COMMON SENSE PREVENTS CHRISTMAS TREES FIRES

Strict observance of common sense fire prevention rules would reduce the frequency of home fires during the Christmas season. states Francis M. Hartman, University of Michigan expert in fire safety.

Since the Christmas tree has been involved in some of the most serious fires, considerable thought should be given to its selection and care, he stresses. Choose a fresh tree. An old tree is dry and brittle and has falling needles, and is highly flammable.

Keep the tree outdoors with the base in snow or water until it is ready for use, he advises. Just before setting up the tree, saw off the trunk at an angle and at least one inch above the original cut. Then place the trunk in a water container and keep the container well supplied with water. Support the tree substantially and place it away from heat sources and so that it does not block windows or doors. Remove

Do not use candles on the tree or any place where they may come in contact with combustible Hartman warns. See that your strings of lights are in good condition and that they do not overload the circuit and blow a fuse. If extension cords must be used, keep them near the wall and away from walking areas. Be sure that all electrically lighted decorations are turned off before retiring or before leaving the

the tree as soon as possible.

Use non-combustible material such as glass, metal, and asbestos, for decorations wherever possible, he urges. Don't let Christmas wrappings accumulate in the home; place them in a metal covered trash barrell or burn them in an incinerator as soon as possible. The fireplace often becomes a dangerous burning place for wrappings because of screen removal, overloading and overheating, and the hazard of flying sparks from the chimney.

The room containing the tree is where there is a concentration of fire hazards. As a precaution, plan on what to do if fire should break out. Plan alternate ways of getting adults and .children out of the house. Look up the fire department phone number and put it in a conspicuous

Check over your fire-fighting equipment and see that it is available and in good working condition—your fire extinguisher and garden hose. These steps can make your Christmas a fire-safe Christmas.


