Harpsichord Shows Early Musical Trends States Wayne U. Humanities Professor

KEEP OR CUT YOUR WOODLOT by John K. Trocke

Assistant County Agr'l Agent With land values rising all the time, many farmers in Michigan are wonderng if their woodlots could be more valuable in a crop other than timber. Efficiency is necessary these days in order to stay in business, and you may think your woodlot could provide room for expansion of your farming program. But don't start plowing your woodlot yet. There are several factors you should check on beforehand. The first thing to consider is your need for additional land. How big a contribution will it make to your overall program? Will it justify the expense of clearing the land and removing the stumps and stones?

Next, look at the type of soil. your timber has been growing on. Is it good enough land to support prolonged cultivation? Trocke says light sandy soils and thin soils might better be left in timber. And how about the topography? There may be a reason why that particular tract of land was left in timber in the first place. Perhaps it's hilly and difficult to work. It may be hard to drain, or a low spot on the farm. If you can't get on it with a tractor, let the trees do the job. Another thing which should affect your decision is the type



GRAPES LIKE FALL FEEDING: DO BETTER

Grapes can make more effect-ive use of potash and phosphorous fertilizers if they are applied in the fall,

That's the recommendation of Paul Larsen, extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University. Fall aplication of these two fertilizers allows them to move into the soil nearer to the roots so that in spring the plants can make quick use of

Potash and phosphorous fertilizers may be applied any time in the month of November or until the ground freezes, according to Larsen. The fertilizers should be applied broadcast so that the cover crops will benefit.

Where growth of vines has been normal or adequate, Larsen recommends using 300 to 400 pounds 0-10-30 or 3-9-27 or their equivalents. If there is a serious potash 'deficiency, Larsen says to use 300 to 400 pounds of sulfate of potash per year until the condition is corrected. Then follow with the normal recommend-

Nitrogen fertilizer should be applied to grapes in the spring, Larsen reminds growers.


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


"DOODLE BUGS" WON'T FIND OIL SAYS U-M MAN



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BULLETIN TELLS ANSWERS TO FOOD QUERIES

Do you ever wonder if vegetable fats are any easier to digest than animal fats or if one has more calories than the other? In healthy persons, all fats are thoroughly digested, explains

specialist at Michigan State University. Whether fat comes from animal or vegetable sources, both have the same calorie value. She points out that fats, in general, are more slowly digested than other nutrients. There might be a slight difference in the speed of digestion of various fats. But, she says, there probably is a greater difference in the functioning of digestive systems of two individuals than between the speed of the digestion of two fats.

In a Michigan State University bulletin, Miss Hershey clears up this question of fat digestion as well as other misconceptions about food. The publication, Fact, Fad and Fraud About Food", gives \factual answers to 40 questions such as: "Is it harmful to cook foods in aluminum utensils?" and "Is aspirin a good food preservative in canning?"
