**SUGGESTIONS FOR HOME GARDENERS**

It may be too early to dig in the garden, but now is the time to begin a Michigan State University telecourse designed to help the home gardener.

"Botany for Home and Garden" is the name of the noncredit telecourse being offered this spring term by the M. S. U. Continuing Education Service. The class will "meet" each Wednesday night from 7:00 to 7:30 over WKAR-TV.

The professor will ring the bell for the opening class on April 11. Dr. Herbert C. Beeskow, who will teach the course, is a member of the botany and plant pathology department. He reports the course will cover mineral nutrition of plants, dormancy and germination of seeds, roots, hormones, pollination and plant structure of flowers and fruits. Interested adults should register

to obtain a study-guide booklet.

This course is one of three being aired this spring term by Michigan State, which began its educational, "University of the Air" in January, 1954. Another noncredit course is offered Friday nights at 7:00 P. M. by Professor Gomer L. Jones in music. A credit course in oral interpretation is presented Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights by Dr. Moiree Compere.

**MICHIGAN BELL PLANS EXPANSION**

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company will spend approximately \$3,500,000 to expand and improve rural service in 1956, Hans P. Andreassen, the company's farm telephone manager announced today.

Expenditures this year will raise the company's total outlay for service on rural areas dur-

ing the postwar period to \$31,500,000.

High on the list of improvements scheduled for this year is the conversion of five of the remaining eight magnet or "crank type" exchanges to dial operation. The remaining three are scheduled to be changed over to dial next year.

A new development, called a "rural carrier system"—so-called because one pair of wires can be used to provide four different circuits—will be inaugurated this year. The equipment has been thoroughly tested in field trials and will be utilized to extend telephone service to more farm families throughout Michigan Bell's territory.

Andreassen pointed out that 75 percent of rural establishments in the company's territory now have telephone service compared with 66 percent at the beginning of 1950. The relative telephone gain in rural areas in 1955, he said, actually exceeded that of many urban communities.

Michigan Bell now serves 2,400,000 telephones throughout its territory and currently is gaining more than 12,000 telephones a month.

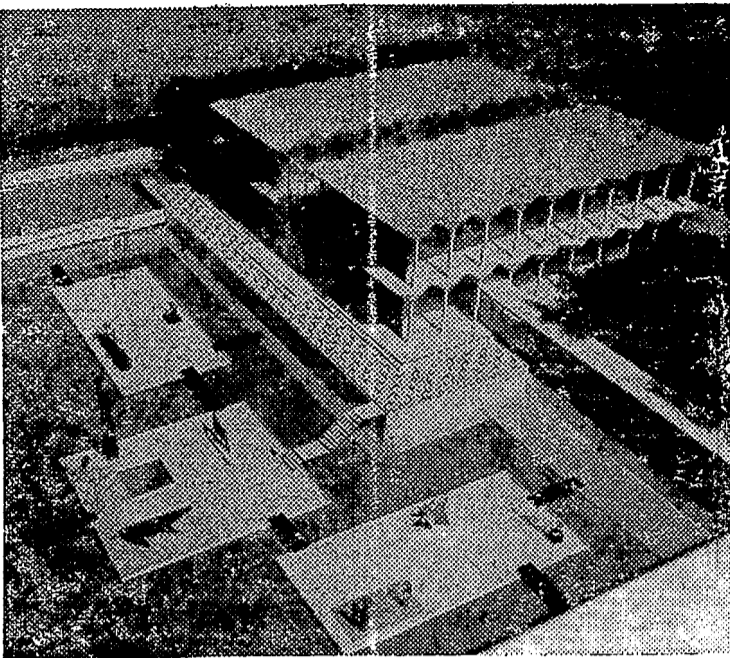
**SCIENTIST REPORTS ON WATER SUPPLY PROBLEMS**

One of Oakland County's most basic problems is to be discussed April 6 at 8:15 p. m. when Cranbrook Institute of Science presents Dr. Andrew Mozola in a talk on "Water Resources and Water Problems of Southeastern Michigan". The talk will be held in Cranbrook School Auditorium.

Dr. Mozola, who is Assistant Professor of Geology at Wayne University, wrote his doctor's thesis on the water problems of Oakland County. In 1948 he worked with the U. S. Geological Survey on the water problems of the Finger Lake district in central New York state, and his published studies in water and waste disposal problems are the most recent and complete for the Oakland County area. In this connection, he has cooperated with the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Plan Commission.

Since the problems of water and waste disposal are of vital concern to every industry and resident of southern Michigan, the April 6 meeting has been thrown open to the public, without charge. Dr. Mozola presents his subject on a popular, non-technical level.

**Wayne U's New Conference Center To House Community Groups**



Community Conference Center

When leaders of a community get together to discuss problems of traffic, housing and juvenile delinquency, there's a good chance that a solution will follow. But community groups often face the limitations caused by inadequate facilities needed to hold these meetings.

A million-dollar Community Conference Center, planned as a part of Wayne's Community Arts Group, will enable the University to serve as the focal point of community activity and as a center for adult education.

Construction is scheduled to begin this spring. The center will be completed by the fall of 1957.

According to Dr. Clarence B. Hilgery, president of Wayne, the center has been given to the University by the McGregor Fund through the Detroit Capital Gifts Committee. It will stand as a memorial to the late Tracy and Katherine McGregor, Detroit leaders in the city's civic, educational, cultural, religious and philanthropic life.

Even though most meats will wear a slightly higher price tag this week, average prices are about 10% lower than the similar week last year. Shorter supplies, due to shorter kills before the Easter holiday, tend to raise prices, says Mrs. Josephine Lawry, Consumer Marketing In-

formation Agent in Pontiac. Pork and beef are in heaviest supply among the red meats. For stretching the budget following Easter festivities, look for ground beef, variety meats, chuck; pork loins, sausage and bacon.

Green and yellow vegetables can put more spring into menus.

At present, the Community Arts Group is in the initial stages of construction. Its design welcomes additions and supplements. The proposed conference center fits smoothly into the plan.

The McGregor Fund's gift also provides for a sculpture to enhance the grounds between the proposed center, the arts building now under construction and the proposed community arts auditorium. A three-story music building, part of the group, is now in use.

Cost of the project including furnishings and equipment is estimated at \$975,000. An additional \$25,000 has been provided for contingencies. Exemplifying some of the group, that may be served are study group of the Parent Teachers Association, and the Taxpayer and Improvement Association, leadership for Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, League of Women Voters and Junior League.

Buck Howell says he and his Missus had quite a time at the Stockman's Convention in Chicago. But for a while they had a "breakdown in communications."

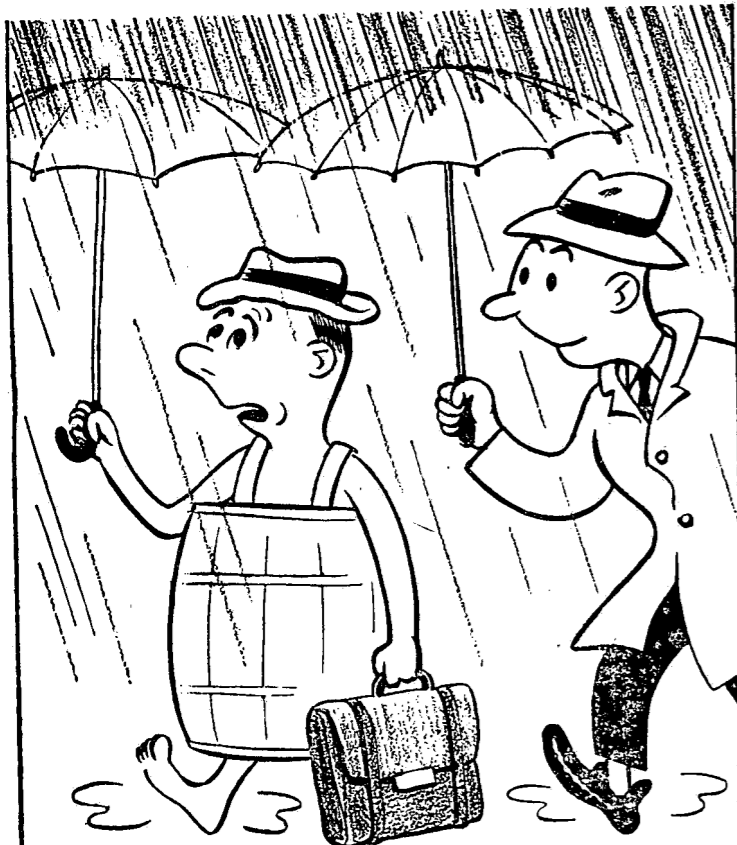

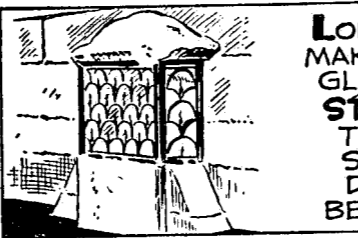

The question asked most frequently is: "If I have unused GI training entitlement, can I use it after July 25?"

VA's answer is "No." Under the law, no GI training may be provided after July 25, even though a veteran might have remaining entitlement.

Another question is: "If a veteran is in the middle of a summer term at school, can he complete it even though it would carry him past July 25?"

Here again, VA's answer is "No," for the law cuts off the program definitely on July 25, and does not make provisions for veterans who may be in mid-course.

Veterans taking GI correspondence courses have asked Va: "Must I mail my final lesson to the correspondence school before July 25, or must the school send me back my corrected lesson before that date?"

VA's answer is that the veteran must mail his final lesson to the school before midnight, July 25. The school, however, may service the lesson and return it to the veteran afterward.

Still another question is: "If a veteran's GI entitlement expires after he has reached the mid-point of a term or semester, he normally is allowed to continue to the end of the term or semester at Government expense. Will this rule still apply, in light of the July 25 termination date?"

VA's answer: "It will not." Instead, the veteran will be permitted to continue his training to July 25—but not beyond.

Finally, veterans have been asking whether the July 25 date applies to all World War II veterans.

VA's reply is that there are a few exceptions.

Veterans who enlisted between October 6, 1945, and October 5, 1946, under the Armed Forces Voluntary Recruitment Act, have nine years from the end of their enlistment period to wind up their training.

All other World War II veterans are subject to the July 25 wind-up of the GI program.

During the life of the World War II GI Bill, approximately 275,000 Michigan veterans—or

**"NO HANDS" PHONE AHEAD FOR KITCHENS**

"Look, kids, no hands!" This may well be what the mothers of five years hence might declare about the "no hands" telephone. While working in the kitchen, all that mother has to do to answer the phone will be to press a small button in the backsplash of the sink counter and a tiny amplifier will allow her to talk and listen without further touching the instrument.

Upon her return from the Electrical Women's Round Table meetings in Chicago, Coral Morris, home management specialist at Michigan State University, tells of a report of the kitchen of tomorrow by Bernice Strawn, home equipment editor of a national magazine. In only a few years, she suggested, everyone will have a television phone of some kind. And, in homes of any size, an amplifying system will be considered standard equipment.

A television screen will be a part of every kitchen, just as radio is part of the equipment in today's kitchen. And speaking of hearing, Miss Morris reports that some of the most elaborate kitchens will have built-in music to provide a pleasant background for family dining.

The lighting of tomorrow's kitchen will be very important. There will be good, glareless work lights, spot lights for special jobs and soft lighting for pleasant, relaxed dining.

Perhaps before 1960 kitchens will be equipped with an area just for small appliances with both the appliances and the backsplashes of the counter so designed that no unwieldy long cords will be necessary. The appliances will be right there—ready and waiting to be used.

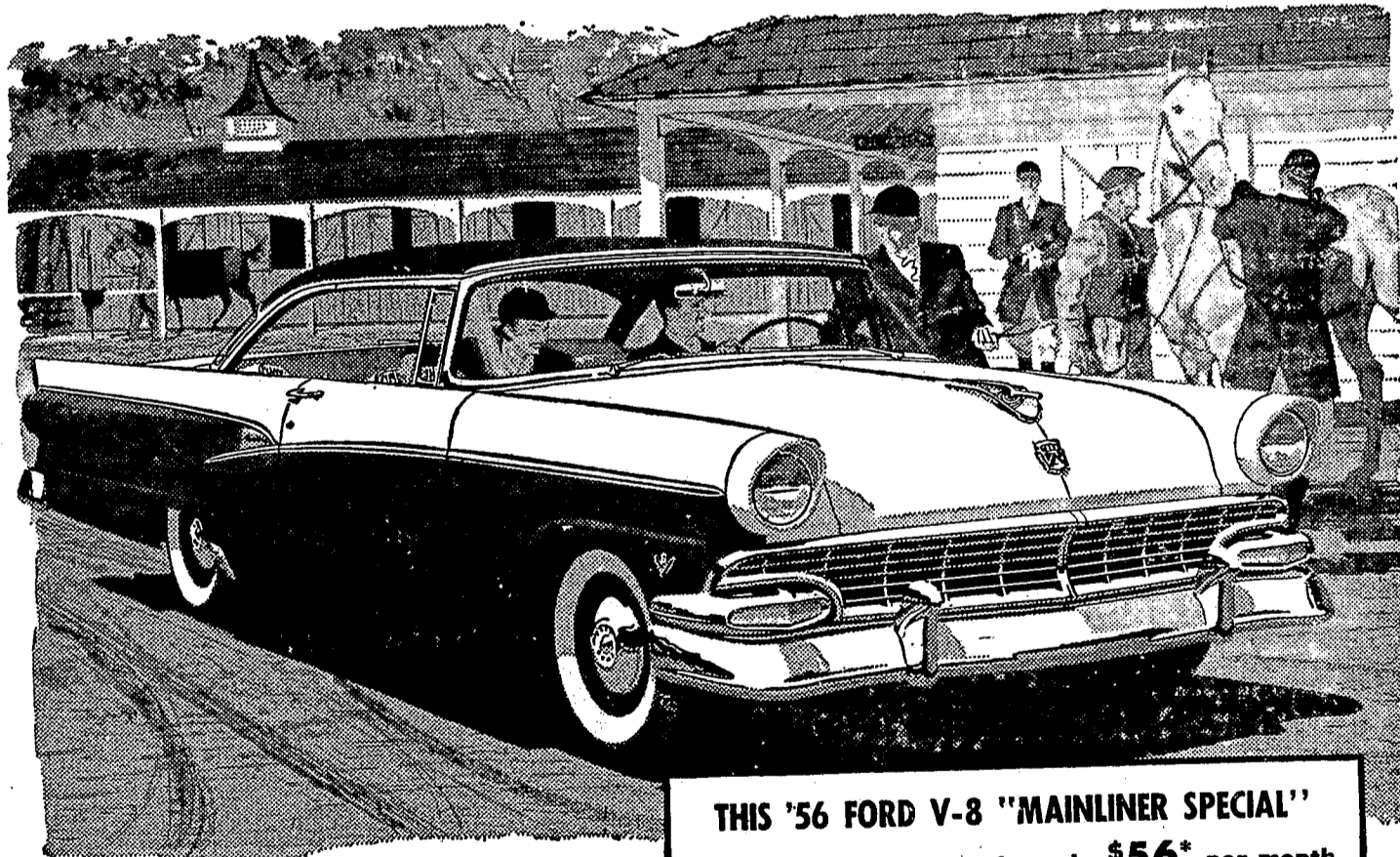
