TWO NEW BUILDINGS TO BE BUILT IN CAPITOL AREA

Two new buildings, both designed as "modern instruments of justice", will soon take their place in the rapidly-growing capitol area of Lansing, according to statements released by Albert E. Blasfield, president of the State Bar and John R. Dethmers, chief justice of the Michigan Supreme Court.

One of these, the Supreme Court building, will house the judicial branch of Michigan government. The other, the State Bar building, will be the permanent headquarters of the State Bar. The former will be located at Allegan and Walnut Streets the latter on Townsend and Washtenaw, both within a two-block radius of the state capitol.

The State Bar building, for which funds are now being raised under the direction of Glenn M. Coulter, Detroit attorney, will be a one-story brick and concrete structure measuring 86 by 112 feet. It will provide a working library for attorneys, meeting rooms, and educational facilities, in addition to offices for the staff of the 8,000 member organization.

The Supreme Court building was given legislative and court approval during the last session of the legislature. It is a two-

story structure with a gross floor area of 81,400 square feet. Facilities for the judiciary will comprise, among other items, a Supreme Court room, suites of offices for the chief justice and associate justices, conference rooms, a 100,000 volume law library, offices for the solicitor general and a memorial hall in the public lobby.

"The State Bar is the organization which advances the interest of the legal profession but it serves, as well, the public interest through a continuing drive to improve the administration of justice," said chief justice Dethmers in giving his wholehearted support to the State Bar building project. Mr. Blasfield pointed to the building as a "logical solution to the need for facilities brought about by the constantly-expanding program of the State Bar." He emphasized the convenience and added value of the two buildings caused by their proximity to each other and to the capitol.

NAME BARS ADDED TO STATE POLICE UNIFORMS

Beginning May 15th, Michigan State Police will have a new addition to their uniforms—name bars to be worn on the right breast.

The bars are two and one-quarter inches long and a quarter inch high. Commissioned officers' bars are gold plated, the others chrome, and the name is in blue enamel.

Their use was decided upon for easier identification in addition to badge numbers. Persons will know by name the officers they deal with.

STATE POLICE SEEK RECRUITS FOR NEW JOBS

Michigan State Police have begun recruiting candidates for 168 new trooper positions authorized at the 1956 session of the legislature.

A new pay increase in April extending through all ranks has made jobs in the department exceptionally attractive.

The increase was brought about through upgrading of positions by the state civil service commission. Beginning with the time he enters training school, a new trooper receives \$151 every two weeks, the same as was paid with the pay increase effective in February, gets \$178 beginning with his second year, also the same, but beginning with the third year shares in the new increases. Pay from then on ranges from \$188 every two weeks up to \$222 in the trooper rank.

In addition, the trooper receives \$3 a day for subsistence, or about \$57 a month. He gets paid vacations, paid sick leave,

extra vacation days beginning with the sixth year of service and longevity pay on the completion of the sixth year.

Uniforms and equipment are supplied and he may room at a post without charge.

At the end of 25 years of service the officer can retire on pension, but may remain in the department until age 56. The pension amounts to one half his pay the previous two years and, as soon as he is eligible to retire, goes to his widow in event of his death.

Applications for the 168 positions will be received up to midnight, May 30. A civil service examination has been set for June 23, but an evening examination may be added for the convenience of candidates.

An applicant must be between 21 and 29 years of age, inclusive, not less than five feet, nine inches in height, and in good health. He must have a high school education or its equivalent. Married men as well as single are accepted.

Application blanks may be obtained at any state police post, or from the state civil service commission or Michigan state police headquarters in Lansing.

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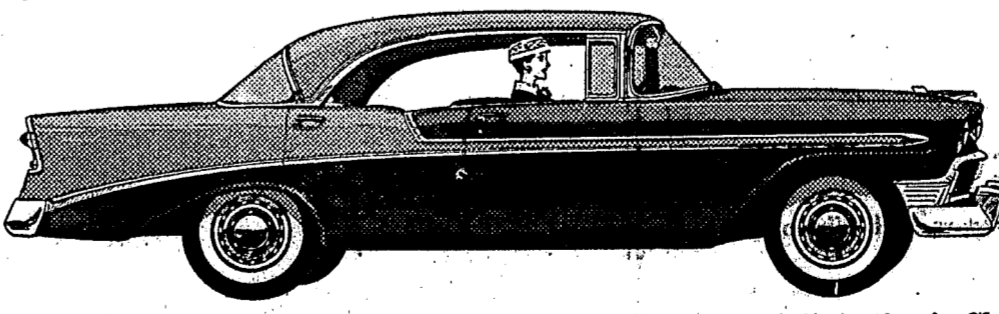
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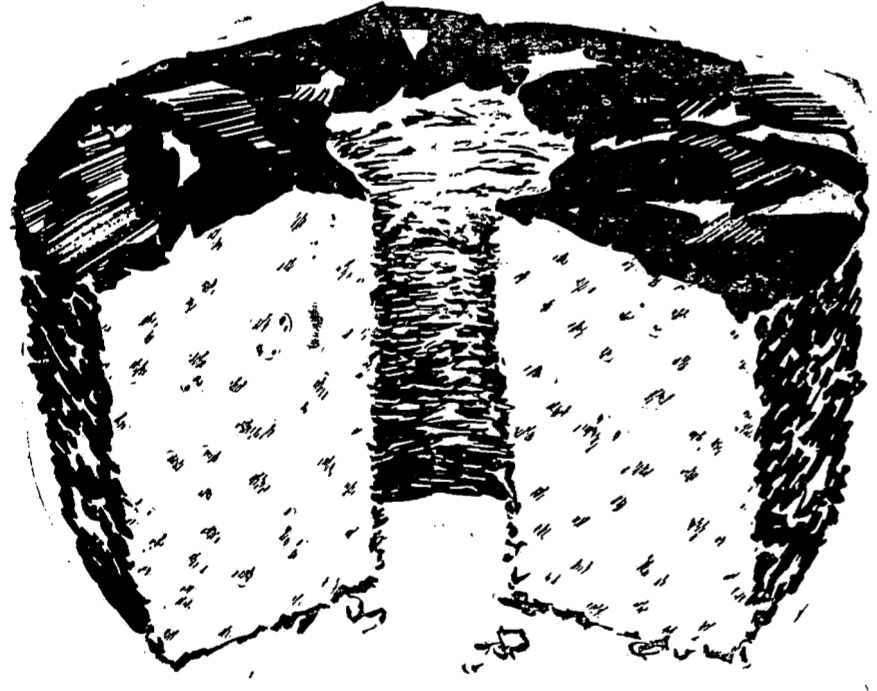

FOOD SHOPPERS NEWS

Warmer weather may bring a change in menus, but food shoppers will find plenty of good values in local stores.

Meats—The larger than usual supplies of beef in the spring market make beef, and particularly the less tender cuts, attractive buys. Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, Consumer Marketing Information Agent of the Cooperative Extension Service says chuck, round flank, and short ribs are among the best meat values. These less tender cuts can be made tender by braising, stewing, or simmering.

Boston Butts, loins, picnics, sausage, and bacon are outstanding pork selections. For new spring flavors try barbecue sauce for some cuts, stuff roast loin of pork, or use a fruit glaze for a picnic shoulder.

POULTRY — Approximately 20% more fryers are available this month than last year at this time. Even though prices are expected to raise slightly in some stores this week, they are a good choice in comparison to other meats. Cut-up fryers are usually priced about 5 to 10 cents a pound more than those sold whole.

VEGETABLES - Produce counters display plentiful onions, carrots, and head lettuce, for every market basket. Increasing quantities of tomatoes add a welcome color note to salads for fewer pennies again this week. Best flavor is assured when picking shipped-in-corn-on-the-cob that has bright, plump looking kernels. Peppers and cucumbers are becoming more plentiful.

FRUITS - This is the between season for many fruits now, so none can be called plentiful. Both California and Florida oranges are slightly higher due to more scarce supplies. Grapefruit, with plenty of juice and sweet in flavor is still very reasonably marked. One half medium-sized grapefruit provides the daily need of vitamin C. Unless the pineapple found at fruit counters is a deep orange color, ripen for a few days at room temperature until the color and flavor develops. The large 8 size is available for about 40 cents each.

EGGS - Every day can be protein rich when eggs are added to the diet. For high quality look for Grade A on the label; for the best buy in weight for the money, select the large size now.

into six flat cakes, using about 1/4 cup of mixture for each cake. Melt 1 tablespoon of the fat in a skillet and brown the cakes, first on one side, and then the other. While the cakes are browning, melt the remaining 2 tablespoons of fat in a saucepan. Add the onions and cook in the fat until tender. Add the Worcestershire

sauce, vinegar, sugar and tomato sauce and mix well. Pour this sauce over the cakes. Cover the skillet and simmer for 15 minutes. To serve, arrange the hot rice on a platter. Place the beef cakes over the rice and pour the sauce over the beef cakes and rice. This recipe makes 6 servings.



FCDA Trains Rescue Corps

Twenty miles from downtown Washington is the world's greatest "theater" — a gigantic stage setting without a stage, professional actors or scenery. Amidst a backdrop of "bombed-out" building ruins, volunteer "actors" and "actresses" periodically put behind the day's workaday world to become "victims" at the Federal Civil Defense Administration's Olney, Md., Rescue School.

WHILE BURNING OIL is played on stairways and other key spots in the ruins by a remote control panel, students at the national rescue school enter the flaming structures and actually rescue the volunteer "victims." Some "victims" pretend unconsciousness. Others simulate situations the rescue workers would meet in an actual civil defense disaster by becoming "hysterical" and even by kicking and fighting their would-be "rescuers." Seldom, however, do professional rescue instructors standing by actually have to enter the ruins to help out their students during the "final exam" of the two-week course. And never are the volunteer victims actually in danger, for they have been placed in areas known to be safe from the hidden flaming oil jets.

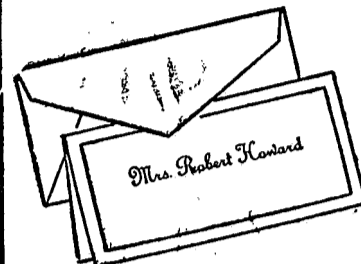
