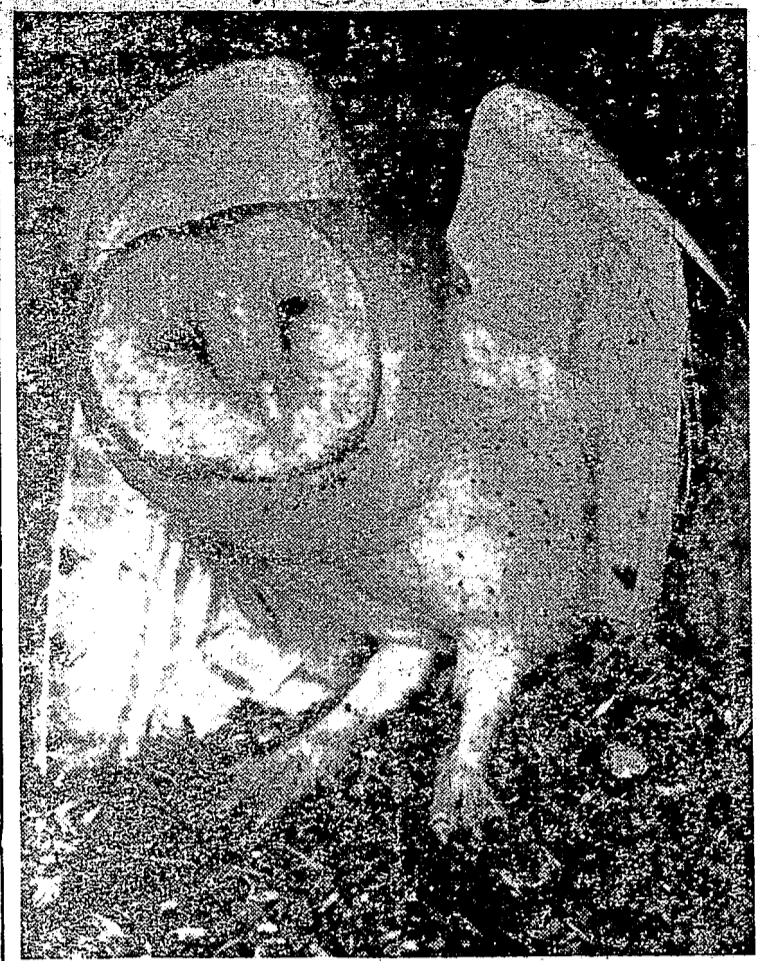

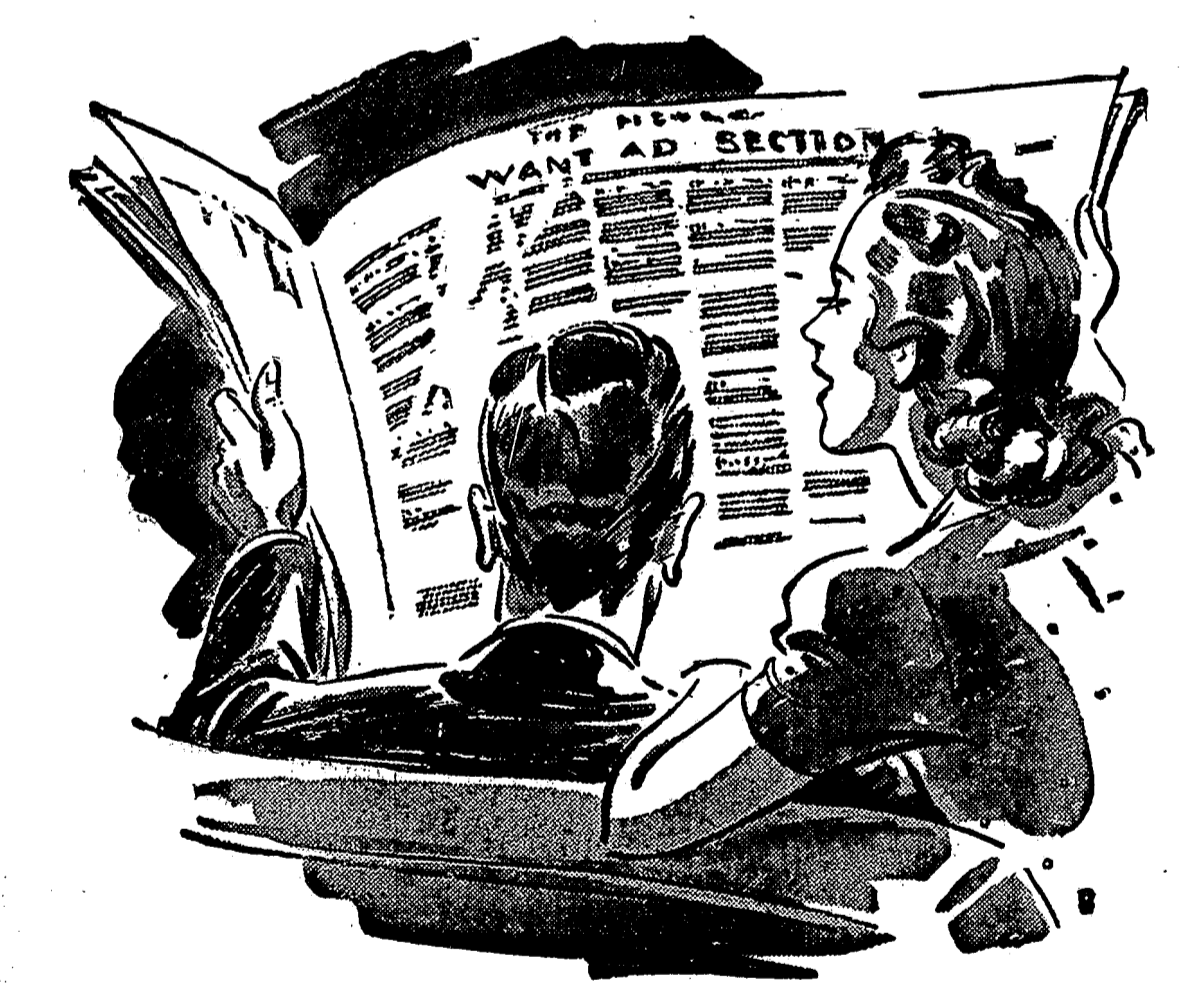

1955-56 WOLVES

The 1955-56 edition of the C. H. S. basketball team is composed of 4 seniors, 4 juniors and 3 sophomores.

Seniors are Doug Fortin, Clyde Kizer, Bill Shanks and Fred Vess.

Juniors include John Holser, Chuck Passage, Robert Rader and George Lang.

The three sophomores are Dave Gaddis, Dick Lippert and LeRoy Parks.

The team's record this year has not been too impressive but they have played a lot of exciting ball.

Losing to Ortonville and Water-

ford by only 2 and 3 points respectively and winning over Brighton by 2 and leading Oxford by only 1 point at the ¾ mark shows what kind of game you can expect from this scrapping team.

Doug Fortin, Clarkston's tallest returning letterman at 5 feet 11 inches, is a consistent, although not a high, scorer. His rebounding and consistent hitting of 1 out of every 3 shots from the floor gives Mr. Mauti, the head coach, something to count on and more than makes up for his very poor free average. He has a total of 30 points so far this season.

Clyde Kizer has been plagued with an inability to hit from the floor, so far this season. His fine floor play and playmaking are better than last year's and we expect Clyde's shooting to improve. Total points, 11.

Bill Shanks has seen limited action but shows improvement and should help the team more as the year progresses.

Fred Vess is a junior but as he started school late he will be ineligible next year and so is considered a senior. Fred is a fine defensive as well as offensive player and has been high scorer in 3 of Clarkston's 5 games. Fred is the most consistent player at the free throw line that Clarkston has. He has the second highest total points so far this season, at

51. John Holser has been having academic troubles and has been ineligible so far this season.

Chuck Passage has been hitting well on his jump shots and adds to Clarkston's height and

rebounds. He does very little shooting but still has a total of 8 points for the 3 games in which he has seen action.

Robert Rader also has seen very limited action but is improving and should see more action as the year progresses.

George Lang is Clarkston's work-horse and in the absence of Clyde Kizer does most of the playmaking. His consistent hitting from the free throw line and on his outside shots made him the only Wolf to score 20 or more points in one game this year when he collected 28 in the Oxford game. His is the highest total this year—65 points!

Dave Gaddis is a new boy but has been working out well at his guard position.

Dick Lippert, the tall man of the team, is being groomed for a starting position and has looked good in the limited action he has seen.

LeRoy Parks has been as outstanding as ever where his dribbling is concerned but has not been hitting from the floor or the free throw line as well as last year. He has dropped from having one

of the highest free throw averages to having one of the lowest. Still he has a total of 37 points.

Florida can look forward to a seven percent gain in visitors from Michigan this season, according to Harry N. Rogan, Automobile Club of Michigan travel services director.

Rogan estimates that nearly 100,000 Michigan cars, each carrying an average of three passengers, will head for the Sunshine State. Drivers will find a small increase in roundtrip costs over last year due to slight rises in accommodation prices and car operating costs.

Average roundtrip driving costs, including meals and accommodations, for a trip to Miami, amounts to just over \$200 for a couple from Detroit. Two children can go along for another \$65.00.

The trip to Miami, including some sightseeing time, can be made comfortably in four days on either of two popular routes.

The eastern or "direct route" runs 1,425 miles from Detroit to Miami and includes some mountain driving. Mountainous sections of Kentucky and Tennessee are occasionally icy in midwinter.

The western route is about 125 miles longer but is flatter and takes only 35 minutes longer to drive than the eastern road.

Fewer detours than usual will be found this year. A detour on secondary roads off Ind.-3, south of Fort Wayne, will actually save two miles while the detour off US-431 in Alabama adds five miles. The only detour on the eastern route is off Florida-100 south of Lake City and also adds five miles.

Rogan foresees increased numbers of Michiganders flying to Florida due to recent improvements in air service which added flights and shortened flying time.
