OCTOBER SKY WILL FEATURE "HUNTER'S MOON"

October skies will be well supplied with moonlight as the Hunter's Moon appears on the 19th, says University of Michigan astronomer, Hazel M. Losh.
"The full moon, which is the first full moon following the Harvest Moon in September, is a great boon for hunters, hence the name", Professor Losh comments.

A striking effect of October is the noticeable shortening of the days. "Dropping from somewhat less than twelve hours at the beginning of the month", the astronomer notes, "the daylight period will last only about ten hours and twenty minutes by the end of the month".

During the 14 evening hours of October, several attractions will light the sky. Two meteor showers are scheduled for the month, Professor Losh points out. One will appear in the north around October 9, and the other in the east around October 22.

Mars will continue to shine as a bright object this month. Although it is steadily increasing its distance from the Earth, it will still be relatively near and will continue to dominate the southern sky, the professor says.

Among the prominent stars, Capella (The Goat) will be rising in the northeast around sunset. "This is the third brightest star visible from the northern latitudes", the astronomer comments, "and it has a temperature and yellow color very much like our Sun." Professor Losh suggests that if the Earth could be placed halfway between Capella and the Sun, Capella would send us more than one hundred times as much light as our Sun.

Also to be seen this month is one of the most celebrated groups in the whole heavens—a little cluster known as the Pleiades, coming up in the east an hour after Capella. "These stars have been worshipped, feasts held in their honor, and people far removed from each other have been guided in their agricultural and commercial pursuits by the rising and setting of these closest stars", the astronomer says.

And for the early risers, Jupiter and Venus, both morning objects, can be witnessed passing

very close to each other on October 25. "On that morning", Professor Losh says, "these two objects, both rising about three hours ahead of the Sun, will be a bright, double planet, the two planets barely separable."

EDUCATION COST \$13.50 A YEAR BACK IN 1829

You could once get a high-class education in Ann Arbor for \$13.50 a year, according to F. Clever Bald, assistant director of The University of Michigan Historical Collections.

Historian Bald says that Merrill's Select School, started in Ann Arbor by Thomas W. and Moses Merrill, advertised as follows in the initial number (November 18, 1829) of "The Emigrant" the town's first newspaper: "Select school for young gentlemen and ladies in Ann Ar-

Bald states that according to the advertisement, Thomas W. Merrill had the master of arts degree and had taught in New Hampshire. His brother had been a teacher in Albany, New York.

In spite of the great variety of subjects offered, the low tuition fees, and the experience of the teachers, the school continued for only two years. Thomas W. Merrill moved to Kalamazoo, where he opened the Michigan and Huron Institute in 1836. This academy later became Kalamazoo College, Bald states.

According to the Michigan historian, Merrill's Select School was an academy in which pupils could prepare to enter college. Charters were issued by the Territorial Council for twelve such institutions, but few of them were actually opened until after Michigan became a state.

A REMINDER FOR FARMERS

Farmers who will be filling silos this fall were reminded by the Michigan Department of Health today to be on guard against a poisonous gas produced by new silage.

The gas, nitrogen dioxide, is given off during the first 10 days after corn, alfalfa and clover are placed in a silo. Other silage materials also may generate the gas.

Several deaths from the poisoning, known as silo-filler's disease, have been reported in Michigan. Four known cases of the poisoning have occurred in Michigan in the last six years but all recovered.

The Michigan cases involved clover silage on farms in Branch and Barry counties and corn storage at a Battle Creek cereal plant and at a Mt. Pleasant silo. "Silo-filler's disease" is contracted by entering a silo within 10 days after the silo is filled. Symptoms of the disease are not immediately recognizable and a man may work in the gas for several hours without realizing he is in danger.

The gas has no odor and ranges in color from yellow to reddish-brown, depending on the temperature. It is heavier than air and has been found at the bottom of silos in concentrations of 151 parts per million parts of air. Top safety allowance in industry is 25 parts per million.

The gas either can cause the lungs to fill with liquid or can cause formation of scar tissue in the smallest bronchial tubes. Death can result quickly in the first case and slowly in the second. In less severe cases, recovery is difficult and lengthy. No effective treatment is known.

State health department recommendations on "silo-filler's disease" include: 1. The silo shouldn't be entered for the first 10 days after it has been filled, but if this isn't possible then the filler blower should

be operated for several minutes before entering, or the silo should be ventilated by an exhaust fan placed in the base. 2. The area around the silo should be fenced off to keep children and animals away.
