"Martin Luther," classic sound motion picture depicting the life of the great Reformer, will be shown at Waterford Community Church on New Year's Eve, Saturday, Dec. 31, at 8:30 P. M.

This full-length spiritual epic was produced in the towns, churches and castles of West Germany. The script, based on careful documentation of the Reformation period, follows Martin Luther from his early days as a student through the feverish turmoil of the Reformation itself. It is uncut or unchanged from the original version.

The release of "Martin Luther" sets a new milestone in the history of films for the church. A vigorous distribution program has been inaugurated, geared toward presenting the Martin Luther story to every city, and hamlet of the nation. It will, in all likelihood, be seen by more people than any other film.

After the showing of the film, refreshments and a time of fellowship will be provided in the church parlors. A short devotional service will bring the year to a close, and welcome the new year. There is no admission charge and the public is cordially invited to attend.

Clarkston Bank To Help Farmers

The Clarkston State Bank is cooperating with Michigan State University and the Oakland County Agricultural Extension Service by providing farm account record books, without charge, to their customers. They are giving these books to customers to encourage them in keeping good records.

The basis of any sound farm business is a good record. This is doubly important now due to income tax and social security laws recently passed. Research has shown that many farm families could save hundreds of dollars by keeping accurate records.

Michigan State University has prepared the new simplified Farm Account Book to allow ease in reporting the farmer's income tax and social security tax. It is so set up that a simple transfer of the totals of numbered columns can be made to corresponding numbers on the Farmer's Income Tax Blank.

Each year Michigan State University and the local agricultural agents also offer a very valuable service to farmers wishing to cooperate. They are given assistance in summarizing their farm account books and can compare their farm business with a composite of other farmers in their farming area. Information is also available at this office on income tax and social security problems.

Mr. Robert L. Jones of The Clarkston State Bank states that the bank will have books available January 1 for all interested local farmers.

H. B. Parks Dies In California

March Of Dimes Starts Tuesday

Opeing January 3rd in Clarkston and throughout the nation is the 1956 March of Dimes. "Remember Me" is the slogan of the campaign according to Mrs. Everett Dennis, Clarkston Chairman.

"The Salk Vaccine, developed with March of Dimes money, is a miracle in modern medicine but it came too late for many thousands", Mrs. Dennis said. "We want to remind everyone that the vaccine cannot help the stricken. They are crippled now."

"During the past year the March of Dimes provided \$80,000 for polio patient care through the Oakland County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Oakland County Chapter funds included \$69,000 direct from the 1955 March of Dimes and \$11,350 from the National Foundation's epidemic aid fund.

"This money helped care for 50 polio patients stricken in 1955 plus 250 victims of former years. Hospital and medical care, special nursing care, physical therapy, braces, crutches, and wheel chairs were provided", she said.

Mrs. Dennis pointed out that polio respirator equipment for hospitals and home care patients including iron lungs, chest respirators, rocking beds, and hot pack machines have been provided.

"Polio will strike thousands more before the Salk Vaccine becomes fully effective and available to all", Mrs. Dennis said. "During 1954 and 1955 28,000 Oakland County children received vaccine bought by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis."

By The Way . . .

The gingerbread house and gingerbread man displayed in the window of the Clarkston Bakery deserves mention, as very attractive and appropriate for the season. . . . Clarkston has maintained its reputation for having beautiful decorations at Christmas time. Whether outside trees, lighted crosses or banners across the front of homes, one was well aware, in traveling about the town and vicinity that all were taking part in and enjoying the Christmas spirit. . . . But 1955 is drawing to a close and we must look forward to 1956. When we say 'we' we mean 'you and I'. So let's talk about us—you and I. We are in receipt of a copy of the Kiplinger Washington Letter with permission to print such facts as we wish. Some of the interesting ones: The 'baby boom' is continuing, down a bit from 1954 but a healthy 4 million babies were born this year. It is the "style" to have three, four, or even five. Marriages are continuing as usual. Those born in the depression thirties, of smaller families, do not push the marriage number so high, but it is thought that 1960 will produce a new marriage wave. There are 109 men to 100 women in this country, of marriage ages. To the women who ask where the "hunting" is best the answer is go to the farms—152 single men for every 100 single women. Divorces are about 1 for every four marriages; and three out of four re-marry—no change in habit of perseverance. People are making more money but there is still poverty. Building is good now but it is thought that 1960 will really see a building boom. Schools: more new schools are needed. 200,000 new teachers needed a year for next ten years. Working women: 27 per cent before World War II; in '54, 30 per cent; in '55, 35 per cent. More birthdays in August and September—no scientific explanation. Population is shifting less and less. In ten years, more young people, because of birth rate. Also there will be more old people—people are living longer. Michigan is 3rd highest in population growth in mid-west. Population now, 167 million. Somehow we will "muddle through"—there will be more of us to work with.

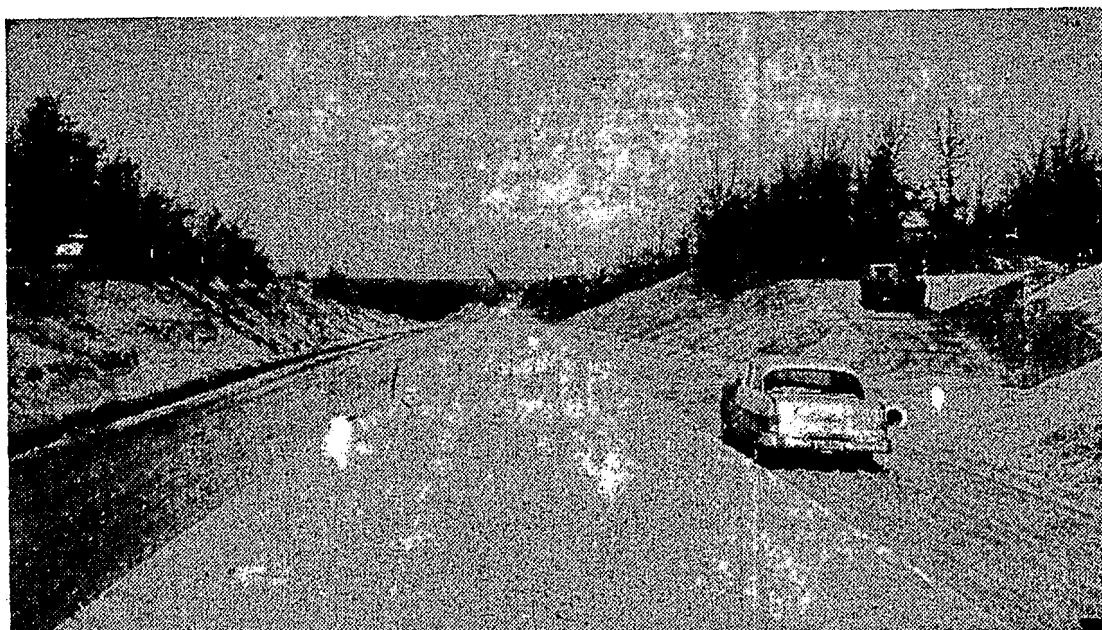

NEW RIBBON OF CONCRETE INTO THE NORTHLAND



Five miles of new 22 ft. concrete pavement 8 inches thick, reinforced with steel, from Grayling south on US-27 was opened to traffic on December 1.

This section is a part of the ultimate four-lane divided interstate highway from Detroit to the Straits of Mackinac, State Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler said.

This new pavement roughly parallels the old section of road which is narrow with many steep

hills and poor sight distance. It is visible on the left in the picture. On the right of the picture is seen one of the State Highway Department roadside parks. The new road levels the hills, has no steep grades and affords clear vision the entire distance.

Pending the construction of two additional lanes, the new section will be used during the winter months for two-way traffic. During the rest of the year it will be the north-bound lanes.

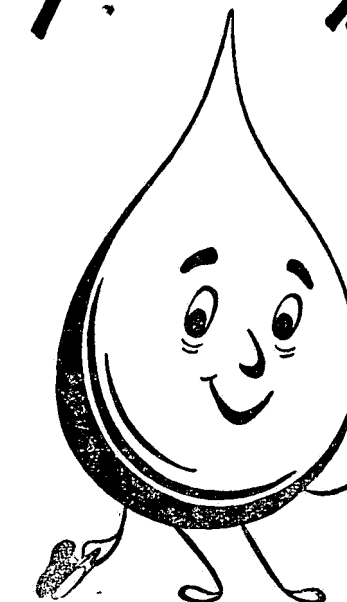

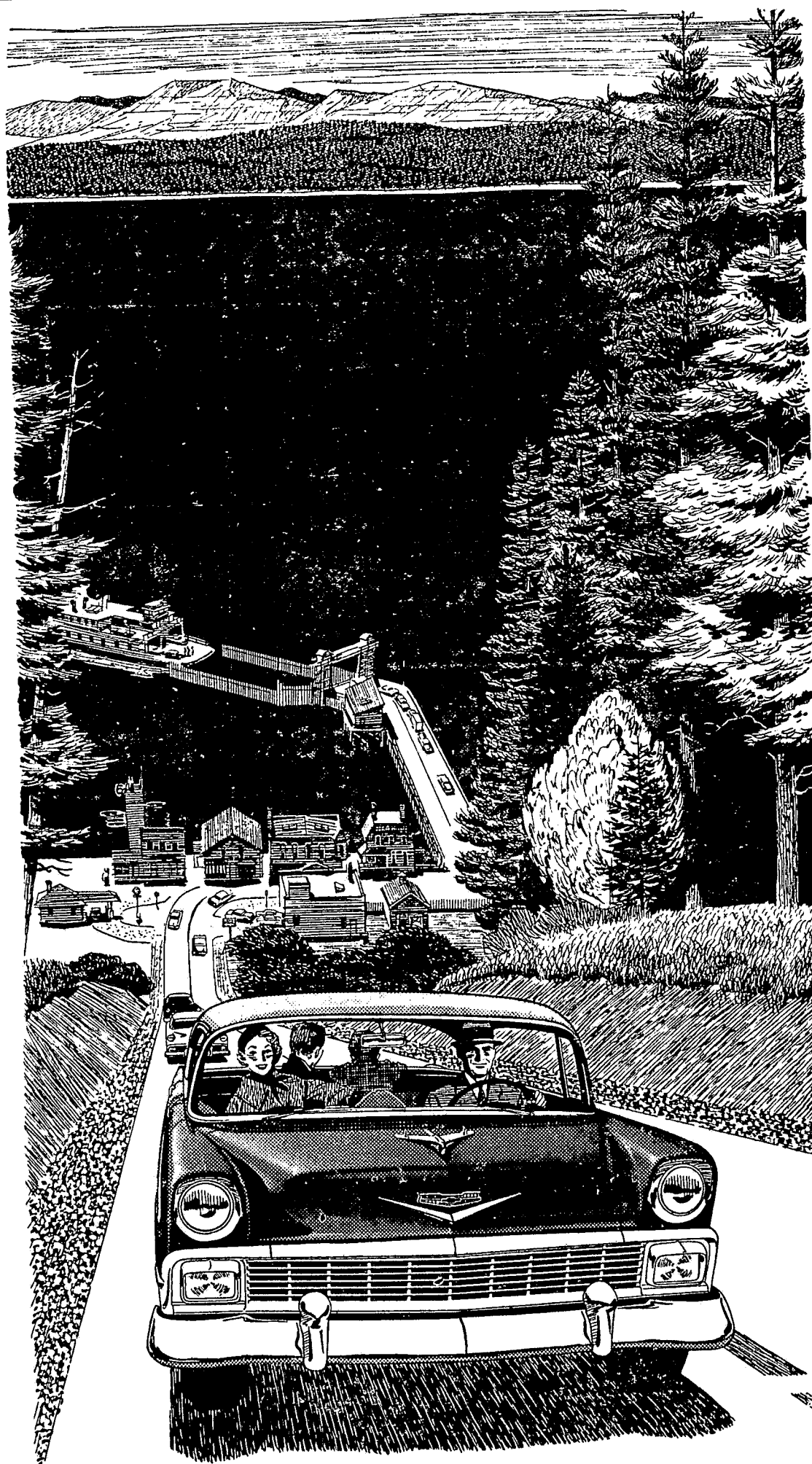
