Mrs. Donald Redmond, cookie sale chairman for the North Oakland Girl Scout Council, is already thanking the communities this week for the splendid response to this year's Cookie Sale, although it does not end until April 15, from 1:00 to 6:00 P. M., April 16. Supplies have been ex- at the home of their son-in-law hausted in spite of a 12% increase in the order. Nearly 8,000 cartons of 12 boxes each were sold.

The North Oakland Council of Girl Scouts is a United Fund Agency but does not receive anything toward maintenance or capital expenses for its resident camp, Camp Sherwood, located north of Lapeer. 85% of the net profits from this sale will be used for Camp Sherwood; 10% for troop camping and 5% for camp scholarships.

The biggest capital expense this year is the purchase of 80 acres adjacent to Camp Sherwood, to be used also for troop camping.

A "Meet The Camp Day" has been scheduled for Sunday, May 6. On that day Camp Sherwood will be open to the public from 11:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M. Picnic lunches may be taken to the Camp but no fires will be allowed. Coffee and soft drinks will be available.

Registrations for camping sessions for girls from 7 to 17 are now being accepted, with Scouts having the priority. The opening week is June 24.
