Chairman Named For Easter Seals

One of Clarkston's prominent civic leaders will act as area chairman of the 1956 Easter Seal Campaign to help crippled children, L. C. Megee, president of the Oakland County Society for Crippled Children, the Easter Seal Society, announced.

He is F. E. Davies of the Clarkston Rotary Club and member of the Society's board of directors. Gar A. Sweezy, well known throughout the county, was again appointed Easter Seal Chairman, a post which he has held for several years.

Named at a recent meeting of the Society's Easter Seal Committee, Davies will spearhead the annual appeal as area chairman for Clarkston, leading efforts to maintain and promote greater services for the crippled.

Immediately launching plans for the campaign opening, March 10th, Davies said he was "greatly honored to be named area chairman of such a vital effort in the community." "However," he stated, "the success of the cause lies not with one man nor with one committee, but with the helping hands of all persons interested in the well being of crippled children."

Residents of Oakland County have made possible the purchase of wheel chairs, braces and crutches, doctors' examinations, x-rays, dental care for the physically handicapped child, a free cerebral palsy diagnostic clinic, a 2-week camping program and many other services provided by the Society through generous contributions to previous Easter Seal appeals. It is their job to maintain these services and to see that more children are reached by this great organization which this year makes 35 years of service to the crippled.

A new kind of chocolate pie is always exciting to serve, and this recipe, combining coconut with chocolate in a chiffon filling bears out the rule handsomely—to everyone's pleasure!

CHOCOLATE COCONUT CHIFFON PIE

- 1 envelope (1 tablespoon) gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate
- 1 cup milk
- 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 cups tender-thin flaked coconut (toasted, if desired)
- 2 egg whites, unbeaten
- 1/2 cup whipping cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 baked 9-inch pie shell

Combine gelatin and cold water; mix well. Add chocolate to milk and heat in double boiler. When chocolate is melted, beat with egg beater until blended. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Combine egg yolks, salt, and 1/3 cup of the sugar. Add hot chocolate mixture slowly, stirring until blended. Chill until mixture begins to thicken.

Meanwhile, cut fine 1 cup of the coconut. Beat egg whites until foamy throughout; add remaining sugar, about 2 tablespoons at a time, beating after each addition until sugar is blended. Then continue beating until mixture will stand in peaks. Whip cream until stiff. Fold egg whites, whipped cream, vanilla, and cut coconut into chocolate mixture. Pour into cold pie shell. Sprinkle with remaining coconut. Chill until firm.

Leaving from New York, the tour is priced reasonably using Swissair's Family Fare Plan.

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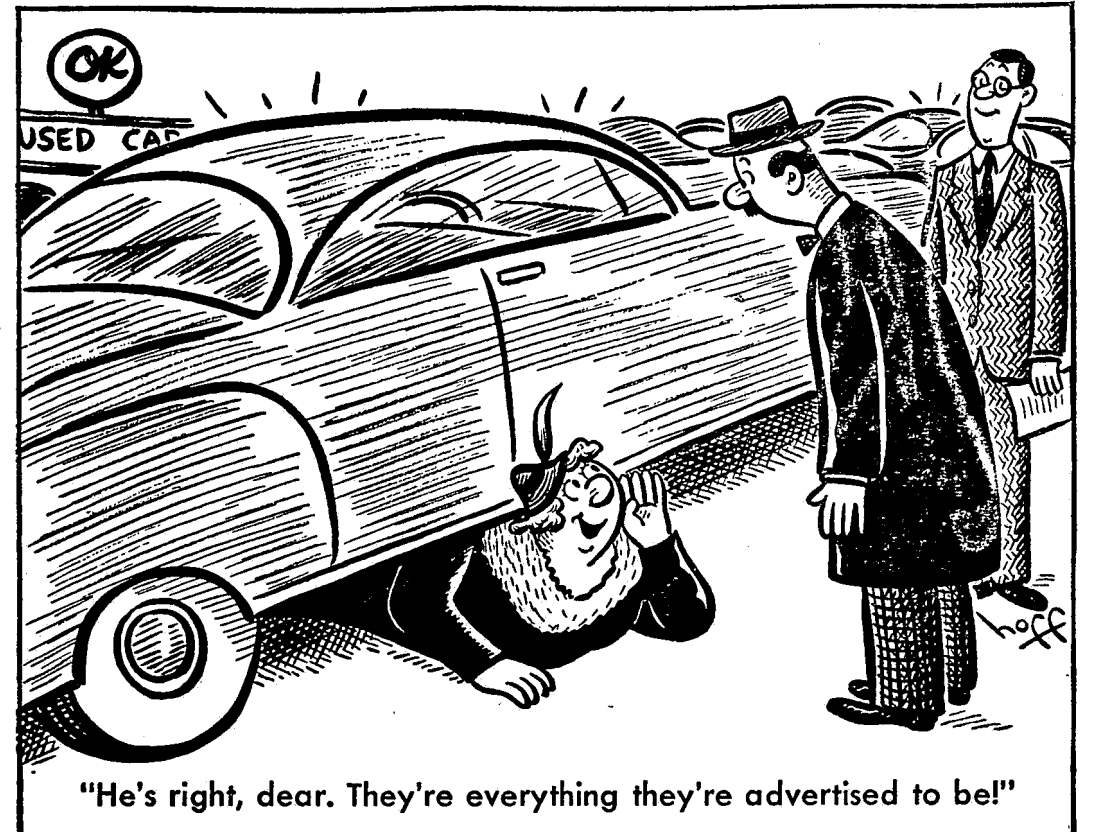
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
