Mr. and Mrs. August Jacober are on their way home from 3 months in Arizona. They are expected back in Waterford on Friday.

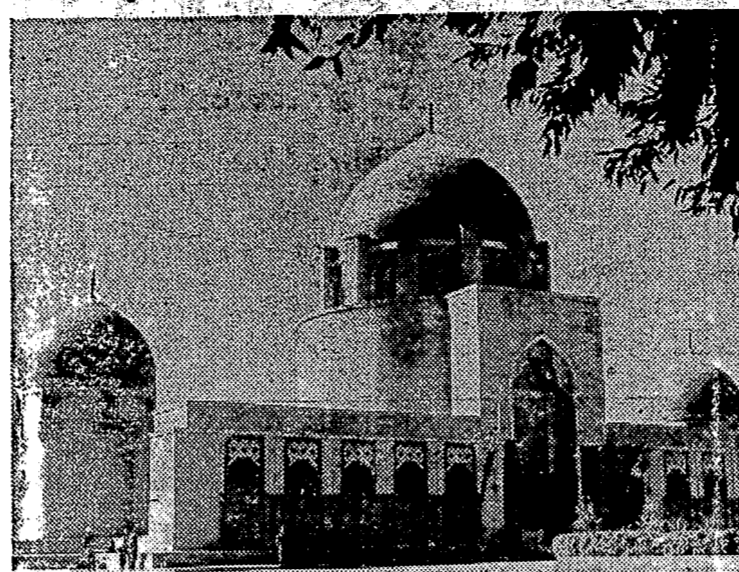

PIONEER YOUTHS PLAYED 'SOLDIERS' IN MOCK BATTLE

"Soldiers-and-Indians" was a popular game with Michigan's small fry back in the 1830's when Black Hawk was on the war path, according to some reminiscences in The University of Michigan Historical Collections.

The Reverend Barton Taylor as a child pioneered with his parents as settlers on land now in Plymouth, Michigan. He describes how he and the boys he played with were impressed by reports that Black Hawk and his Indian warriors were coming to destroy all white people.

He writes: "The governor issued a proclamation ordering the militia of the territory to assemble in their respective

pamped in a certain piece of woods and we must surround and capture them. We signified our readiness to obey orders. We were armed with wooden swords, and sticks for guns, a tin pan for a drum, and a piece of calico tied to a stick for a flag."

The Reverend Taylor recalls: "We marched up to a large hollow oak tree and formed a semicircle around it. Stepping up to the tree, he thrust his sword into the hollow and twisted it around furiously.

"Well, something did come out. They were all dressed in yellow coats striped in black, had wings, and were armed with sharp lances which they knew well how to use.

"When the boys saw the yellow jackets pouring out, most of them broke ranks and ran in a panic. The captain turned to run but seeing one little boy stand-

ing squarely in front of the hole vigorously whipping with a handful of brush, he thought it would not do for him to run so he turned and stood beside the little boy and fought it out."

He concludes: "What the wasps' was not stung."

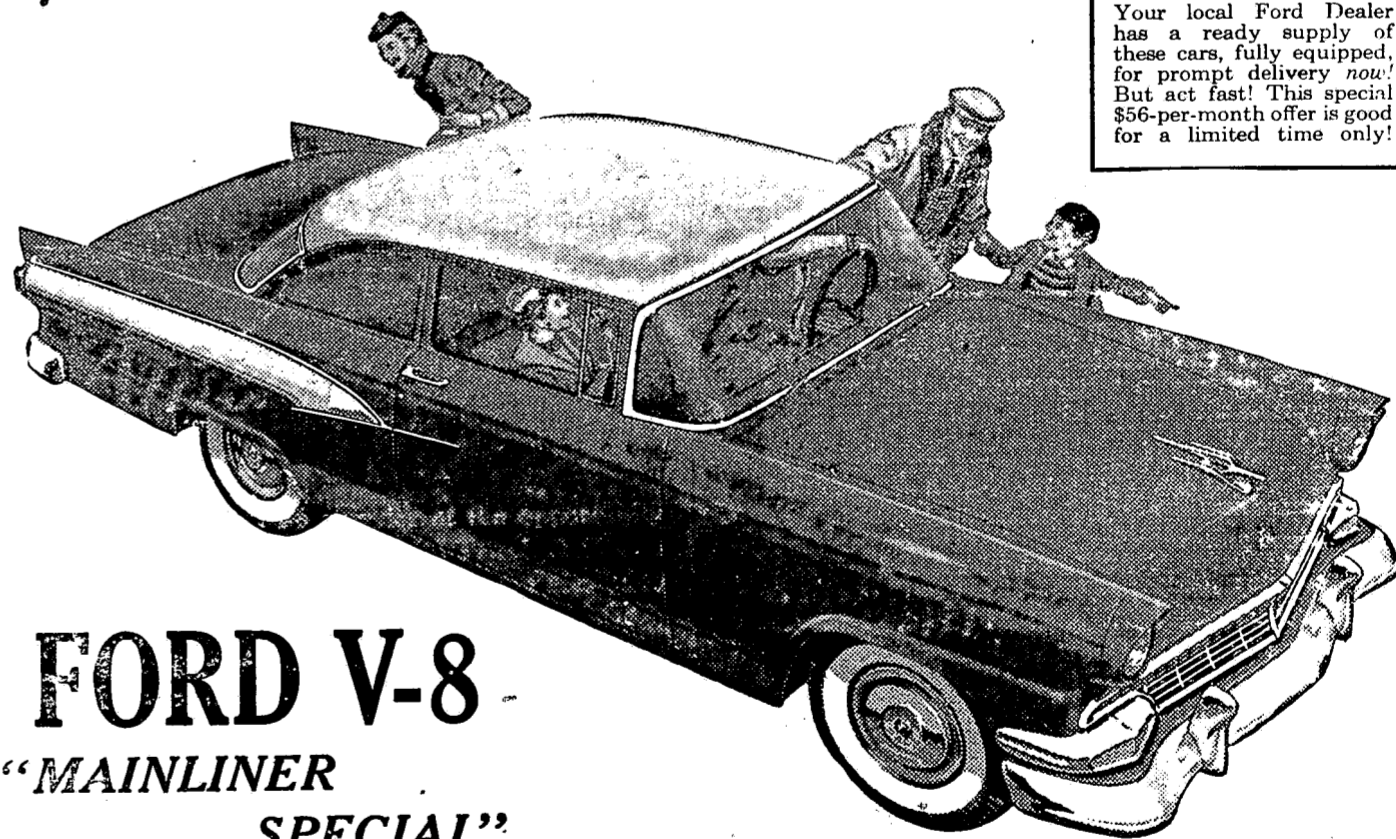

NOT SO EAGER BEAVER, SAYS U-M PROF.

Does the eager beaver ever goof off? "Yes," answers George Hunt, instructor in wildlife management at The University of Michigan.

"The beaver—other than man the cleverest engineer among Michigan mammals—constructs his dam chiefly of small sticks and mud mixed with a few rocks."

"Dams are usually three to four feet in height and fifty to two hundred feet in length," Hunt continues.

He explains that all members of the colony, except the small kits (baby beavers), help keep the dam in repair so that a uniform water level is maintained in the pond.

wolves and foxes. "Back of the dam in the relatively deep water of the impoundment is the lodge—an ancestral home which may be used for many years," Hunt says.

He states that beaver impoundments are valuable for water fowl use—principally for raising of broods. They are also valuable to man insofar as they create water reservoirs which can be drawn upon in case of forest fires.

Reverse side of the picture is that beavers have sometimes had to be live-trapped out of an area in order to stop damage due to flooding of highways or farm lands.

ADVICE FROM MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

While it may not be wise to shut your children indoors at the first sign of a sniffle, the Michigan Department of Health today cautioned that an illness

starting out like a cold may turn out to be scarlet fever or strep throat, which can result in serious damage.

Dr. F. S. Leeder, director of disease control for the state health department, reports that as of the end of February, the state's score was 1,616 new cases of strep throat and scarlet fever, compared with 1,058 cases in the same two months last year.

"All we can do," Dr. Leeder said, "is to repeat the same advice we've been giving every time a parent calls us on this. If your child has an illness which hangs on for more than 48 hours, or seems to be particularly severe, with a pronounced sore throat, get in touch with your doctor immediately."

Dr. Leeder said strep throat is among the most dangerous forms of upper-respiratory infection, since it may ignite an attack of rheumatic fever, a leading cause of heart damage in children.

"It's not always possible," he said, "to stop the development of a strep throat or its complications, but if good medical care is given and advice of the doctor is followed, then parents can be assured that they're doing everything in their power to protect their children. We don't recommend that a child be shut in at the first sniffle, but we do strongly urge parents to seek and accept medical advice for any illness which does not respond promptly to bed rest and other medically approved home-care techniques."

The health department specialist added that the current wave of sore throats can be expected to "get worse before it gets better, since infection of this type always rise in March and April."

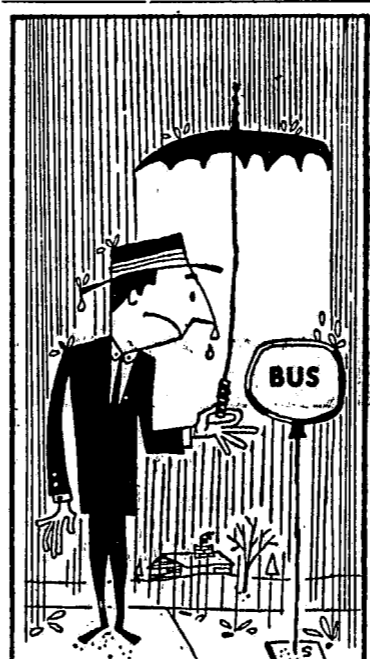

PELLON CAN BE WASHED by Mrs. Frieda A. Bennett Home Demonstration Agent

Mrs. Consumer has been wondering whether to wash or dry clean skirts lined with Pellon. Research specialists at Cornell University have come up with the answer, says Mrs. Frieda Bennett, Home Demonstration Agent for Oakland County. Washed in both an automatic washer and by hand, the material laundered well. However, Pellon did shrink slightly. It is suggested that home seamstresses sew Pellon loosely into seams to prevent puckering after washing. When Pellon is attached only at the waist, such as in underskirts on dresses, it can be sewed more firmly.

Dry cleaning Pellon is a different story, the research studies point out. The samples became very yellow after a few cleanings, and when put away for a few weeks the dry cleaned samples became stiff and "boardy". They did not shrink. The yellowness of such interfacing would be likely to show through in light weight white or light colored materials after a few dry cleanings. Researchers conclude that additional stiffness would be undesirable in some garments.




