The auction was sponsored by the cheerleaders with the assistance of the Racket Squad.

**ORGANIZATION FOUNDED TO BATTLE NEPHROSIS**

An organization which will battle a disease that hits children with a mortality rate greater than that of paralytic polio and is the most prevalent of all chronic children's diseases has been founded in Michigan. It will meet the disease on all fronts. This was promised today by Douglas Adair, president of the newly created Michigan Chapter of the National Nephrosis Foundation.

"Nephrosis," said Adair, "kills one out of every two children attacked. In spite of its prevalence and deadliness among children, less is known about its cause, treatment or exact nature, than is known about cancer."

Our organization's first concern is to get members throughout the state and to build local chapters in as many cities and localities as possible.

Adair explained today that childhood Nephrosis is a disease that is primarily evidenced by disturbed kidney function although it also disturbs other bodily functions. Unlike other diseases that attack children, Nephrosis usually lasts several years, years in which the parents never know whether the child will live or die. Death can come suddenly or after years of suffering.

Pointing out that it is possible that a child may suffer from Nephrosis without showing any outward signs of it, Adair said that "Ordinarily Nephrosis is first

indicated by a swelling around the eyes in the morning. As the illness progresses, the swelling will increase and spread becoming evident in the abdomen and the feet. It may soon include the entire body."

The new Michigan foundation has three primary purposes:

1. To establish one or more clinics to care for victims of Nephrosis.
2. To establish a research center to learn the cause of Nephrosis and to develop a cure.
3. To provide a fund on which parents can draw to take them through the expensive periods of treatment of Nephrosis.

**MICHIGAN BELL TRYING TO FURNISH EFFICIENCY TO RURAL AREAS**

To bring faster and better telephone service into the rural areas of the territory it serves, the Michigan Bell Telephone company has spent about 28,000,000 since the end of World War II, statistics of a rural report revealed today.

Michigan Bell serves about 130,000 telephones in rural areas in its territory, according to Hains P. Andreasen, Michigan Bell's farm telephone manager. The company now brings service to about 76 out of every 100 rural establishments in Michigan, a climb that has been steady since the close of the war and one that shows a 5 per cent increase in Bell-served farm telephones this year.

Andreasen said the company expects to eliminate the remaining magneto, or "crank-type" telephones in its territory in the next two years. Five magneto exchanges are scheduled for con-

version this year, five in 1956, and the last three in 1957.

As dial telephones are shoving the crank-type farm instrument into extinction, other improvements are also being made on rural party lines. While there has been a sharp reduction in lines serving eight or more parties, Michigan Bell has moved some 60,000 rural telephones into urban base rate areas since the end of the war.

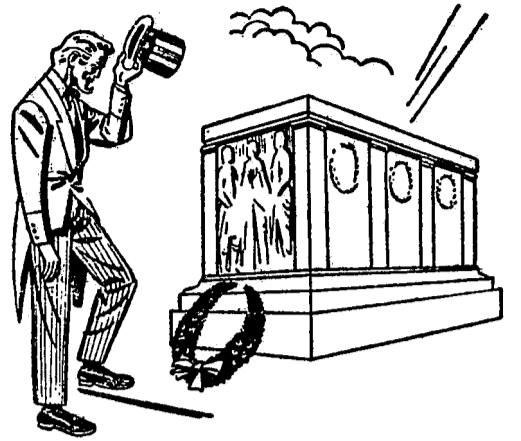
Andreasen also reported almost 96 percent of the company's rural telephones are on a "selective ringing" basis, an improvement figure that has climbed from 78 per cent since the first postwar year. Selective ringing limits the number of party-line rings a subscriber hears, other than the ring of his own number.

In trying to furnish better service in the farm areas, Michigan Bell is testing new types and methods of plant installations. Much of the rural line network is now being placed underground to gain better protection against the weather. The Bell System has designed special types of cable for these underground installations, and the development was born out of a continuous search for ways to push rural communications to utmost efficiency.

Michigan Bell engineers, like those in other associated companies in the Bell System, are studying developments in the field of solar battery power for possible future use on telephone lines in outlying areas. A successful and epochal test of the solar battery, developed by the Bell Telephone Laboratories, was completed recently on a telephone line near

Americus, Georgia. Work is continuing toward making the battery practical for powering telephones in rural areas and other sections far removed from more conventional sources of power.

**EXTENSION OFFICE DOINGS**

Teething cookies to help babies cut teeth can be made at home. They provide nutrients, are non-crumbling yet firm enough to be of help and are small in size. Mrs. Mary A. Hixon, county home demonstration agent, says the little cookies contain iron and protein and are small enough for the baby to grasp easily. She gives this recipe which will make about 50

two-inch teething cookies. Ingredients are: 2 tablespoons shortening; 2 tablespoons brown sugar; 2 tablespoons molasses (medium dark); 1 egg yolk, slightly beaten; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 1 cup minus 2 tablespoons sifted, enriched flour; ¼ teaspoon salt; and 1½ teaspoons double-acting baking powder. Either cream the shortening and sugar together, or melt the fat and add the sugar. Add molasses and egg. Stir in vanilla. Sift together the dry ingredients and mix into the sugar mixture.

Roll to ¼ inch thickness. Cut into rectangular pieces about 1 by 1½ inches. (This saves re-rolling dough and makes a handy size for the baby.) Place on an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350 F.) for 15 to 20 minutes or until

**A WORD TO DEER HUNTERS**

Deer hunters who kill a buck near Clarkston or elsewhere in southern Michigan are urged to phone the Rose Lake Wildlife Experiment Station near East Lansing.

The Clarkston area hunter can call the Conservation Department station collect at Lansing, Federal 9-8638. A game biologist will go to the hunter's residence or locker plant, weigh the deer, measure its antlers, and determine its age.

Even if the deer must be cut up before the biologist arrives, he can still obtain valuable information from the head alone.

This study, now in its fifth year, shows conclusively that the well-fed bucks from southern Michigan farmlands are larger and develop better antlers than northern deer at the same age. It is normal for southern deer to develop six-point racks and a dressed weight of 130 pounds when only a year and a half old. Many northern yearling deer are only spikehorns and weigh less than 100 pounds dressed out. This reflects poor winter food conditions in browsed out deer yards in much of the northern deer range.

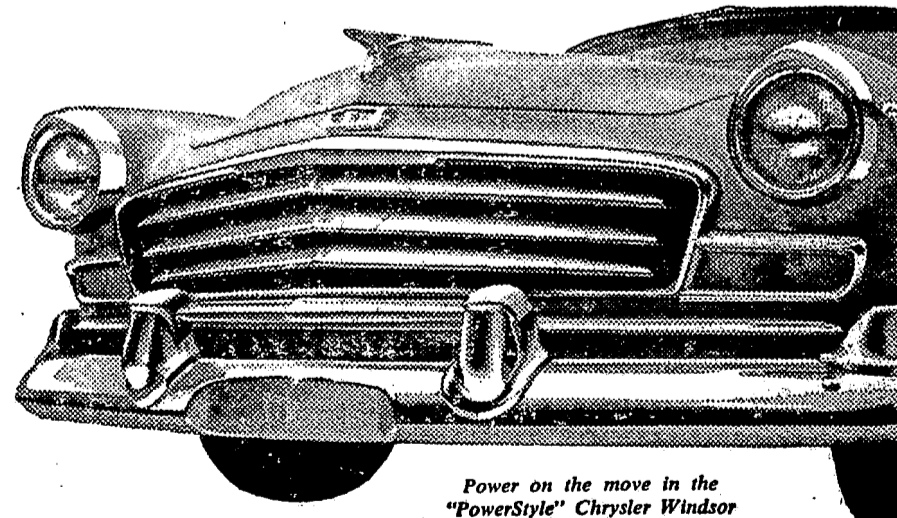
