## American Students To Study Abroad

Eighty-eight students, including twenty-six men and sixty-two women, have been accepted for the 1956-57 Junior Year in France, a year's foreign study program, the group will represent forty-two American colleges and universities, seven of which are included for the first time.

Two students from Kalamazoo College will be among the group. They are Miss Jane C. Pressel, Grosse Pointe, and Miss Jo Ann Valentine, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. K. B. Valentine, 6423 Andersonville Road, Clarkston.

The students will sail for France on September 7 on the Mauretania, accompanied by Miss Josephine Ott, assistant professor-in-charge. They will be met in France by Professor Barker and Professor Blanchard Rideout, professor-in-charge for the coming year, on leave from Cornell University. After six weeks of intensive language drill in the provincial city of Tours, the students will move to Paris to enroll in the winter term of various schools of the university there. In both cities they will live with French families.

June 1st is Poster Day for the National Senior Girl Scout Roundup. This is the event which will bring 5,000 girls from across the country plus patrols from six other nations and territories, to the Highland Recreation Area from June 29th to July 11th.

**COUNTY EXTENSION NEWS**

by John K. Trocke  
Ass't County Agricultural Agent

For many of the farm crops this spring the season has been delayed for three weeks or more according to John K. Trocke, Assistant County Agricultural Agent.

Less than one-half of the usual number of acres of oats have been planted and it is recommended that no more oats be planted this spring as they will not make a large enough growth to be worth harvesting in most cases. The oat crop can be replaced by soy beans with the new Chippewa variety being highly recommended. Many farmers will probably plant sudan grass for pasture and use this method of securing their legume seeding. Many of the farmers who have crops in have had considerable

damage due to flooding of low areas in the field. One ray of sunshine on the agricultural front is the fact that hay yields should be considerably above
