#### COUNTY EXTENSION NEWS

by John K. Trocke Ass't County Agricultural Agent

For many of the farm crops this spring the season has been delayed for three weeks or more according to John K. Trocke, Assistant County Agricultural Agent.

Less than one-half of the usual number of acres of oats have been planted and it is recommended that no more oats be planted this spring as they will not make a large enough growth to be worth harvesting in most cases. The oat-crop can be replaced by soy beans with the new Chippewa variety being highly recommended. Many farmers will probably plant sudan grass for pasture and use this method of securing their legume seeding. Many of the farmers who have crops in have had considerable


