**JAP BEETLE TRAPS PLACED IN SOUTHERN MICHIGAN**

Yellow lantern-like devices that hang from metal rods about four feet off the ground, are being placed at various points throughout the southern part

of Michigan's lower peninsula by plant industry division men of the State Department of Agriculture.

The devices are Japanese Beetle traps. They may look like lanterns, but the similarity

ends there, because a Japanese Beetle trap does not light up. It attracts Japanese Beetles from a distance of 500 feet through aromatic oils in it. The yellow color also attracts. Some 9,000 of these traps are

being placed in the greater Detroit area, in Monroe, Niles, Benton Harbor, Grand Rapids, Muskegon, Jackson, Battle Creek, Lansing, Kalamazoo, Pontiac, Flint, Port Huron, Lapeer and at some key highway intersections.

Use of the traps is part of a statewide eradication program that has been successful since the first beetle was discovered in Michigan in 1932. Losses to plants and trees from Japanese Beetles have been held to a minimum by the program.

The traps are not so much to eradicate Japanese Beetles as they are to detect the presence of the insect. Spraying and dusting follows the locating of the beetles.

The project is a joint one between the U. S. and Michigan Departments of Agriculture and local units of government.

**FOOD SHOPPERS NEWS**

Michigan's July fruit bowl is brimming with berries and cherries. The growing season is bringing more vegetables, and a good variety of meats for the market basket, says Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, Consumer Marketing Information Agent.

**FRUITS**—The Michigan cherry harvest is well underway with sweet cherries the first week in the month and tart cherries the second. A combination of hot weather last summer and cold weather this spring has damaged the cherry yield. According to the Michigan Crop Reporting Service, the 1956 crop of tart cherries will be about 56,000 tons—one-fifth less than the 1955 crop. This is about one-fourth less than the 1950-54 average of 74,200 tons.

Apricots, plums and peaches are other small fruits wearing moderate price tags for this early in the season. Watermelon and cantaloupe make easy desserts for little cost, considering the number of servings they yield.

**VEGETABLES**—Gradually, the supply of fresh Michigan vegetables is increasing. Italian and summer squash, cabbage, beets and turnips are more evident in produce departments. Michigan grown green onions and radishes will add real snap and color for green salads.

**MEATS**—Because supplies are large in July, prices of chicken will be geared to fit all budgets. Since poultry is very perishable, take care to rush it from the refrigerated case at the store to the refrigerator at home. Wrapped loosely and stored at 35 degrees F., ready to cook chicken should be used within 2 to 3 days after purchase.

Larger supplies of lambs that were born during the late winter are arriving in the market. Shoppers will see a slight drop in lamb prices compared with last month. About one-third of both lamb and veal are cuts such as breast, shoulder, and flank. These cuts are very reasonable in price, and are best

when cooked with moist heat.

**CHERRY SYRUP FOR MILK SHAKE**

(from canned cherries & juice)  
No. 2 can red cherries  
1 cup sugar  
8 drops red coloring  
3/8 teaspoon almond extract  
1/2 teaspoon salt

Drain and save juice from cherries. Grind cherries medium fine. Combine the ground cherries and juice and simmer five minutes. Strain mixture through cheesecloth or fine sieve, press out all juice and discard pulp. Add sugar to juice and cook five minutes. Stir in coloring. Cool, then stir in almond flavoring.

Yield: 2 1/2 cups syrup or 7 to 9 shakes.

For each milk shake: Combine in shaker or pint jar: 3/4 cup milk, 1/4 to 1/2 cup cherry syrup, 1 large scoop vanilla or cherry ice cream. Shake thoroughly until thick and frothy. Serve in tall glasses with straws.

Experience in 1955 shows that the vaccine is 75% effective in preventing paralytic poliomyelitis." Here in Oakland County, children from 1 through 14 years, and pregnant women are eligible for the vaccine which can be obtained either through physicians or Health Department clinics.

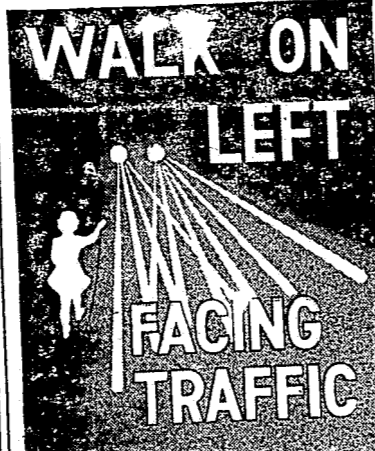

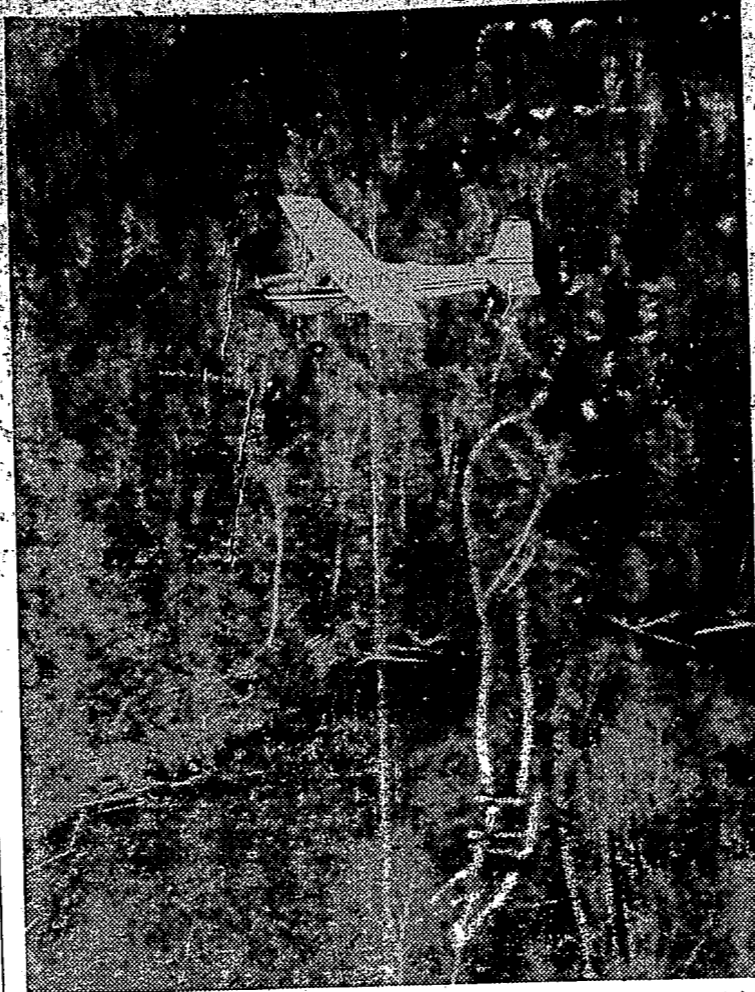

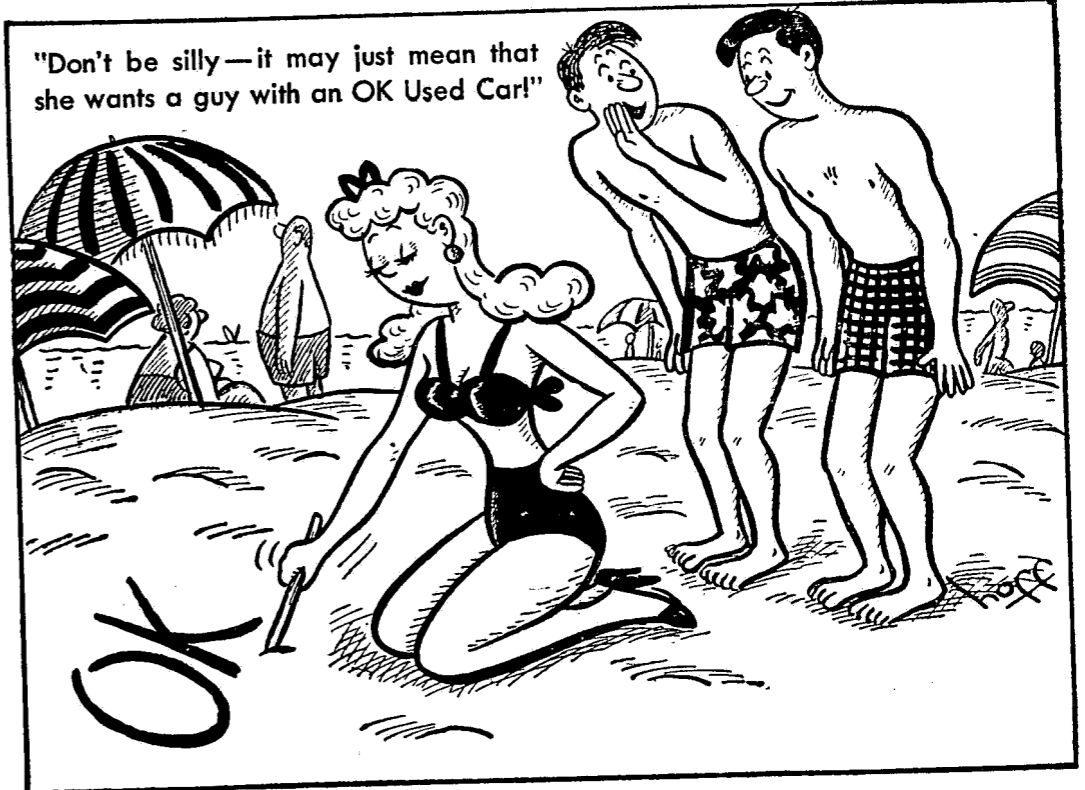
