The Michigan State Fair, one big contest itself, is adding 10 special contests for children and older folks.

Donald L. Swanson, general manager of the State Fair to be held August 31 through September 9, says that now is the time for entering these various contests by sending him the name, address and telephone of the contestant and the name of the contest.

The children's contests are for two age groups - 6 to 9 and 10 to 14 - with finals to be run on Children's Day, Tuesday, September 4.

There'll be cash prizes of \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2 and \$1 for winners of the following: pie eating, watermelon eating, most freckled face, cutest and longest pony tail and a picture taking contest.

In the pie eating contest, entrants will work on 7 inch pies and are advised to bring their own bibs.

There are two divisions in the children's photo contest. Class 1 includes general pictures of still life and human interest; Class 2 includes pictures of the State Fair Parade and the State Fair proper.

But the youngsters have no monopoly on contests designed strictly for fun. FOOD SHOPPERS NEWS

The summer special brings variety and color to every Michigan table, says Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, Consumer Marketing Information Agent.

VEGETABLES—The hit parade of summer's favorite vegetables will feature Michigan sweet corn which arrived in volume in the markets this week.

This is the season when everyone can enjoy homegrown corn at its very best. Dark green husks, fresh in appearance and tightly wound around the bottom of the ear spell quality. Take a look at the kernels. Even, well-filled rows of shiny bright kernels indicate maturity and garden freshness. The kernels vary from a light to medium yellow color according to variety.

Green beans with no strings attached are economically priced in most markets. Fresh green beans are firm, bright, and really snap. When beans lose their snap they become tough and tasteless.

FRUITS—Michigan blueberries are in the spotlight, as they arrive in larger supply. Look for blueberries that are plump, dry and that have a deep, bright color to insure ripeness. A pint of blueberries will give about six 1/2 cup servings. Just a few will make plain muffins a seasonal delight. Used in combination with cantaloupe, honey dew and watermelon they make elegant fruit cups, salads, or desserts.

Shipped-in peaches wear price tags comparable to other fresh fruits. The early Michigan Red Haven variety is expected by August 20th.

Summertime Storage Hints

Illustrated tips for food storage: Protect milk and cream from light, heat or sunshine and refrigerate immediately; Canned food will keep perfectly well in the opened can, if covered and refrigerated promptly; Don't wash eggs before refrigerating. Protective film will be destroyed; Do wash and drain vegetables before refrigerating; Cucumbers and tomatoes must be dried before storing in the refrigerator; Cantaloupe needs special isolation to keep its odor from penetrating other foods in the refrigerator; Cheese too! Wrap it well!

MEATS—Come to the meat counter for a wide selection of tempting values. Poultry steals the summer show as the curtain goes up on fryers, turkeys and stewers dressed for the most particular customers. A roast, turkey calls for a little time in a warm kitchen, but can make several cool luncheons after a festive roast dinner. Grass fed cattle is becoming more abundant, and as a result there is less top quality beef in the market. Forequarter cuts of ground beef, chuck cuts, and corned beef are the thrifty beef items.

1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, Dash of paprika, 1 egg white, beaten stiff. Chop the corn. Drain. Add beaten egg yolk. Sift the flour with the salt, baking powder, and paprika. Stir into corn mixture. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg white. Dip batter by teaspoonfuls and slide it into the heated shortening. Fry until golden brown, from 3 to 5 minutes. Drain. Serve immediately. Serves 4.

Pork picnics are right for easy picnic serving. Bacon flavor will stretch far at present bacon prices. Use on kabobs and with other meats and vegetables for added aroma and flavor. Juicy barbecue can be a reasonably priced meat dish when rib end loin roast or spareribs are chosen.

CORN FRITTERS: Frying temperature - 375 degrees F. 1 cup fresh or canned corn, 1 egg yolk, beaten, 1/2 cup and 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour.

Concerts for the past three seasons have attracted sell-out audiences and received critical acclaim both locally and in the Detroit press.

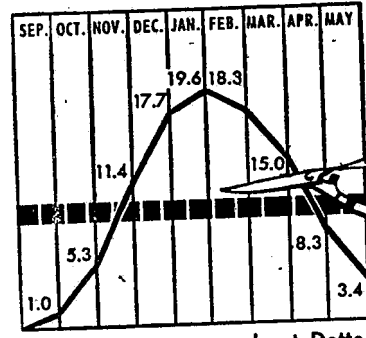
