#### **Get Ready For** Michigan Week

Donald O'Keefe, mayor of East Grand Rapids, and chairman of change Committee, is urging all for the annual Maybrs swap Donald Pringle. May 21. The committee hopes that the two towns will make their plans together so that the Exchange Day program, in each pair of towns, will be proportionately the same. Visiting mayors, many of whom are accompanied by other civic officials, are usually entertained with tours, parades, banquets and other functions during their day long reign.

Clarkston's president, Russell Coltson will exchange with the president of Sandusky.

Several long-distance swaps resulted in the drawings this year with southern Michigan towns exchanging with Upper Peninsula cities necessitating travels of 500 miles or more. East Lansing's Mayor Max Strother drew the "prize", Detroit, where he will rule for a day while Detroit's Mayor Albert E. Cobp visits East Lansing.

Maxine is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Max W. Harris of Matt-

wan Maxine graduated from Paw Paw high school in 1951 and M. S. U., in 1955 and was an active 4-H Club member for 10 years. She now is Acting Assistant State 4-H Club Leader with the Extension Service.

The two-way exchange, sponsored by the National 4-H Club Foundation and the Extension Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is based on the idea that understanding is the foundation of peace. It is financed by contributions of 4-H Club members, civic clubs, farm organizations, business concerns and foundations. Since its start in 1948, 510 U.S. delegates and 497 foreign youths have participated.







The equipment has been thoroughly tested in field trials and will be utilized to extend telephone service to more farm families throughout Michigan Bell's territory.

Andreasen pointed out that 75 percent of rural establishments in the company's territory now have telephone service compared with 66 percent at the beginning of 1950. The relative telephone gain in rural areas in 1955, he said, actually exceeded that of many urban communities.

Michigan Bell now serves 2,400,000 telephones throughout its territory and currently is gaining more than 12,000 telephones a month.


#### SCIENTIST REPORTS ON WATER SUPPLY PROBLEMS

In this connection, he has cooperated with the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Plan Commission.

Since the problems of water and waste disposal are of vital concern to every industry and resident of southern Michigan, the April 6 meeting has been thrown open to the public, without charge. Dr. Mozola presents his subject on a popular, nontechnical level.



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

The question asked most frequently is: "If I have unused GI training entitlement, can I use it after July 25?"

VA's answer is "No". Under the law, no GI training may be provided after July 25, even though a veteran might have remaining entitlement.

Another question is: 'If a veteran is in the middle of a summer term at school, can he complete it even though it wuld carry him past July 25?"

Here again, VA's answer is 'No", for the law cuts off the program definitely on July 25, and does not make provisions for veterans who may be in mid-

Veterans taking GI correspondence courses have asked Va-'Must I mail my final lesson to the correspondence school before July 25, or must the school send me back my corrected lesson before that date?"

VA's answer is that the veteran must mail his final lesson to the school before midnight, July 25. The school, however, may service the lesson and return it to the veteran afterward.

Still another question is: "If veteran's GI entitlement expires after he has reached the mid-point of a term or semester, he normally is allowed to continue to the end of the term or semester at Government expense. Will this rule still apply, in light of the July 25 termination date?' VA's answer: "It will not." In-
