4-DAY CONVENTION IN LANSING

The Pontiac Congregations of Jehovah's witnesses are arranging plans to attend a major four-day convention at Lansing, Michigan, July 26-29, it was announced today. One of 34 such conclaves throughout the United States and Canada, the Lansing meet, to be held in the new Civic Auditorium, will draw upwards of 10,000, mostly from the State of Michigan, with special delegates coming from 18 other states and Canada.

Mr. W. P. Strong, local presiding minister, in making the announcement, pointed to the christian's need for spiritual instruction in these times of increasing world tensions and perplexities.

"The purpose of the program at the convention", Mr. Strong said, "is to help supply this need of spiritual instruction and counsel so that everyone of the preaching fellowship of Jehovah's witnesses may be best able to make known to others the good news of the approaching Kingdom of God on earth".

Mr. Strong said Jehovah's witnesses take quite literally the scriptural admonition to "not forsake the assembling of yourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much more, as ye see the day approaching." 400 from the Pontiac congregations are expecting to be present at the Lansing convention, according to Mr. Strong.

In addition, Phil Harris, Wayne

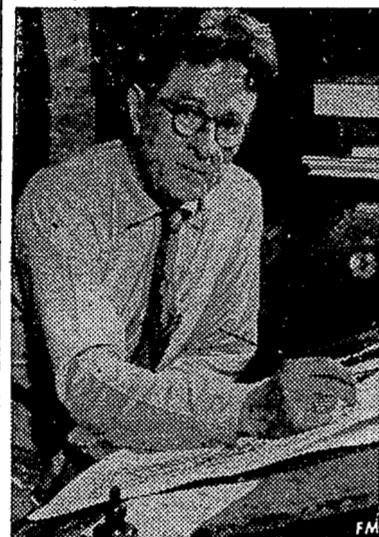
Morris George Murphy and Robert Ryan are wielding swabs and standing watches aboard the Randolph instead of starring in motion pictures.

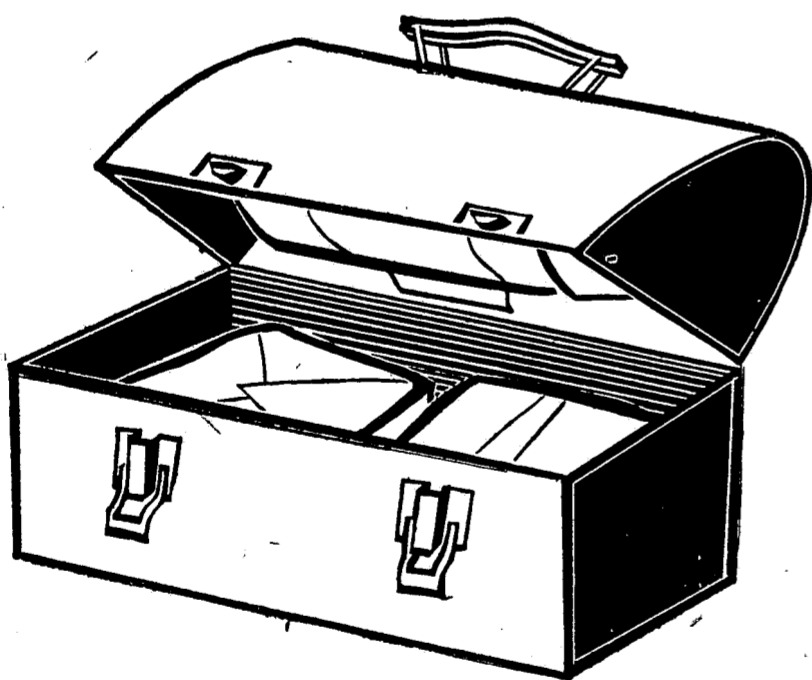

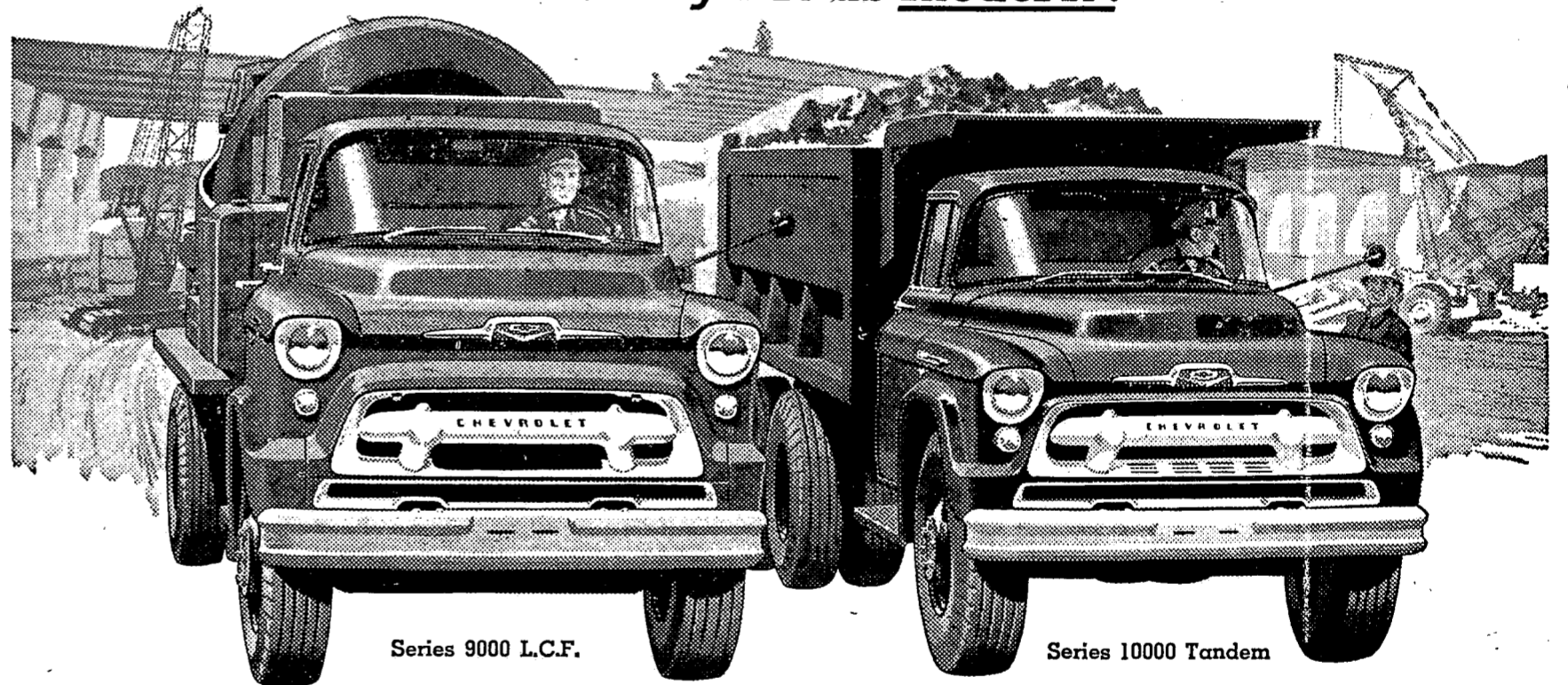

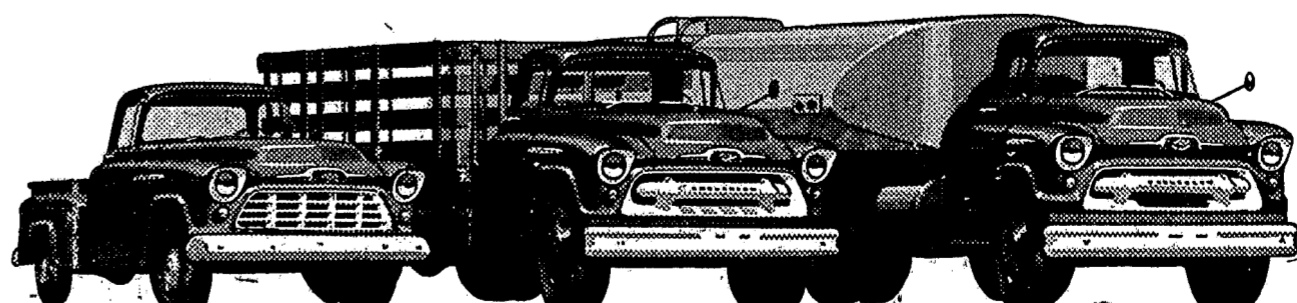

LARGE PAYMENT MADE TO PRIMARY SCHOOL FUND

The largest single payment its history has been made to the state's primary school fund. The Michigan Bell Telephone Company has turned over the first half of nearly \$10 million in state taxes. Topping 1955's record levy by \$1.5 million, the company's 1956 tax of \$9,792,322 again makes it the largest single contributor to the fund.

The first half-year payment of \$4,896,161 was turned over to the state by Herbert F. Lange, the company's vice-president and treasurer. Another check for a like amount will be received by state revenue commissioner Louis M. Nims on October 31.

The 1956 payments will bring Michigan Bell's total contribution to the primary school fund to more than \$138 million since the company's organization in 1904.

Under law, the company's state tax is levied in lieu of all other local property taxes, and is earmarked for the school fund.

Distribution is made throughout the state on the basis of the school census figures.

Other companies following the same provision include railroads, telegraph, Railway Express, companies.
