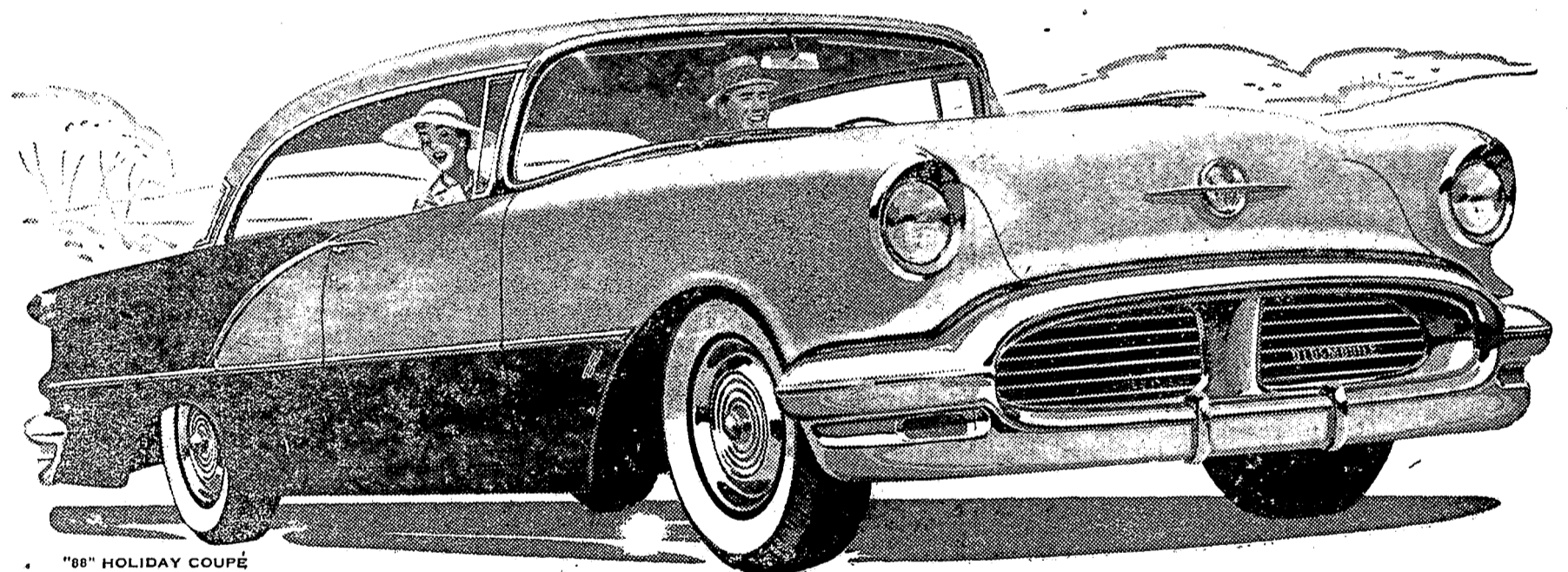

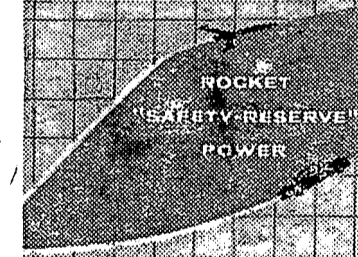

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GETTING RID OF TREE STUMPS

Tree stumps seem to turn up in the strangest places. We always seem to find them in the middle of the garden, or lawn, or in the middle of a field where we have to go around them. That's why it's too bad that getting rid of them is such a job.

John Trocke, Assistant County Agricultural Agent, says that there are ways to do it quickly. However, there isn't a method of doing it both quickly and easily in all cases.

If you have lots of time and patience, you can let your stumps rot out. This is probably the method favored by most of us, unless the stump is more than just a nuisance. You can hasten this rotting process by covering the stump with dirt, and boring holes in it. Depending on the size and species of stump, it will take from two to five years to decompose. If you don't want to wait that long, you'll have to resort to more violent methods.

Burning doesn't take too much manual labor, but in Michigan stumps are rarely dry enough to burn very well. That's especially true this spring.

Other methods include digging them out, hauling them out, bulldozing them out, and blowing them out with dynamite. Each of these solutions to the problem has its drawbacks and you'll want to investigate each in relation to your own circumstances. Just remember that you have the advantage of the offensive. Don't let yourself be stumped by a stump.

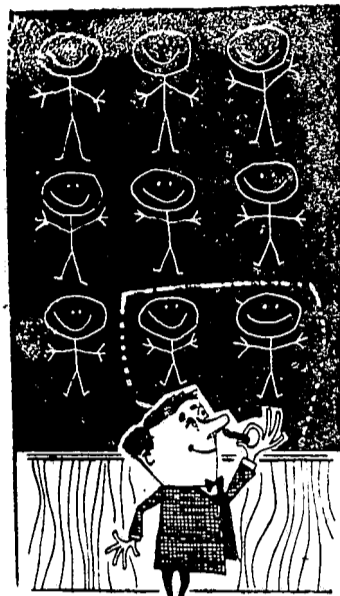
Many of these are the result of the ingenuity and skill of the

LEADER DOG SCHOOL FOUR PLANNED

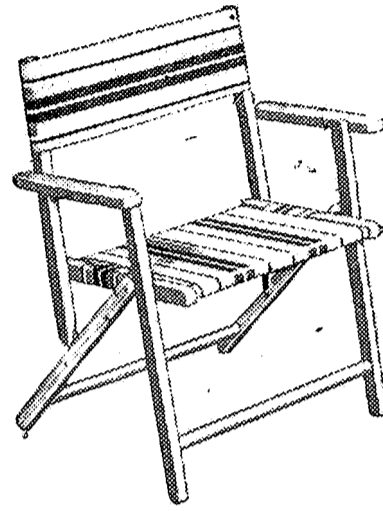
Extension group members of Oakland County are invited to tour the Leader Dog School for the Blind, 1039 South Rochester Road, Rochester, on Thursday,

Those extension group members attending, together with their families, will attend a picnic after the tour, at Bloomer State Park in Rochester.

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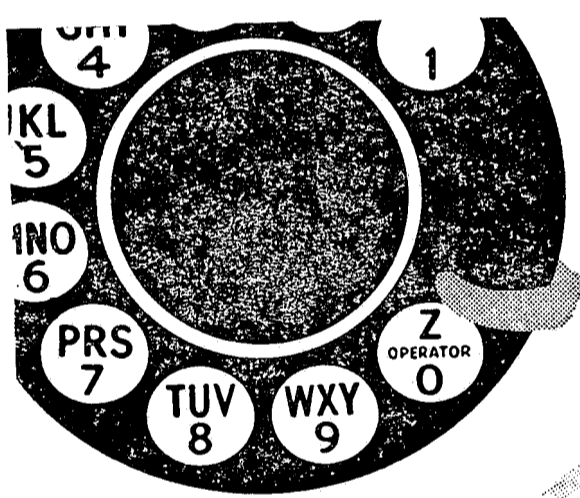


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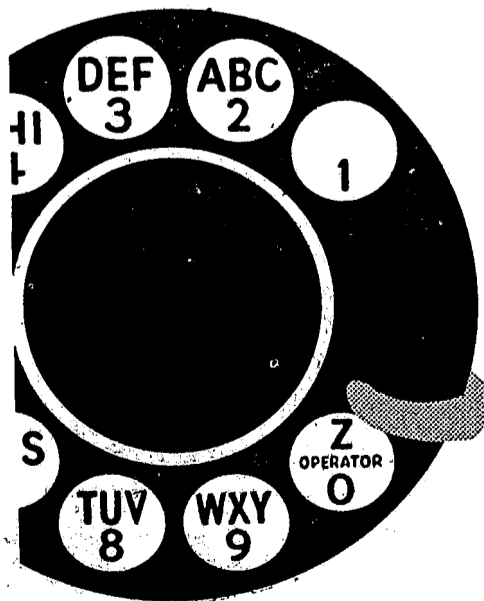

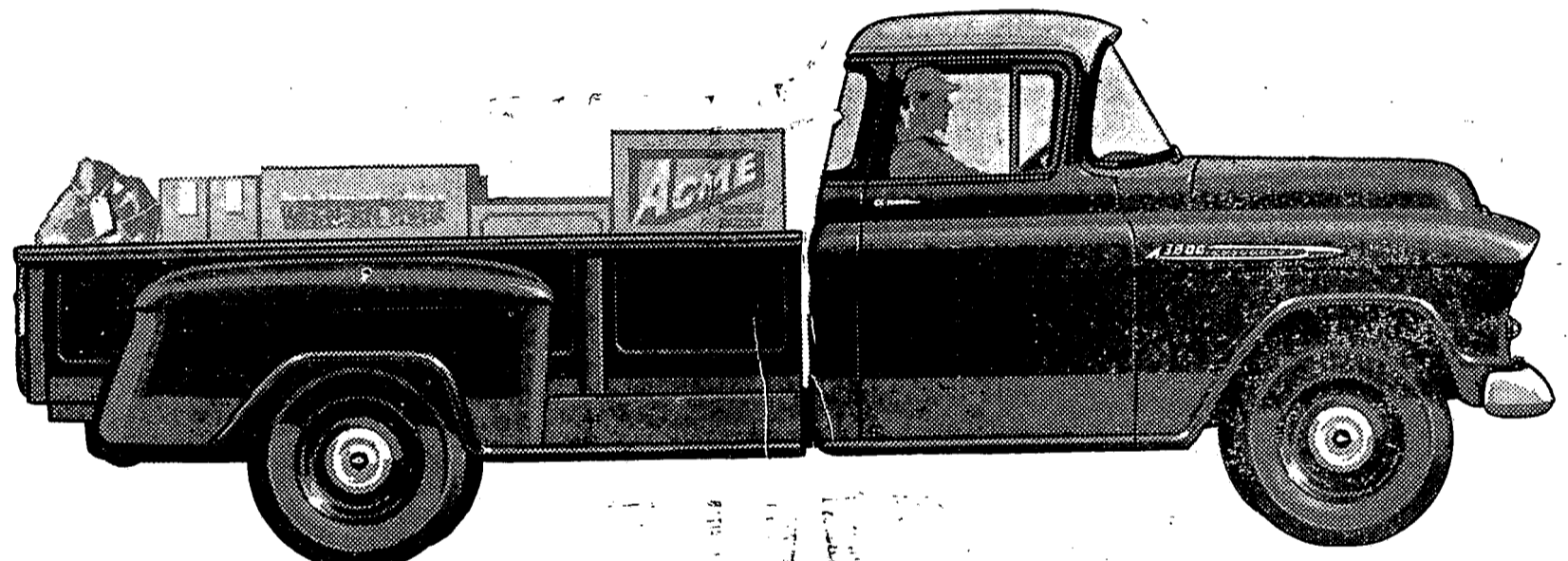
Some people seem to be born with a smile in their voices. Mrs. Carolyn Irwin is surely one of them. She has received compliments on her voice from telephone subscribers.

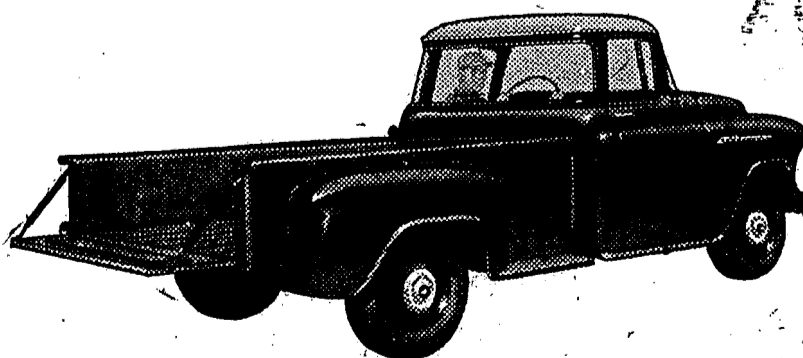
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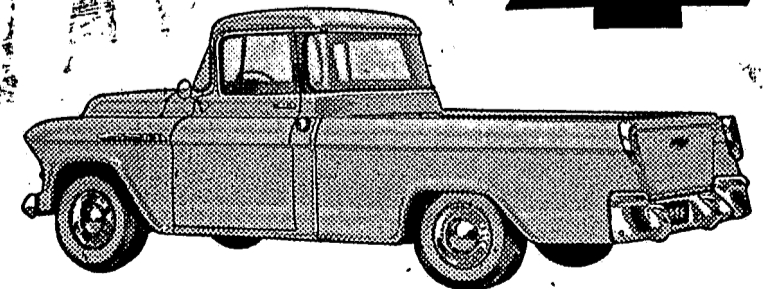
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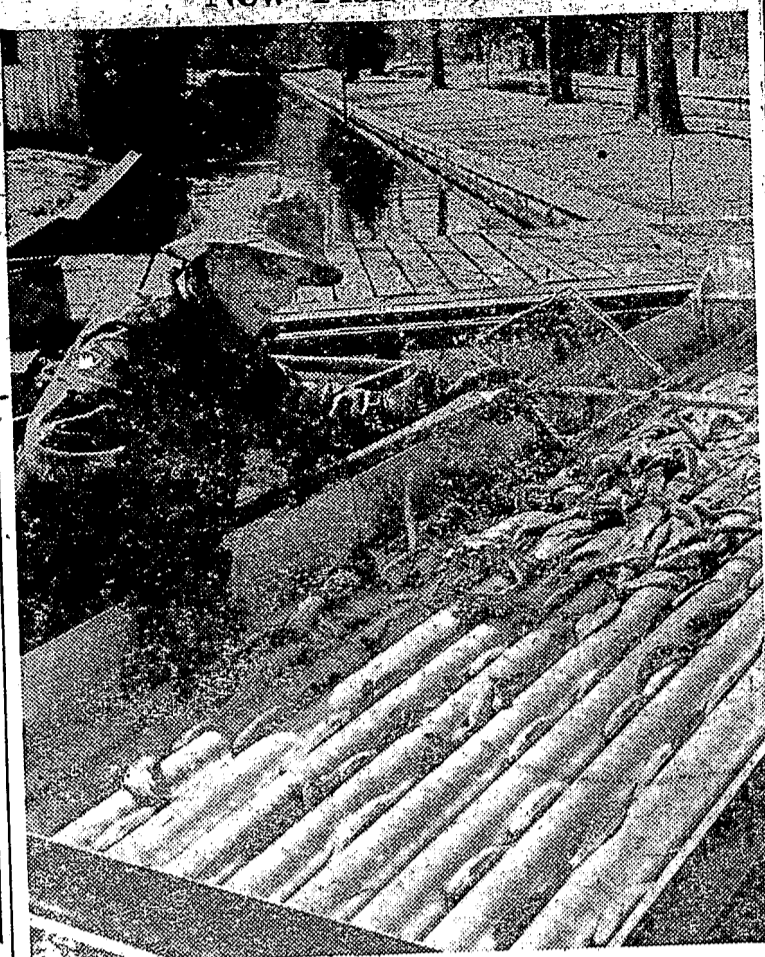
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New Fish Sorter
