Mr. and Mrs. J. L. VanWagoner of Andersonville Road are on an extended southern trip.

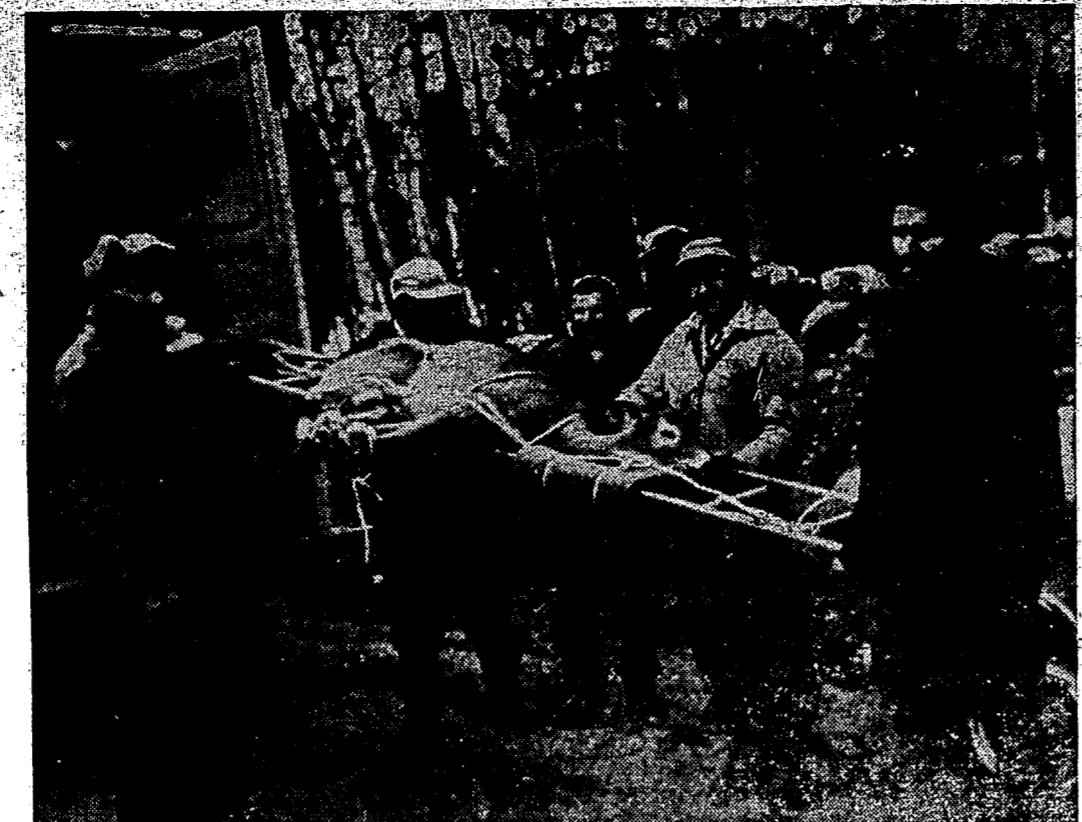
Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Lehman will observe their 31st wedding anniversary on January 26th.

PHONE COMPANY USES MOBILE DIAL TELEPHONE

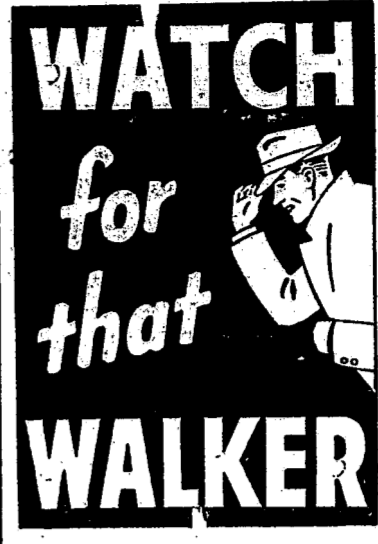
For the first time in its history the Michigan Bell Telephone Company has been using a mobile dial telephone exchange to help meet pressing demands for telephones on a temporary basis while permanent facilities were being constructed.

The dial switching equipment was installed in a 40-foot box trailer which may be readily moved from one location to another throughout the state as facilities shortages develop.

Up to 400 two-party customers have been served from the exchange providing telephones for about 380 Garden City customers pending completion of new permanent facilities early in March.

The portable exchanges may also be used for Civil Defense purposes or during emergencies of fires, tornadoes, and other

disasters when a community's regular telephone service is disrupted.

CLARKSTON RETAINS; LAKERS' 2ND PLACE

Clarkston retains 2nd place in the Wayne-Oakland League by easily defeating West Bloomfield 73-53 only to lose in 3 days later 66-64 to Clarenceville. The Lakers jumped to an early 6 point lead but in the closing minutes of the quarter Clarkston hit 5 quick baskets in a row, 3 of them free throws, to put the score at the quarter 12-11 West Bloomfield.

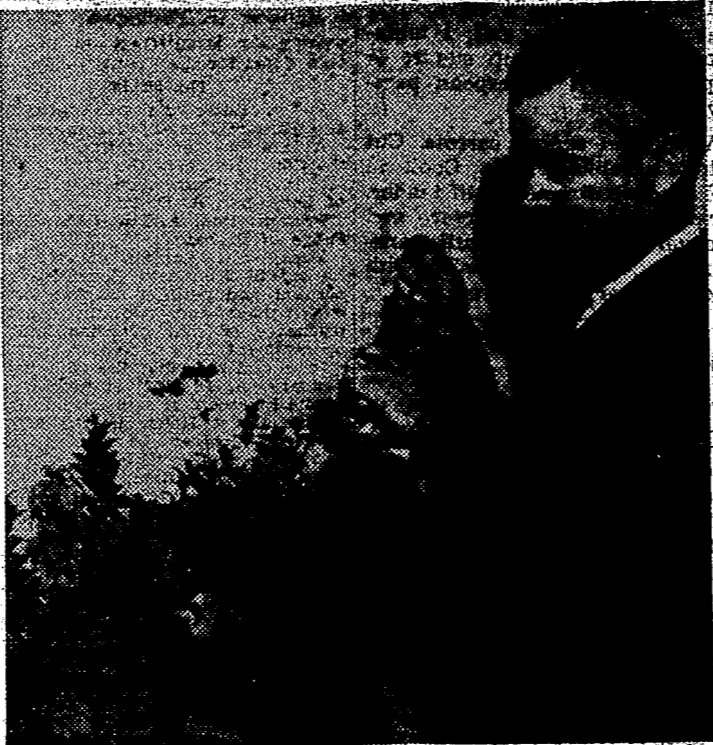
Clarkston's strategy was evident from the first, being to pull the Lakers' man to man defense apart and allow Leroy Parks and George Lang to drive in for a dog shot. In this manner 63% of Clarkston's points were scored. Also encouragement came as Clyde Kizer seemed to be about at the end of his shooting slump, augmenting his usual good floor play with 10 points. Leroy Parks had 25 points for Clarkston and George Lang, 19, but game honors went to Frank Rogers of West Bloomfield with 28.

The Wolves lost possession of second place to Clarenceville in a fast-moving, well-played game. Although Clarkston held a 13-11 edge at the end of the first quarter, but were unable to compete with Clarenceville's accuracy in the 2nd quarter and when the dust settled at the end of the half Clarenceville led 32-27. Clarenceville hit 50% of its shots from the floor and 71% of their free throws in out-scoring Clarkston 21-14 in the 2nd quarter.

Riddling had already shown himself to be Clarenceville's big gun, scoring all but 11 of the Trojans' 32 points. Clarkston, although outshining their taller foes under the basket rebounding, were unable to match the Trojan accuracy. During the 3rd quarter Clarenceville hit 62% of their shots from the floor. Clarkston was hitting 50% of their shots and cut 2 points off of Clarenceville's lead.

Clarkston fought hard to take possession of the lead during the 4th quarter but Riddling again thwarted the Wolves by hitting 6 shots in a row good for 10 points and by stalling the ball for the last minute. Although Clarkston managed to tie up the Clarenceville players and get a jump-ball called twice and finally did get possession of the ball in the closing seconds, the shot

SUCCESSFUL CONVENTION CLOSED SUNDAY

Nineteen hundred attended the closing sessions Sunday of Jehovah's Witnesses three-day convention held in the Pontiac Senior High School. The principal speaker was Mr. M. S. Allen of Brooklyn, New York, Midwest district supervisor and representative of the Watchtower Society. He spoke Sunday afternoon on the subject: "Overcoming the Fears of This Generation". "Fear has blanketed mankind", said Mr. Allen, "and holds it with an octopus-like grip. It is the tragedy of our times. But as we turn to the Bible we learn there is a five-fold, time-proved, time-tested way to conquer and dispel the smog of fear. Fear of Jehovah God counteracts fear of man and devil. True knowledge arms against fear. Faith in God and truth is necessary to fight fear. Perfect love and devotion to God overcome fear. Finally, association with other fearless people; the New World Society. Thus can fear be overcome."

Saturday afternoon, the high school pool was the scene of a mass baptism. Fifty-one candidates were baptized in water, symbolizing their dedication to do God's will. They will take up the ministerial work of Jehovah's Witnesses.

The three-day convention just held in Pontiac is a typical "Circuit Assembly", held twice each year in every group or "circuit"

of 25 congregations. There are 18,044 congregations in 160 lands the world-over. Each year, in addition, a district or national convention is held, and every 3 or 4 years, international conventions. Yankee Stadium was the scene of the last international convention in 1953 with 165,000 from 97 lands attending.

Thus the Witnesses literally follow the admonition of the Apostle Paul at Hebrews 10:25: "not forsaking the assembling of yourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another; and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching." No national or racial divisions exist among Jehovah's Witnesses. All see eye to eye on scriptural questions, using the Bible as their sole authority.

To improve in their preaching and discipling work is of major concern to each of Jehovah's Witnesses. At their assemblies and conventions they receive further intensive training to improve their effectiveness. That is, then, one major reason why they have these assemblies.

FOOD SCOOP

Meat prices have declined steadily since September and are now at their lowest levels in years!

BEEF—Although pork still wears the smallest price tags, beef is at the lowest price it has been in many years, and the average family's income will buy more tender, top-quality beef right now than ever before.

PORK—It's difficult to believe that the pork market could continue to go lower, but it has dropped again this past week!

LAMB & VEAL—Fed lamb is an excellent value! Prices on

meat from the mature animals are as low as they have been in a couple of years and they are expected to remain so through early spring.

EGGS—The price of eggs has dropped in the past week. Supplies of large Grade A eggs are ample, but not abundant, while medium Grade A eggs are in excellent supply.

VEGETABLES - Vegetables are in the spotlight for exceptionally low prices this year! Because of a heavy harvest and larger supply being shipped in the past few days, prices on head lettuce are very low.

FRUITS—More and more citrus variety is beginning to show up on the fruit counters at lower prices. In the past 10 days, prices of California navel oranges have steadily decreased, and the refreshing flavor of Florida oranges and grapefruit should also be popular with their low costs.

FRANKFURTER CASSEROLE 8 frankfurters, 1 medium-sized onion, minced; 1/4 cup butter; 1/2 cup flour; 3 cups canned tomatoes; 3 cups diced, cooked carrots; 3 tablespoons ketchup; salt and pepper.

Split frankfurters and arrange split side down in greased casserole. Sauté onion in butter until slightly browned, stir, in flour; gradually stir in tomatoes and cook until thickened.

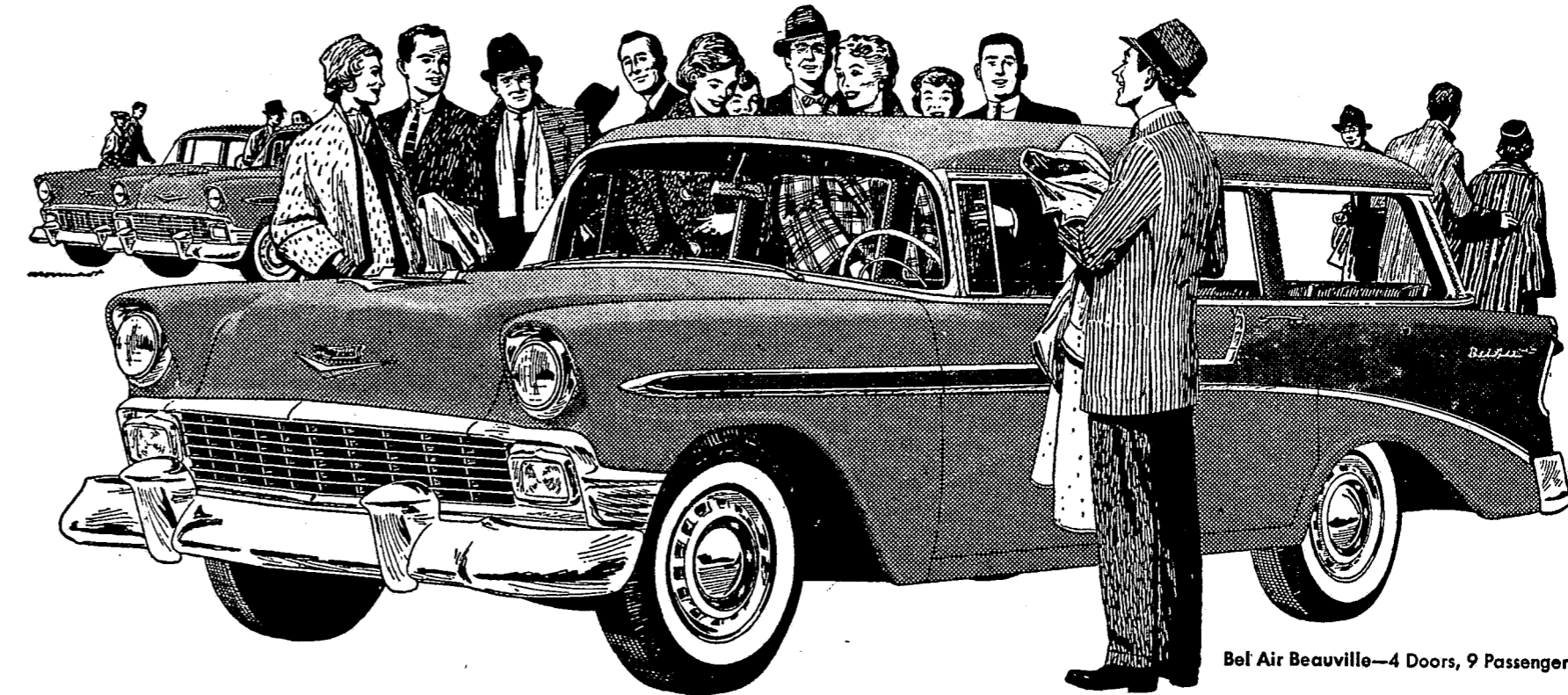

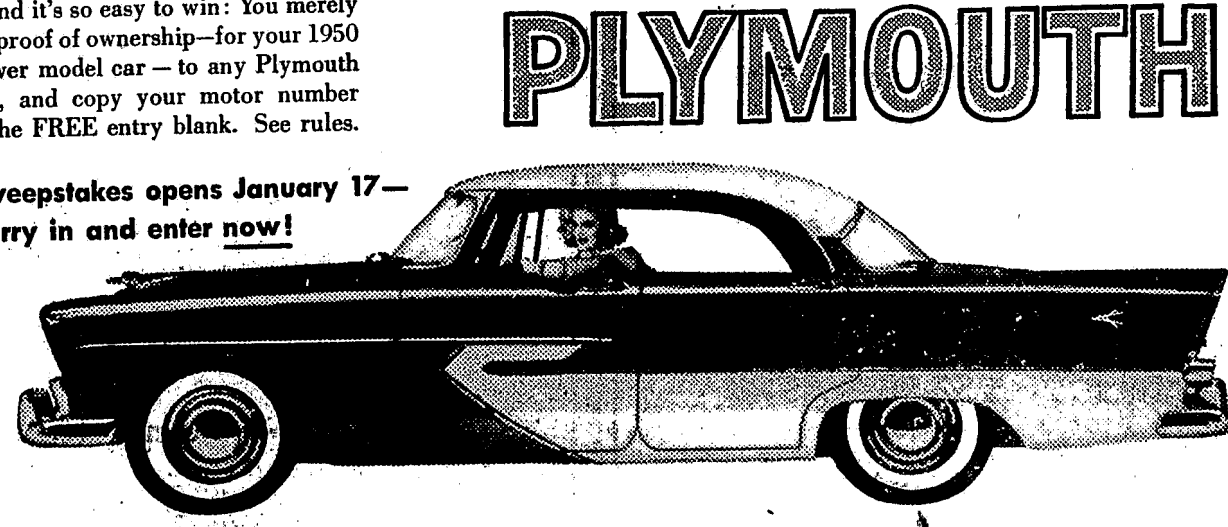

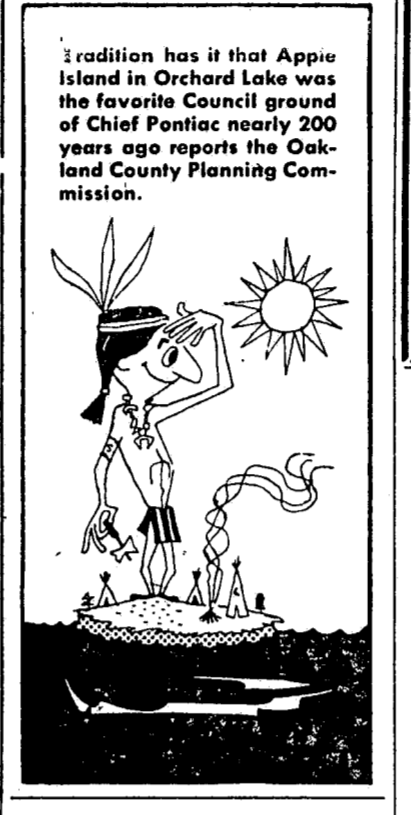
