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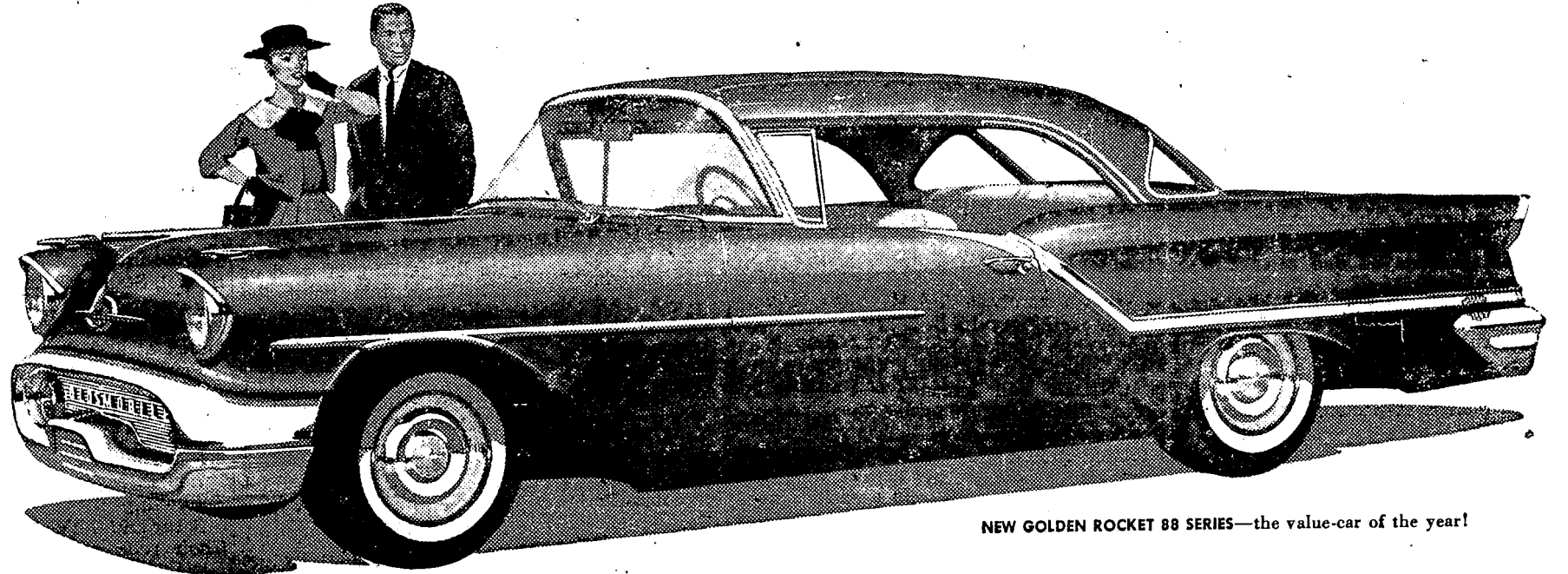
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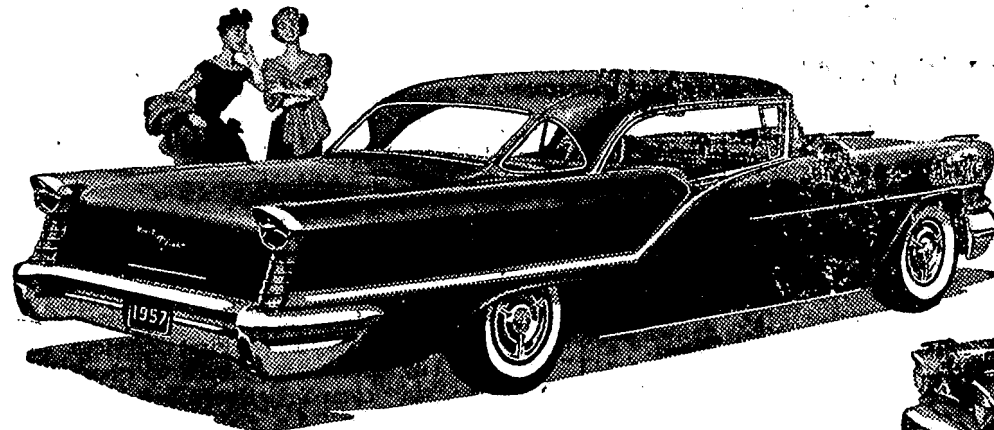
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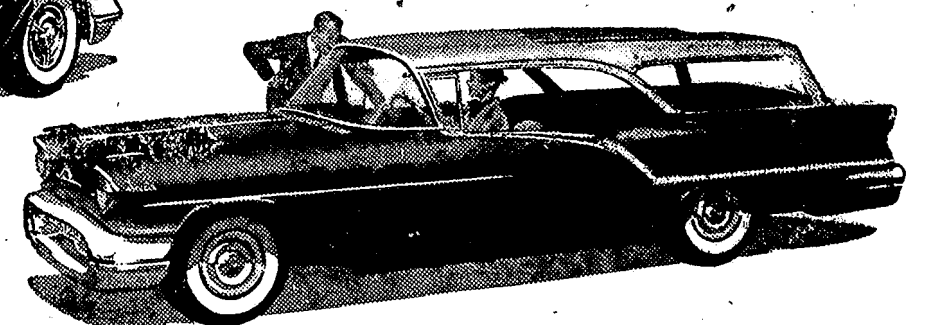

U. food specialists. But if it stands too long, the frosting tends to lose its volume.

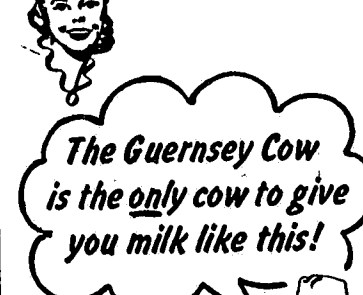

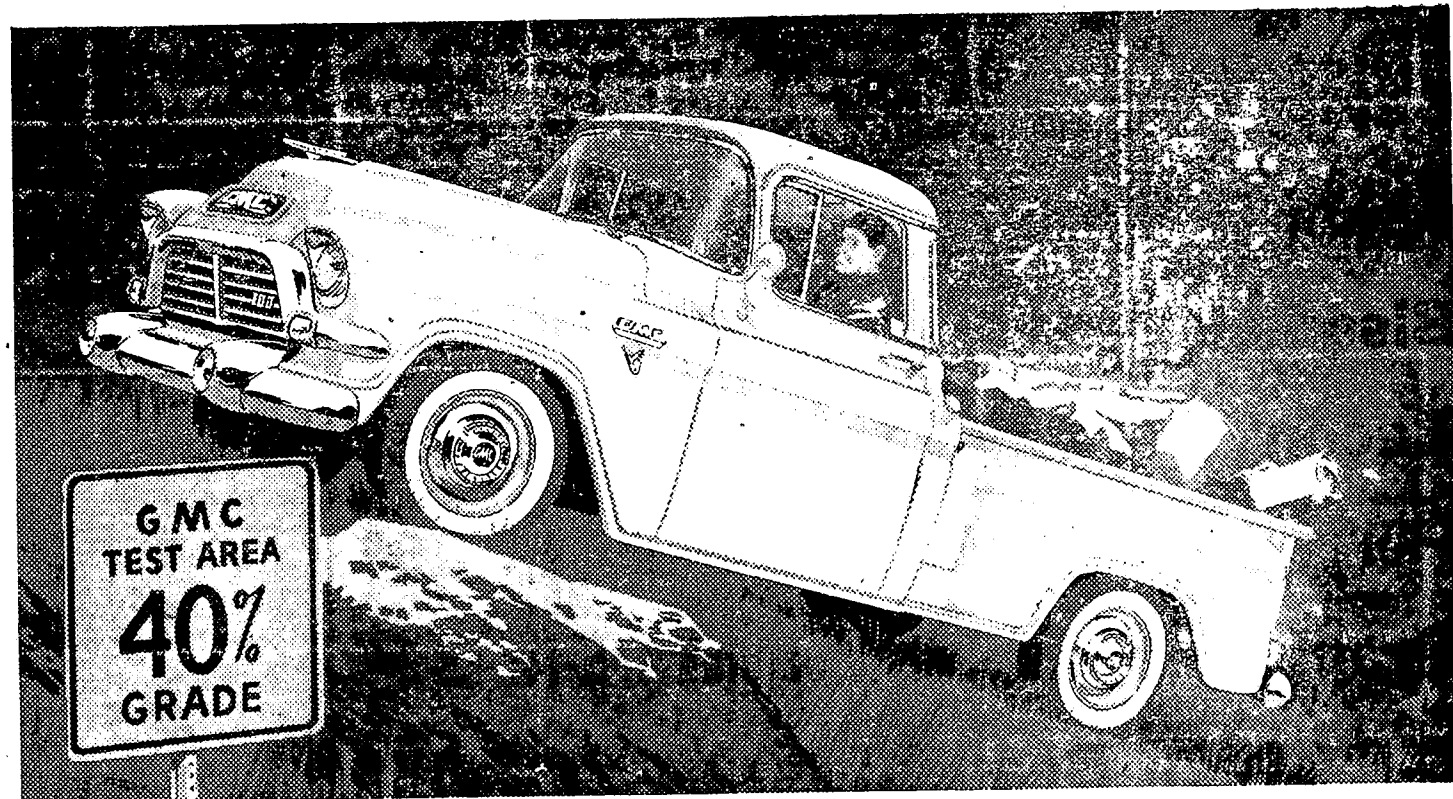
