### Salk Vaccine Slowly Increases

The supply of Salk poliomyelitis vaccine in Oakland County is slowly increasing as had been anticipated, according to Dr. John D. Monroe, Medical Director of the Oakland County Health Department. However, patience and cooperation from parents are still necessary. Vaccine is being released to private physicians to accommodate patients who have been on waiting lists for some time. It is hoped that vaccine will be available for two injections by June 15, 1956, for all who wish it. The so called "polio season" in Oakland County does not begin until mid-July, allowing sufficient time to build antibodies following the injections.

In answer to many queries concerning third booster doses of vaccine, the Michigan State Health Department has requested that all vaccine be used for only the first two injections. The aim is to protect as many children as possible rather than boost immunity levels for a few. Third injections may safely be postponed until an adequate supply is available.

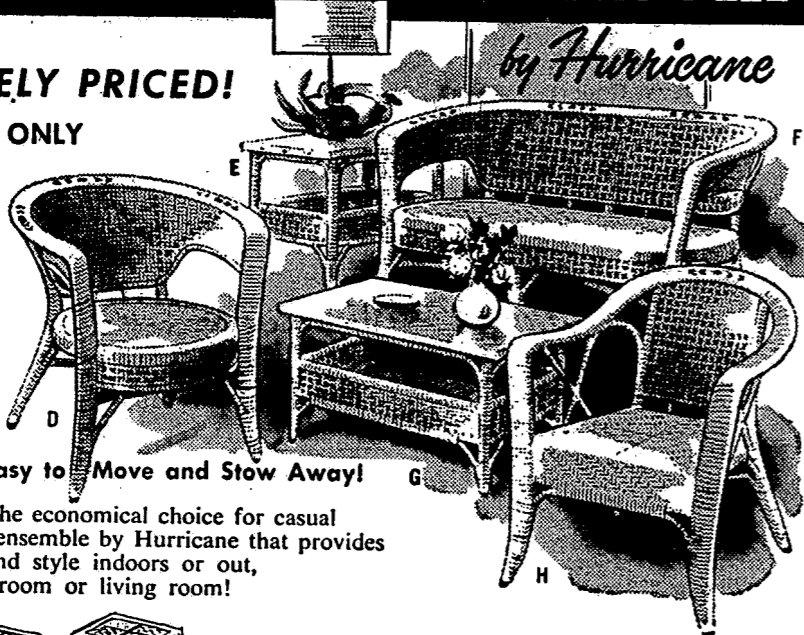

**GOODWILL INDUSTRIES WEEK, May 6 - 12**

Governor G. Mennen Williams today announced that the week of May 6 through May 12 would

be observed officially as Goodwill Industries Week. "Michigan is a leader in the Goodwill Industries national program of rehabilitation of handicapped persons", said the Govern-

nor, "and now has units in six cities, including Detroit, Jackson, Muskegon, Flint, Port Huron and Battle Creek."

"Goodwill Industries is the largest employer of handicapped people in the United States offering jobs regardless of race, color or creed. It hires people with every type of handicap, including amputees, orthopedic cases, arrested TB's, epileptics, cardiac cases, the deaf and the blind. The Goodwill program is a grass-roots movement backed by nearly 1,000,000 householders who annually contribute their useable

discards, and through the cooperation of the public and business and industrial leaders who form the various Boards of Directors, over 22,000 handicapped people have been rehabilitated in Michigan alone since 1921", the Governor said.

**OAKLAND COUNTY TO BE INCLUDED IN EDISON'S EXPANSION PLANS**

Detroit Edison will spend \$8 million in Oakland County, alone, as part of the company's \$95 million 1956 program for expanding and strengthening the electric power supply throughout its service area.

Howard L. Canfield, manager of Edison's Oakland District, said that the \$8 million will be spent for new substations, transmission and distribution lines, service extensions and other projects aimed at keeping the electric power supply in Oakland County well ahead of the steadily increasing demand.

He said the company's system-wide construction program for the year will cost about \$95 million and will provide for continuation of work on the new River Rouge Power Plant at the junction of the Rouge and Detroit rivers; the construction of 34 distribution substations; the building of new transmission and distribution lines; and the expansion of 18 existing distribution stations.

Canfield explained that these additions will help to insure an ample supply of electric power to meet the needs of the 35,000 new customers which the company expects to be serving by the end of the year. The additions will also provide for increased residential, commercial and industrial demands—estimated to be 9 per cent greater than in 1955.

**IDEAS ACQUIRED THROUGH MAYOR'S EXCHANGE DAY**

Kalkaska probably will have a new fire alarm system because of an idea Mayor Russell French got at Hudsonville during a Mayor's Exchange day visit.

Berrien Springs is planning a new water front recreation center similar to the one at Grosse Pointe Farms where R. H. Weine, president of Berrien Springs, was an exchange mayor one year.

Mayors and village presidents report they have picked up doz-

ens of ideas during these exchange visits, and they expect to get more this year during Michigan Week's Exchange of Mayor's Day, May 21.

Mayor Donald O'Keefe of East Grand Rapids, chairman of this year's Mayors Exchange committee, has urged all cities and villages in the state to start planning immediately for the annual "swap".

O'Keefe pointed out that the purpose of the event "is to exchange ideas and information, focus attention on local government, and help communities become better acquainted with one another."

Nearly 500 towns and villages were "paired" with one another in the annual exchange drawing held in Lansing recently. One unique result of the drawing was that no Upper Peninsula town was paired with another. All are exchanging with cities or villages in the lower peninsula.

Some mayors will travel more than 500 miles to switch jobs for a day.

All community leaders are looking forward to the "friendliness and hospitality" which has

marked mayors exchanges in the past.

Michigan State University students have voted to seek a com-

prehensive group insurance plan for the student body. A referendum on the insurance plan—it would provide world-wide, year-around medical, surgical and

death benefits was conducted at spring term registration. About 69 percent of voting students favored seeking the plan.

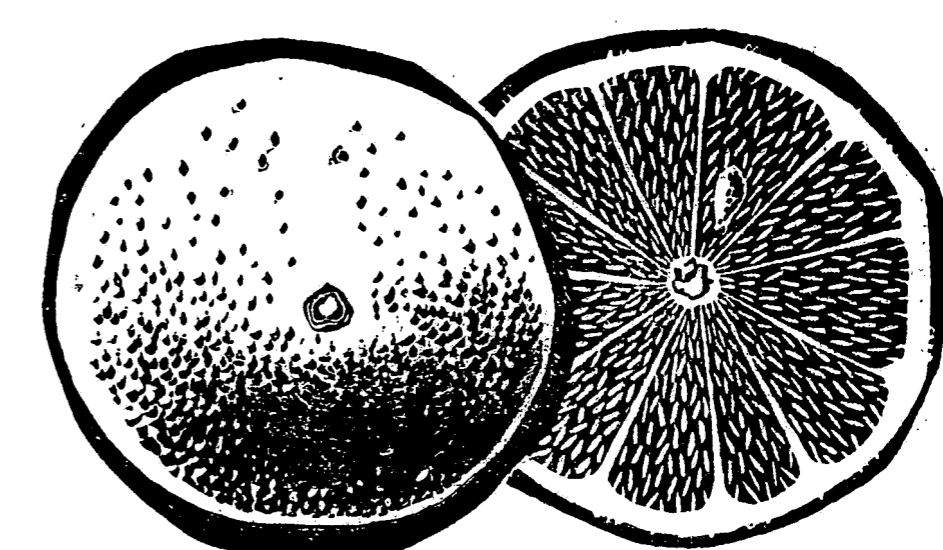

**ARTICLES LEFT IN STATE PARKS**

This year, hundreds of persons will lose valuable items in Michigan's 58 state parks.

Most will be recovered and a large portion turned in to parks offices.

There, these items may as well rot. For some reason park patrons fail to check at park offices to see if anybody found their lost tent or their misplaced eyeglasses or their valuable ring.

Sometimes false teeth are found. Shoes are a common item in summer, when man wants to wiggle his toes in sand and conveniently forget he is cuffed. Bicycles and tricycles and even automobiles are left. Some never are claimed.

Where park officials have any indication of the owner's name and address, an attempt is made to restore the item to its proper pocket.

But more often than not, no name is attached. The billfolds and books and clothing and vehicles are held at the park for about a year and finally turned over to the state board of escheats in Lansing for disposal.

State park officials would rather have proper owners receive the items. Mostly, however, this is a problem only the loser can solve. He must learn to use park lost and found offices.

In making jello, speed up the hardening process by using only enough boiling water to dissolve the jello. For the rest, use ice water.

For a new topping on chocolate cup cakes, try putting two marshmallows, cut in half, on top of each cake. Set the cup cakes under the broiler, using low heat, until the marshmallows are puffy

and golden brown. Serve them while the topping is still warm.

A good rule to follow in using color in clothing accessories: The brighter the color the less often it should be repeated.

To cook shrimp in the shells to serve cold with chili sauce, wash them first in cold water. Then drop them into rapidly

boiling salted water (1 tablespoon of salt for each quart). After the water again reaches the boiling temperature, lower the heat and simmer for five minutes. Drain, peel from the shells and cool.

If you are considering buying a portable sewing machine, remember it needs to be light enough in weight so you can move it. It loses its function as

a portable if it is necessary to depend on a strong arm to carry it. Its case should be sturdy and compact and it should be easy to remove and replace the machine.

To save time in preparing community or large-scale meals, buy butterettes instead of cutting brick butter, suggest M. S. U. home economists.

The juniors can come to school once again with their eyes open.

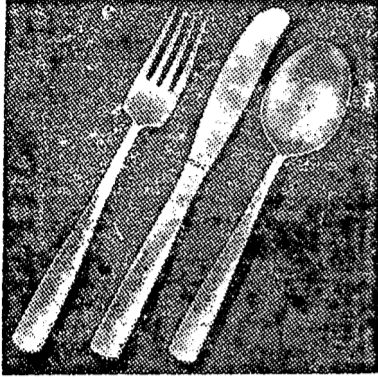

**FOOD SHOPPERS NEWS**  
 by Mrs. Josephine Lawyer  
 The good supplies of beef, pork and poultry are as welcome as warm spring weather. Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, Consumer Marketing Information Agent in Pontiac, reminds food shoppers of the economical values at the meat counter.  
 For hearty spring appetites braised short ribs make tasty barbecue at budget savings. Pork barbecue may be made from small lean spareribs, loins, or the Boston butt. The four to six pound smoked picnic is reasonably priced in many stores.  
 Broilers, fryers, and roasters offer variety and a price range to suit every pocketbook. Notice that both eviscerated and cut-up birds sometimes wear the same price tags, but usually those cut and ready for frying are about 10 cents more per pound.  
 The riot of colorful vegetables is a prelude to Michigan's vegetable season. Shipments of California asparagus are increasing and prices have dropped in some

stores. Tender asparagus has firm, fresh, crisp, bright green stalks with firm, compact, purple-green tips. The white woody portion at the base of the stalks is waste so it pays to check the amount of possible waste before buying. Usually one pound of fresh asparagus will yield four servings.  
 Counters are brimming with white and yellow Texas onions. Carrots, cabbage, and lettuce of good quality and quantity are right for every shopping basket. For a change in salad color and flavor use red and the curly Savoy cabbage in combination with the standard green variety.  
 Bananas, apples, and grapefruit rate banners in the fruit parade. For economy and quality bananas are a good choice, with apples a close contender. Grapefruit is very ripe and of good flavor, but has a tendency to break down more readily now than at the beginning of the season. The re-greening of grapefruit in the spring has no effect on the juice or flavor of the fruit.  
 To increase the daily protein requirement place eggs on the menu. Large grade A eggs are most plentiful and consequently the best egg buy. Clean, cool,

and covered are rules for keeping egg quality. Buy from refrigerated cases and place in the home refrigerator immediately.  
**ASPARAGUS ELEGANTE**  
 2 pounds asparagus  
 ¾ cup chicken stock (or 1 chicken bouillon cube in ¾ cup hot water)  
 1 tablespoon cornstarch  
 1 tablespoon cold water  
 2 tablespoons soy sauce  
 2 tablespoons melted butter  
 1 clove garlic  
 Wash and snap off lower part of stalks. Cut into small irregular pieces. Make a sauce by adding water and chicken stock to the cornstarch; cook over low heat until thick. Add soy sauce and garlic. Cook asparagus in butter for 2 minutes. Add thickened sauce and cook for one more minute.  
**PORK CHOPS WITH APPLES**  
 Take four loin pork chops; cut out the bones and fat; Sear them on both sides; Cover each with a thick slice of cored apple; Fill the holes in the apples with brown sugar and sprinkle some over the chops. Heat a cup of thick sour cream and add to the chops in a frying pan. Cover and simmer forty minutes. Be sure they are tender.

### SOCIAL SECURITY REPORTS DUE FROM HOUSEWIVES

Social security reports are due in April from housewives in Oakland County who employ domestic workers, according to Wesley Dorr, Manager of the Pontiac District Office, Social Security Administration. Housewives are required to make these reports during April on household workers paid as much as \$50 in cash wages in January, February, and March. This is the fifth quarterly report due since the new law covered household

### Double Deck Shortcake

If desired, make a border around edge of dainties with plain cream cheese, using either a spoon or the shell tip of a pastry tube. Serves 4.

Work of cooks, maids, housekeepers, gardeners and other workers in a private household

counts toward eligibility for retirement or death payments under old-age and survivors insurance if they are paid at least \$50 cash wages by one employer in a calendar quarter. If the household employee works long enough to be insured, benefits are payable in old age or to certain survivors in case of death.

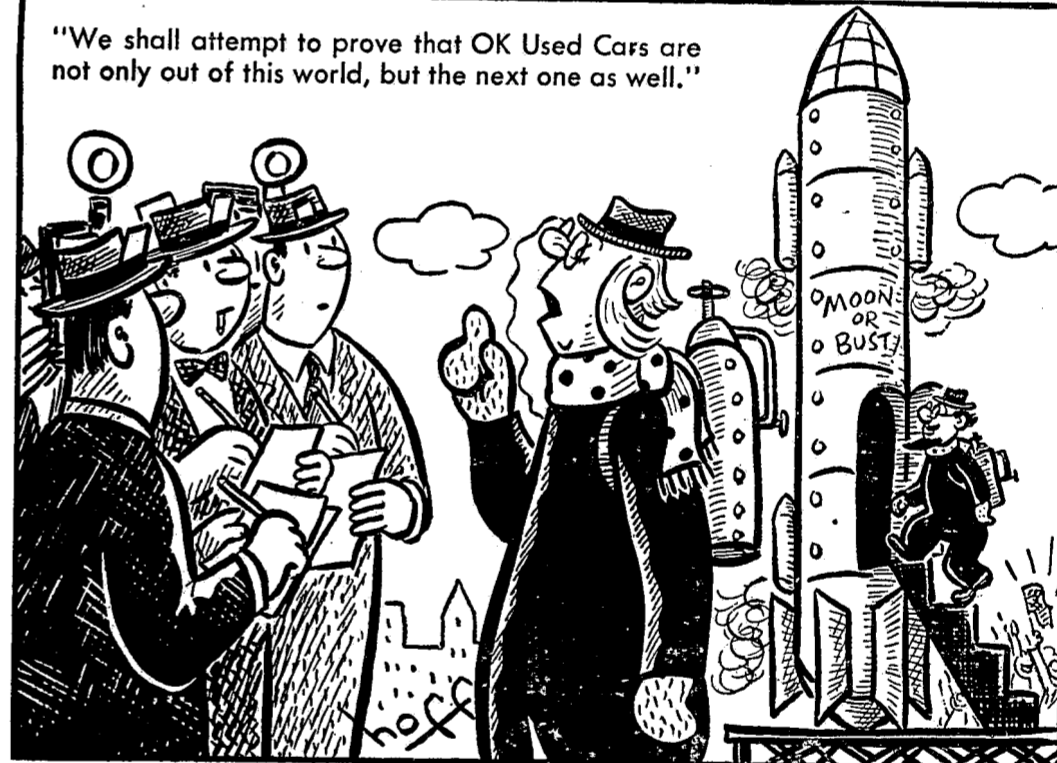
