ELEVEN-YEAR-OLD GETS BRONZE CROSS

Eleven-year-old Barbara Jones Blue, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Blue, 1688 Pointe Drive, Union Lake, has been awarded the Bronze Cross by the national executive committee of Girl Scouts, U. S. A.

The presentation was made at the annual meeting of the Northern Oakland County Council of Girl Scouts held in Waterford Township's C. A. I. Building. Mrs. E. J. Lally, Jr., president of the council, made the award.

"The Bronze Cross is the highest life saving award granted by the national Girl Scout organization", Mrs. Lally explained.

It was awarded to Barbara for the courage and resourcefulness she showed when she rescued her six-year-old brother, Harry, from drowning on July 8, 1955. The boy had been playing on a sand bar and went off into water over his head, with deep muck beneath him. Frightened, he began to scream for help. Barbara's mother and some friends who were sitting on the beach called to Barbara to go after Harry since they would have sunk knee deep in the muck (caused by recent excavations of a power shovel) and were unable themselves to reach him. Barbara swam to where the boy had gone under but was, at first, unable to find him. Diving a second time, she located her brother who was so terrified that he tore a handful of hair from her head.

Barbara talked to Harry and finally succeeded in getting him to turn over on his back. With the adults coaching she managed to swim him to safety.

Barbara had been taking swimming lessons for a month with a Red Cross instructor, but had not yet passed her swimming test. During the rescue, though she was frightened, she remembered what her instructor had told her about remaining calm.

She suffered from shock and was confined to her bed for two days, and she had a bald spot for about four months. Barbara is a member of Union Lake Troop 64 and Mrs. Charles Cox is her leader.

The next meeting will be at the church on Sunday evening, October 28, at 7 o'clock. The movie "Martin Luther" will be shown. The public is invited.

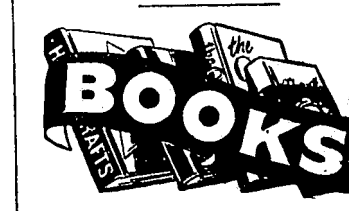

Gray squirrels, which actually are dark-colored gray squirrels, will be legal game this fall—along with their gray relatives—throughout most of Michigan. A law passed by the Legislature this year established the first hunting season on black squirrels in 1911. Black squirrels may be hunted October 1—November 1 at the upper peninsula and October 1—November 10 in the lower peninsula, except in Clare, Cheboygan and Isabella counties.

Scattered blacks are found in almost every county—more numerous north of this line. Black sq. colonies common in N.W. Lower Peninsula. Black color can be in various shades of gray & black.

Ellen C. (Nellie) VanZandt
Miss Ellen C. (Nellie) VanZandt, 5351 Williams Lake Road, died early Sunday morning at Goodrich Hospital. Miss VanZandt had been in failing health for several years but was not confined to the hospital until she was taken to Goodrich a week ago where she remained until the time of her death. She was the daughter of Clarence and Lucy Capron VanZandt, born March 4, 1874, on the farm in Waterford Township taken up from the Government in 1834.

The funeral service was held at the Huntoon Funeral Home in Pontiac on Wednesday afternoon with Dr. Roy Lambert of the Lakeland United Presbyterian Church officiating. Burial was in Drayton Plains cemetery.
