STANLEY LOCK TO BE GUEST SOLOIST

Stanley Lock of New York, a brilliant young pianist who was born in Ferndale, Mich., will come back to his home area to be the soloist at the opening concert of Pontiac Symphony Orchestra's fourth season. The concert will be presented at 8:30 p. m., Oct. 23, in the auditorium of Lincoln Junior High School, Pontiac.

Mr. Lock's European appearances and his performances with major orchestras in this country have met with great favor, with audiences and critics. He has been soloist with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra several times.

Among his distinguished scholarships Mr. Lock received a four-year grant for Juilliard Graduate School and a Fullbright grant for study in Paris, where Arthur Schnabel was one of his teachers.

At the Oct. 23rd concert, Mr. Lock will play the Schumann Concerto for Piano, considered one of the most expressive and beautiful compositions ever written.

Francesco Di Blasi of Detroit will again conduct the 60-piece orchestra, composed of both professional and amateur musicians.

In addition to the Schumann Concerto, the program will include the overture to "Barber of Seville" by Turino, and the "Danse of the Sylphs" and the "Hungarian March" from Berlioz "Damnation of Faust". Soloists on the other subscription concerts will be Paul Doktor, world famous violinist, Dec. 4, and Jan. 23, Lare Wardrop, English horn, and James Tamburin, trumpet. On March 12, Lemanis-Tillaks Ballet Company will perform and April 30 Cecelia Merrill Turner's "Chippewa Symphony" will be presented for the first time.
