which water is now supplied. We propose to locate the intake in Lake Huron 6,100 feet from shore where the water depth is 45 ft. The intake crib proper is designed to take water from 20 feet below the surface to 35 feet below the surface. The water is to be pumped from there to the east bank of Black River sediment. From this point the water is to be carried by an inverted syphon thru two 8 foc Lock Joint Pipe tubes in a southwesterly direction to another reservoir located on an elevation of land between the communities to be served and the Lake Huron source. Thence it would flow by gravity to a filtration and water treatment plant being directed from there by gravity. This would eliminate pumping except

to a few communities where low lift pumps would be required. A tri-county water authority has been chartered with the authority to purchase water from a private corporation for resale to the municipalities and cities which have a water shortage. den Club met on Monday at 1:00 | Purchasing water from a private corporation will enable the various municipalities to install their own distributing systems many of which are already developed. This is considered by authorities as a very practical method of supplying their water

needs. For financing we propose the issuing of 30 year revenue bonds amounting not in excess of \$110,000,000. The contract between the Water Authority and the Lake Huron Water Supply to run for a period of 20 years, at which time the municipalitie are to have the privilege of taking it over at its depreciated value. It is further proposed that 10% of the net revenue be placed in an irrevocable trust fund to be used at the end of the 20 year period to pay off any equity interest of the operating company and to be entirely separate from any money set aside for bond redemption and bond interest.

#### ARE YOUR TREES AND SHRUBS PROTECTED FOR WINTER?

The greater part of injury to trees and shrubs occurs after the first of the year. This is particularly true of plants during their first winter after transplanting. The ideal time for taking steps


There are 4 principal types of winter injury: 1. Damage to roots from deep penetration of frost. 2. Kill-back of top growth, through frost injury to wood. 3. Mechanical injury to tops or roots by wind and ice and snow.

4. Bark injury by rodents. Kill-back of top growth is most likely to occur when a late autfreezing. Plants which are not too large may be wrapped in bur-

Mechanical injury from wind often does more damage underground, by loosening or even breaking roots, than to the above ground growth. All newly planted trees, especially evergreens, should be held in place firmly by wires anchored in three directions. Branches broken by wind should be removed and the stubs cut back smooth and flush with


