Rotarians Hear Interesting Talk

The Clarkston Rotarians were quite happy on Monday evening to have as their guest speaker, Professor Herbert Lissner of Wayne University Engineering Department. Mr. Lissner, who makes his home on the Dixie Highway in this area, felt quite at home talking to his neighbors, but, on the other hand, it was nothing unusual for him to feel at home while he talked, because he has lectured to students, to professors, to scientists and to various organizations practically all over America. Mr. Lissner has written several books and he is forever experimenting, delving into the unknown, doing research work that will be used in this ever-progressing world.

Mr. Lissner spoke on "Bio-Mechanics." He went into the intricate study of the strength of the bone anatomy of the human body and told about measuring the mechanical strength of the human spine. Determination of the causes of concussion was explained and different car accidents were used to help clarify the subject. His talk was quite different than any the Rotarians had ever heard and they were all quite interested.

The dinner was served by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Baptist Church.

Homemaking Tests Here December 6

"Homemaker of Tomorrow Day" will be observed here December 6.

A startling total of 256,534 career-minded graduating girls in 10,222 of the nation's high schools simultaneously that day will test their aptitude for the career that awaits eight out of ten of them—homemaking.

Included will be the senior girls of Clarkston High School. They have been enrolled in the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

General Mills, sponsor of this \$100,000 scholarship program designed to assist the schools in homemaking education, announced this huge participation of nearly half of the nation's high schools today.

A total of 361 schools and 9,835 girls in this state will take the 50-minute written homemaking examination which will be the basis for selecting the school and state Homemakers of Tomorrow. The examination paper of the girl receiving the highest test score in each school will be entered in state competition with each state Homemaker of Tomorrow receiving a \$1,500 scholarship and each state runner-up a \$500 scholarship.

The 48 state winners and the representative from the District of Columbia, with their advisors, will tour Washington, colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Philadelphia, April 8-12 when interviews will combine with the test score in determining the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow who will be selected April 12. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000.

Each girl who takes the test will receive a homemaking guide. Each school winner will receive a golden Homemaker of Tomorrow pin designed by Trifari and her school will receive a cook book. The school of each state winner will receive a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

OBSERVE CHRISTMAS TREE LAW

Estimated to be a \$5 million business in the state, sale and movement of Christmas trees and evergreen boughs will be closely watched by representatives of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, whose bureau of plant industry is responsible for the enforcement of the state's Christmas tree law.

Cutting of trees for the yule trade is already in progress, and inspectors have been assigned to producing regions. As the sales season develops, other inspectors will check sales lots and places where Christmas trees are offered for sale.

The Christmas tree law requires that anyone cutting, moving or transporting evergreen trees or boughs must have in possession a bill of sale from the owner of the land where the trees were cut. This bill of sale must be made on a form provided free by the Michigan Department of Agriculture. They are available at State Police posts, sheriff's offices, Conservation Department district offices or County Agricultural extension offices.

An exception occurs when a person buys trees or boughs from someone who is not the original land owner. In such cases the person transporting the trees or boughs must have in possession a simple bill of sale showing name and address of the person from whom they were bought and the number and kind.

When a property owner himself transports trees from his own land he does not need a bill of sale, but rather should carry the deed or tax receipt to prove ownership of the property where the trees were cut.

No one is permitted to transport trees with roots attached unless they were inspected on the property where growing and found to be free of diseases or insect pests.

Violation of Michigan's Christmas tree law is punishable by imprisonment up to 90 days, or a fine of \$25 to \$100, or both.

2. Gummed or pasted label is next best, also top and side.

3. For crates and odd shaped items also use express wire tags.

4. Type labels - or address with waterproof ink or heavy pencil.

5. PRINT CLEARLY

Labels, tags available free from your expressman.

Care in marking holiday gift shipments will help get them to their correct destinations safely and on time. The "from" and "to" addresses should be hand-printed on the top and repeated on one side of the package. Black crayon or heavy pencil are best to use. Ordinary ink may smudge or run and become illegible. Gummed labels, preferably typewritten, are also good. Address labels, as well as tags for boxes, crates and odd-shaped items may be secured free at railway express offices.

Write or print clearly and be careful of abbreviations. Identify the state. For example, there are 28 communities named Madison in as many states.

An extra address label or slip placed inside the package will provide the necessary identification if the outside marks become torn, lost or illegible. Special labels to indicate the nature of the shipment and special instructions as to handling are available. Express drivers or receiving clerks will paste them on the package as required.

Gift shipments going by express will be picked up by vehicles at most major cities and towns. Shippers are given a receipt and a signature is secured from the receiver at the destination.

If you face a last minute shipping problem check your expressman on direct overnight Air Express service via the nation's scheduled airlines and coordinated as necessary with the rail facilities of some 241 of the country's railroads.

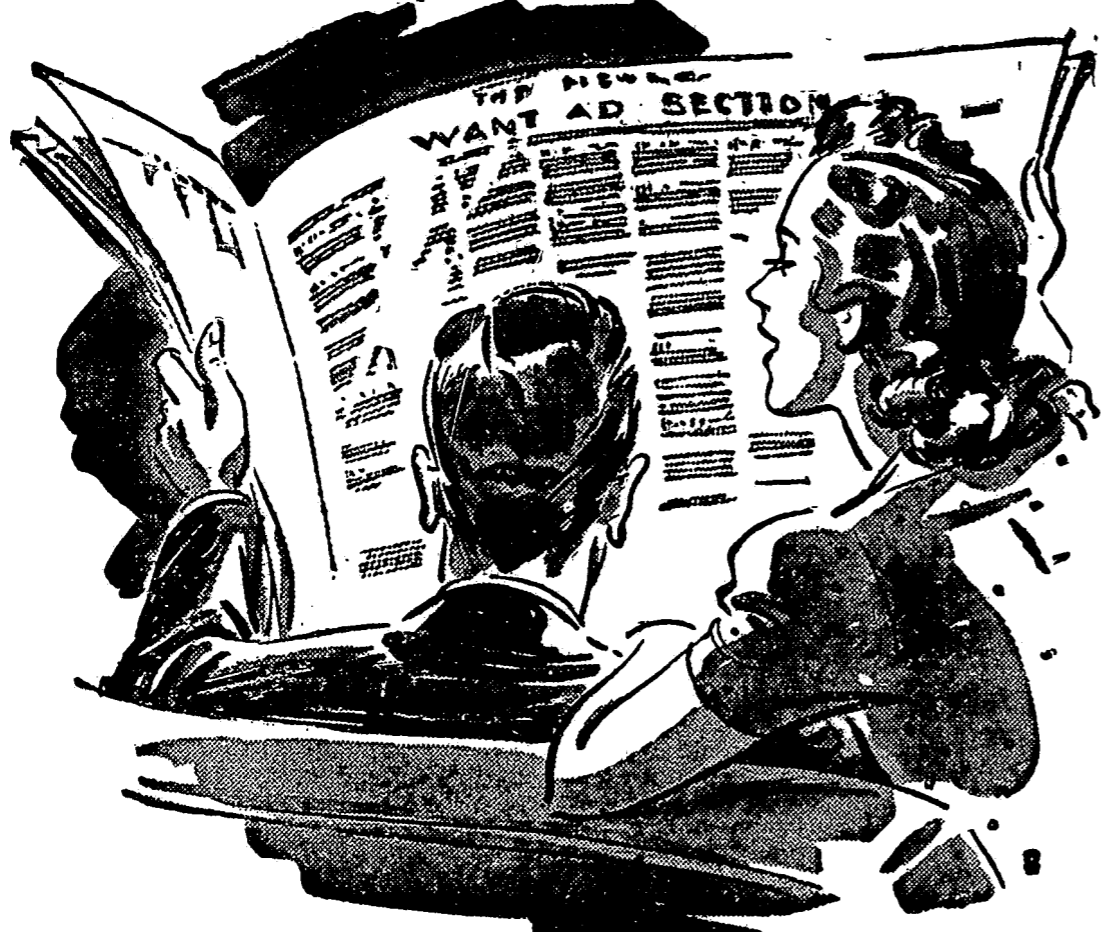

A letter or message can now be mailed inside a package or publication for the first time in United States postal history, Postmaster General Summerfield said today in announcing a new "Combination" mail service. All the mailer needs to do is indicate the presence of the letter or message inside the package and pay the appropriate postage on it plus postage for the package itself.

TAPING

1. Seal flaps across center. Use at least 2" wide gummed tape with 2 1/2" overlap on sides.
2. Tape each end, 1/2 of tape on sides, 1/2 extended up, and then flapped down on sides.
3. Press end flap of tape over top, last.

TYING

4. Knot end of strong twine.
5. Loop cord around girth of package, make slip knot and pull tight.
6. Make simple knot to keep twine taut around container.
7. Run twine around length of package, pulling taut.
8. Make knot on bottom as twine crosses first loop.
9. Bring twine back to original point on top, tie securely with double knot. For safety, repeat process, making double twine around, and secure taut with final double knot.

NOTE: Use damp sponge to moisten tape - do not soak!

Most Christmas shopping lists include gifts to be gathered and sent to distant friends and relatives. Here are some hints on getting them to their destinations safely, on time, and in perfect condition.

The first thing to do, of course, is to ship early. Equally important, however, is the need to pack and tape or tie gift shipments carefully and address them correctly.

Shipping them early enough to avoid the last minute rush presents no problem if gummed "Do Not Open Until Christmas" outside address labels are used. They may be obtained free at railway express offices.

Unbreakable gifts, such as linens and textiles, weighing less than 35 pounds and otherwise properly protected, may be outer-wrapped in paper—but use at least two thicknesses of heavy wrapping tied with a double strand of strong twine. For most gifts, however, corrugated or fibreboard cartons in sound condition are always preferable. Grocery or other neighborhood stores usually are a good source.

Note when shopping in your local stores that you can send virtually anything as a gift, since express shipments can be any weight, size or shape. Properly crated, even pets and live animals are sent in great volume each year as holiday gifts.

It is worth remembering also that sometimes multiple gifts, or gifts that come in several parts sent to the same address may be protected best if packaged separately.

Fluffed strips of newspaper, used as suggested, make an excellent cushioning material to protect gifts from shock in transit. If the same care used in selecting gifts is exercised in preparing them for shipment, it can mean a "Merry Christmas" in every instance.

Under the new "Combination" mail service, letters or other single pieces of either First or Third-Class mail may be placed inside Fourth-Class parcels or inside copies of publications mailed under Second-Class mail entry. Letters or other single pieces of First-Class mail may also be placed inside Third-Class packages.

The postage for each letter, and for each single enclosure at the appropriate First or single-piece Third-Class rate must be affixed to the outside of the parcel.

A statement reading "First-Class Mail Enclosed" or "Third-Class Mail Enclosed" must be placed on each parcel below the postage and above the address. This endorsement may be hand-stamped, handwritten, typewritten, printed, or put on by any other method.

The enclosures inside the package shall preferably be placed on top of the other items in the package.

Under the old regulation, mailers who found it impractical to use combination containers were forced to use two separate pieces of mail instead of one, the Postmaster General explained.

"We feel certain mailers will welcome this more convenient system for mailing different classes of mail together. Over the years, thousands of letters have been received requesting this kind of service. We are here to serve the public, and are especially pleased that we can introduce Combination mailings before the Christmas season when so many Americans depend upon the Department for delivery of their gifts and personal messages."

Among the postal patrons needing to send two classes of mail together, Mr. Summerfield also cited business firms sending substitute products and wanting to explain why that was done; magazine publishers sending gift certificates naming the donor with first copies of their publications to new subscribers; manufacturers sending operational, maintenance and repair instructions with household appliances; and companies including sales letters with samples of merchandise.

The new "Combination" mail service which was effective November 28, is on a 60-day trial basis. During this period, the comments of the public will be welcomed.

WHITES SAW LITTLE HOPE FOR RED MAN

What did Michigan's white settler of over a hundred years ago think of the Indian as he drove him from the land the red man occupied since long before the dawn of history?

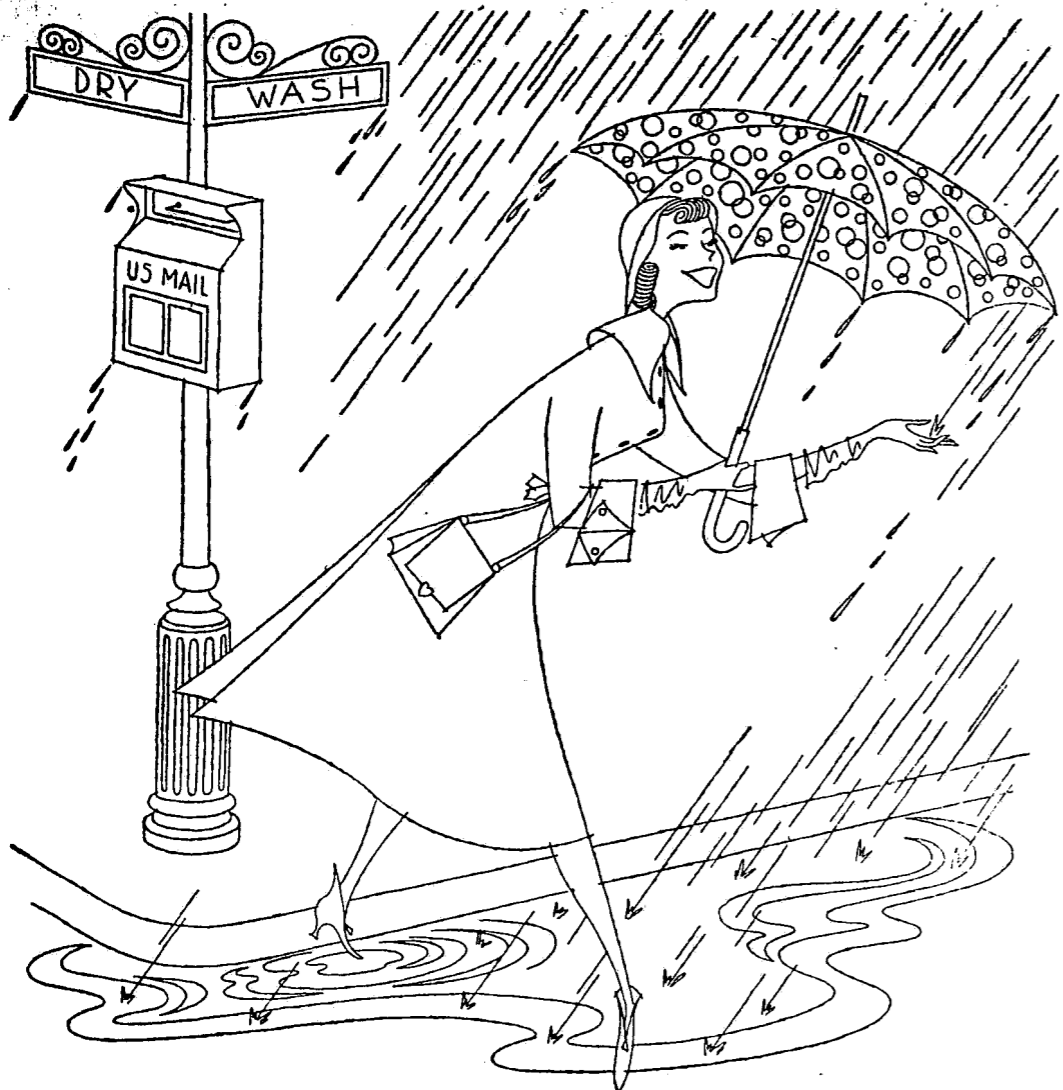
Easy Coins A Quick Profit

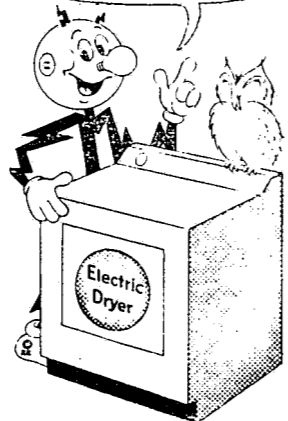

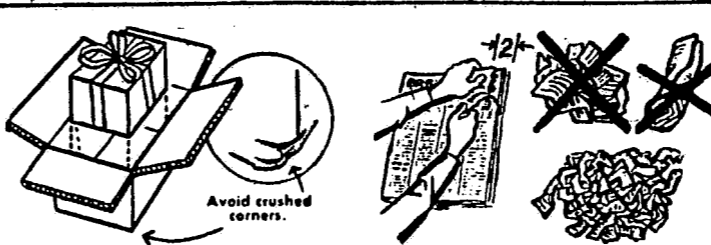

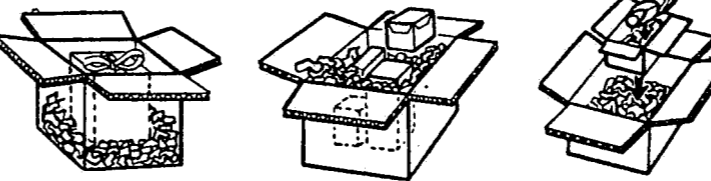

For best results in roasting your holiday turkey, Consumer Marketing Information agents recommend slow cooking by dry heat on a rack in an open pan. It requires no water, no basting, no cover and no searing. Low temperatures assure better flavor and appearance, less shrinkage and less loss of juices. A shallow open pan allows the heat to circulate around the bird, roasting it evenly. A rack at least 1/2 inch high raises the bird off the bottom of the pan, keeping it out of the juices.

HOW TO PACK HOLIDAY SHIPMENTS



1. Use sound, sturdy container large enough to provide 2" clearance all around.
2. Use newspaper to pre-pair cushioning. Do not ball or roll, instead tear into 2" strips and then fluff.



3. Insert 2" bottom layer, then gift. Stuff 2" on sides and top—firm—but not too tight.
4. For several gifts, use big enough box to also provide sufficient cushioning between each one.
5. Double pack very fragile gifts—pack as in 3, in smaller box, then pack box same way in second container.

NOTE: As precaution, before closing, enclose extra "To" and "From" address label. Free labels available from Railway Express.

For the Christmas shopper who is planning to send gifts to friends and relatives, careful packing is but one step in preparing holiday shipments for safe and sure arrival. After gifts are properly packed, the package or carton must be securely closed or held together.

As shown here, taping or tying, or both can be used. Gummed tape, however, is preferable for shipments going by express. Sealed express packages do not involve extra charges or require opening for inspection. The tape, sufficiently wide, can be moistened with a damp sponge, cloth or paper napkin. Soaking will impair the adhesive quality of the tape. If a little vinegar is mixed with the water the tape will stick more securely.

Cartons containing holiday gifts can be shipped very safely if strong twine and proper tying methods are used. First, make a knot at the end of the cord. Then loop the cord around the girth, or outer side of the package, make a slip knot and pull tight (Fig. 5). Make a simple knot around the slip knot to keep the twine taut and secure (Fig. 6).

Next, run the twine around the length of the package (Fig. 7) and when passing the cross-wise loop at the bottom make a knot (Fig. 8). Bring cord back to the original slip knot, tie securely with a double knot (Fig. 9) and—for additional safety repeat the process so that the package will be double tied.

While these procedures will work in most instances, special sizes or shapes of types of gifts may require additional or slightly different methods. If in doubt or in need of special advice the local railway express office is a good place to call or visit to get help.

Did you know that any blow that will break an egg will also bruise a sweet potato? Never handle them roughly. Consumer Marketing Information agents tell us to buy them in small amounts and use them shortly for the best value. Good sweet potatoes are smooth, well-shaped, firm, and of bright appearance,

with color and shape typical of the variety. Maturity is of little importance except that the early crop may be more readily bruised and skinned than those shipped later in the season. The most common defects are decay, odd shape, and growth cracks.

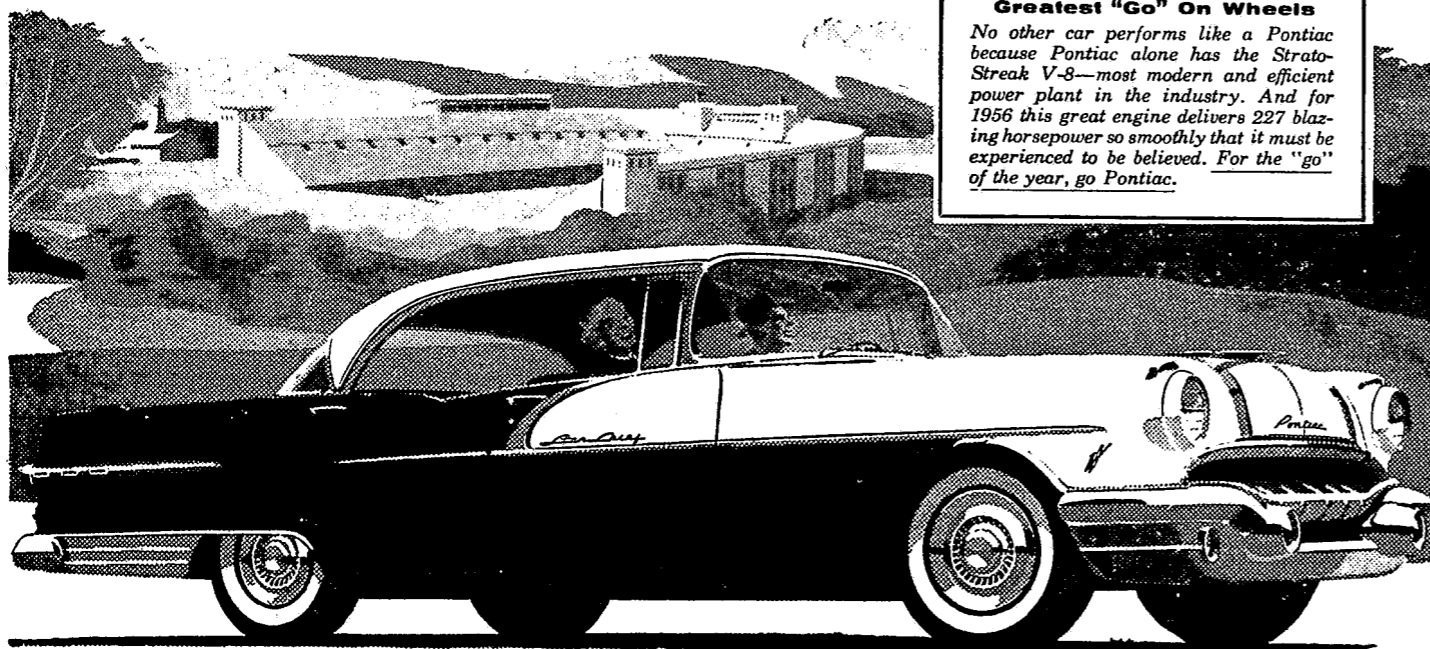

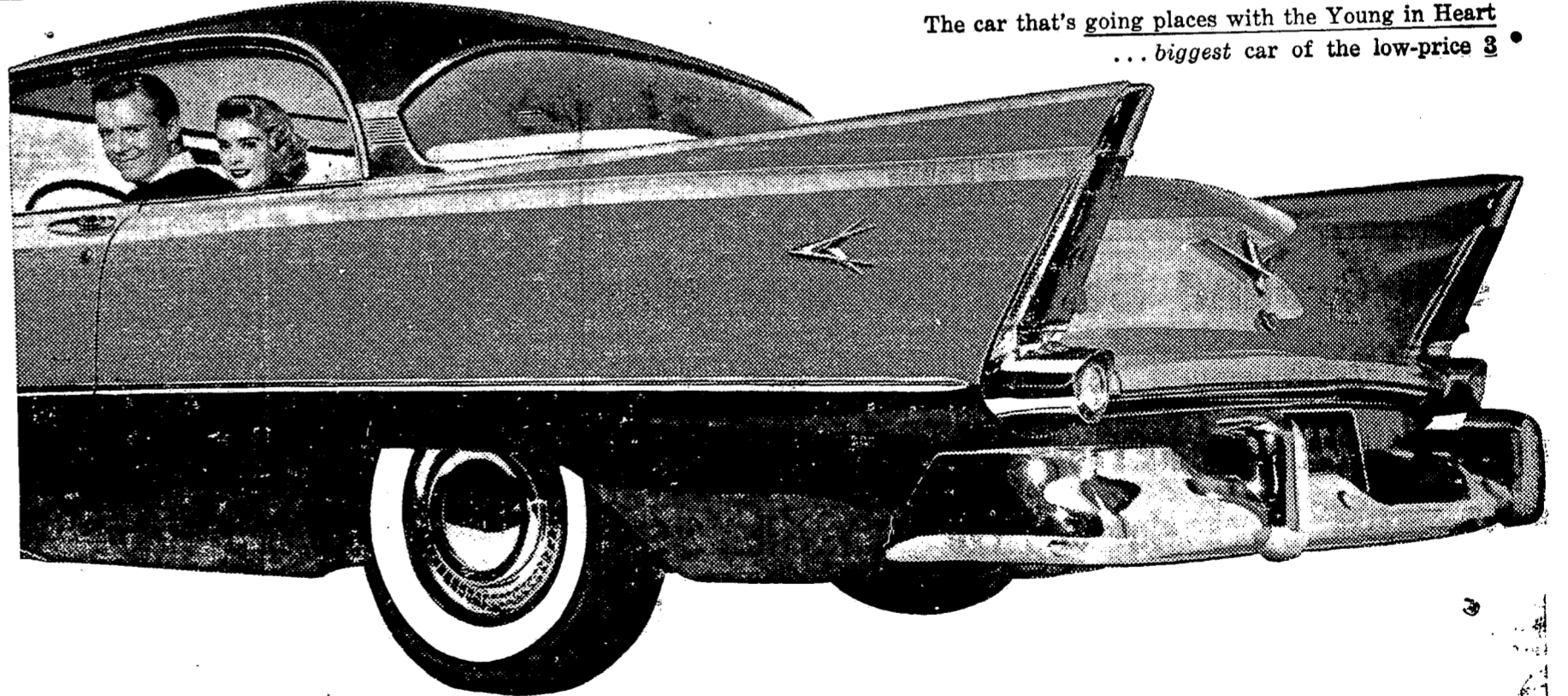

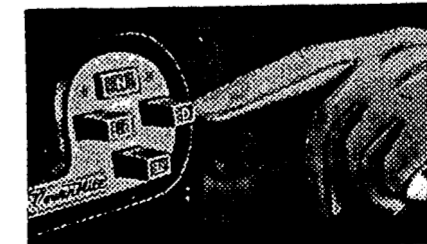
