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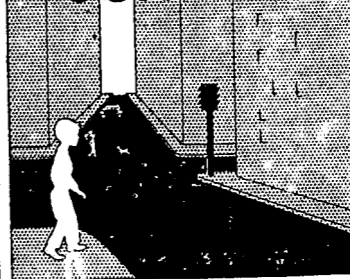
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Mrs. Smith reports some people asking for health department help in fighting off fat worry about calorie-counting, but shrug off exercise and by-pass needed proteins, minerals and vitamins. "Too many people", she says, "eat sparingly, then loll about and wonder why the waistline keeps expanding. Weight control depends on balancing food intake with energy output."

The health department nutritionist also says that even a good calorie-regulated meal falls short of nutrition if it lacks needed proteins, minerals and vitamins.

"Calories are a yardstick to measure energy in food", Mrs. Smith explains. "But you can regulate calories and short yourself on protein which you need for all body tissues and good muscle tone, or minerals which you need for bones and teeth."

Warning that, "A homemade reduction diet may be worse than a few added pounds", Mrs.

Smith said the health department is glad to assist with weight control, "but serious dieting to lose weight is a matter you should take up with your own doctor."

A repellent on valuable trees and shrubs is a cheap, effective way to prevent damage by rabbits.

A thousand persons die every year in the U. S. as a result of accidental electrocution, says a Michigan State University safety specialist.

A lawn you can plant and forget is still just a dream in Michigan, says M. S. U. turf specialists. Merion bluegrass, Kentucky blue, the red fescues and bent-grasses are still best for Michigan lawns.

NEW SIGNS ON MICHIGAN HIGHWAYS

If you drive over 65 miles per hour in Michigan after midnight Thursday (February 2), you will be breaking one of the State's newest laws. E. S. Matheson, general manager of Automobile Club of Michigan, advises motorists. The law, passed in a special session of the Michigan legislature, states that maximum speed limits throughout the state shall be 65 miles per hour during the daylight hours and 55 miles per hour at night unless otherwise posted.

To help acquaint drivers with the new speed regulations, Auto Club's safety and traffic division has prepared over 8,000 posters outlining the law. Copies are being mailed to gasoline stations throughout the state while counter cards, bearing the same design, will be displayed at all Auto Club division offices.

The Michigan State Highway Department has come out with a new reflectorized sign to warn motorists against exceeding the new limits, Matheson reports. The signs, featuring black letters on a field of white, are the regular 20 by 30 inch size. They are

treated with special reflectorized paint, however, so that the warning of a 65 mile limit during the day will change to 55 miles at night under the glare of auto headlights. The signs will be spaced at six-mile intervals over the southern part of the state and at 10 mile intervals in less heavily traveled northern areas.

RESERVE ENLISTMENTS INCREASE

The Chief, Michigan Military District, Fort Wayne, Detroit, reports a sudden increase in volunteers for the new 8-year Reserve enlistment program. This program calls for only 6 months active duty.

The reason for this sudden upsurge in 8-year Reserve enlistments is attributed to mid-year high school graduation exercises. Many high school graduates wish to enroll in college for the fall term. By taking only six months active duty, these men have the opportunity of completing their active duty military obligation before entering college this fall.

Thus far, 80 percent of all Michigan Reserve enlistments have been in the 8-year category. But it is estimated that the 8-year plan totals for January and February will constitute 80 percent of the total Reserve enlistments.

Without any active duty confronting them, these men are better able to plan their future college and professional career without further interruption, so long as they satisfactorily participate with their local Reserve unit.

On Feb. 2 at 8 P. M. in the Chapter House on Franklin Blvd in Pontiac, Dr. John S. Lambie, medical director for Oakland County Civil Defense will speak to the group on the revised med-

ical plan for Oakland County. Dr. Lambie will explain why civil defense is no longer a "duck and cover" problem. He will tell how population will be warned and evacuated and will explain the plan for moving hundreds of thousands of persons from Wayne to Oakland and Macomb counties.

Bernice McGee, RN of Lansing, field representative of Red Cross in Michigan will speak on techniques of caring for the sick in the home at the March 1 meeting to be held at 8 P.M. at the Chapter House. Mrs. Isabell Bayley of Pontiac will be in charge of the meeting.

Ways of improving the work of the chapter's Holiday Highway Patrol will be learned at the April 5 meeting when a panel composed of Herbert Staley, Pontiac Chief of Police, Frank Irons, Oakland County Sheriff and a representative of the Michigan State Police will provide the program.

This meeting will also be attended by members of the Amateur Radio Relay League of Pontiac which works with the Holiday Highway Patrol on the county's highways on Memorial Day, July 4 and Labor Day. David Warshaw of Pontiac is program chairman for the club.

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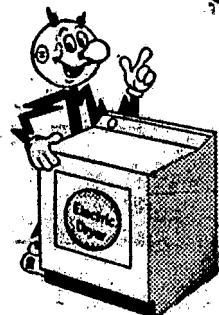
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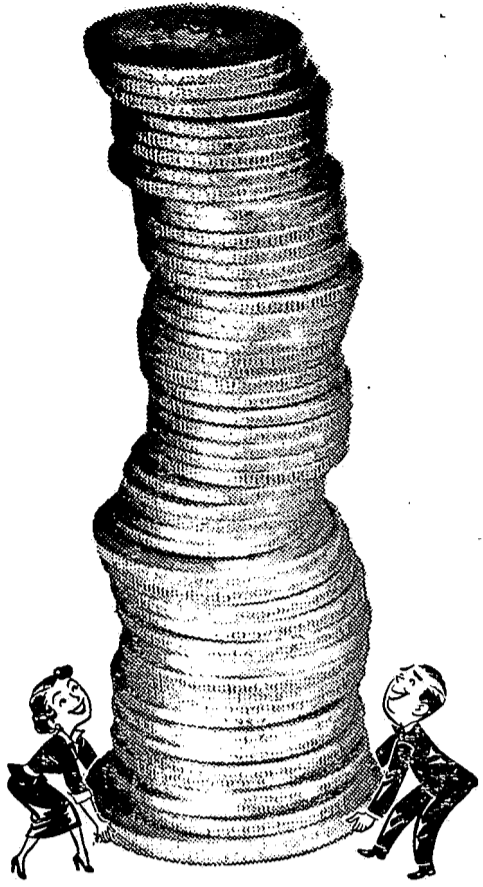

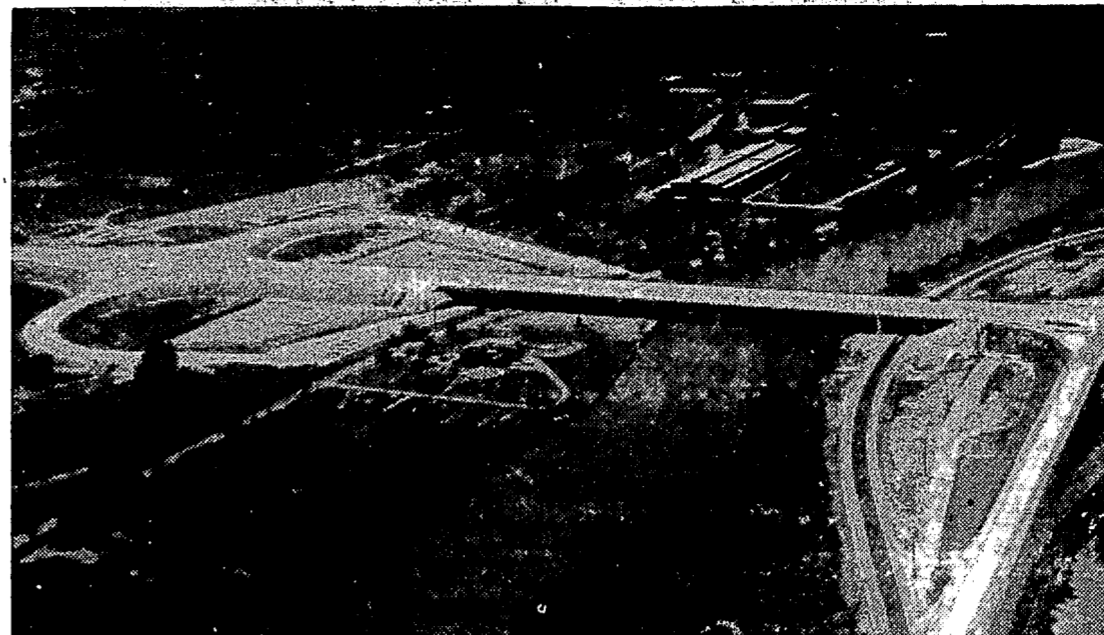

TOLEDO-NORTH EXPRESSWAY PROGRESSES



The above bridge recently completed across the Raisin River in Monroe will carry traffic through the east section of the city on the Toledo-North free expressway. This bridge is one of 34 bridges and grade separation structures on this limited access route which stretches for 24 miles. This four-lane divided highway is being built at a cost of some \$27,000,000 in federal, state and City of Monroe funds.

The first contract on this route was let in the

spring of 1953. The total job will be open to traffic in the early Fall of 1956 and will ultimately connect with the projected Detroit-Chicago Expressway.

The four-lane divided extension of this Interstate highway to the north with temporary connection to Telegraph Road and the four-lane divided connection with Fort Street at Sibley Road will also be opened to traffic by early Fall of 1956.

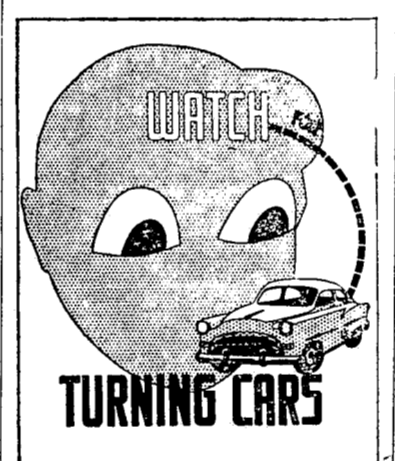
