George N. Higgins, Michigan Turnpike Authority Chairman, reported that the 113 mile Rockwood-Saginaw Turnpike had received support from the Clarkston Farm Bureau. The support came by the way of a resolution adopted by the farm organization last month, a copy of which was presented to Mr. Higgins.







Nothing but Christ's Christianity can supply the answer to the tremendously challenging problems facing humanity, The Christian Science Board of Directors said today.



A new electrical speed-watch timing device also is being used. With this device tubes are stretched across the road to check speeds.



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
matter", they stated.




