS
Clarkston defeated Oxford for the first time in 6 years in a non-league game at Oxford. The fired-up Wolves avenged last year's 33-7 loss to the Wildcats by marching for 3 and blocking a punt for a fourth touchdown.

Clarkston won the toss and elected to receive. Bob Harrison kicked off for Oxford and Clarkston put the ball into play on the 20. On the first play Dave Swayne, playing fullback, reeled off 10 for a Clarkston first down on the 30. Two plays later Clyde Kizer broke loose off tackle for 18 to the 42 of Oxford.

Left half George Lang broke through the other side of the line for 8. Three plays later Leroy Parks connected with Lang on a short pass good for 8 more to the Wildcat 30. Kizer broke through over his left guard and scampered for Clarkston's first touchdown. The 80 yard drive took 8 plays and 3 first downs to complete. Gary Nelson kicked the extra point and Clarkston led when the quarter ended a few plays later, 7-0.

Early in the 2nd quarter Wendell Smith recovered a Clarkston fumble on his own 20. Doug Chartrand worked the ball to the 32 on the next play before he was dropped by Don Alexander. Nelson knifed through and stopped the next play on the 18. After an incomplete pass Oxford dropped back into punt formation. Charles Passage, playing left end for Clarkston, blocked the kick then picked up the bouncing ball and raced over for Clarkston's second touchdown. Nelson's first kick was good but a penalty on the play forced him to try again from the 17. This time the kick was wide, and Clarkston led 13-0.

Nelson's kickoff was taken on the 20 by Smith who was dropped for no gain by Don Alexander. On the next play the Wildcats were driven back to the 14. Leslie Beardslee was dropped by Nate Riffle on the 5. Don Alexander and Charles Passage
