JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES PLAN AREA CONVENTION

Jehovah's witnesses of the Drayton Plains congregation are preparing to attend their regular semi-annual area convention at Mt. Clemens, Michigan, December 28-30, it was announced today. More than 1500 are expected at the gathering from 19 congregations in southeastern Michigan, including Bad Axe, Port Huron, Holly, Milford, Birmingham and intervening points.

Mr. W. P. Strong, local presiding minister, in discussing this announcement, pointed to the distressed world, with people filled with fear, dread and unhappiness, much in need of hope and real happiness.

"The theme of the program, 'Happy People Serving the Happy God', explained Mr. Strong, 'highlights the efforts of everyone of the preaching fellowship of Jehovah's witnesses to make good use of the Bible in bringing to distressed and worried persons the good news of a happy, trouble free new world, soon to come, under God's Kingdom. This work and hope brings much happiness to Jehovah's witnesses now.'"

Mr. Strong said that Jehovah's witnesses conduct five classes weekly in ministerial training to better convey this good news. "We believe a christian should share this happiness and firm hope with others", he emphasized, "effectively telling it to others, showing faith in God and His Kingdom by such work."

"For that reason, the Watchtower Society, of Brooklyn, N. Y., will sponsor the three-day Mt. Clemens training program." He concluded, "which will be attended by 140 from the local congregation." The last area assembly held by the 19 congregations was in Caro, Michigan, last June.

"The Nun's Story" - Kathryn Hulme. Portrait of a Belgian girl who turned aside from marriage to enter a famous nursing order.

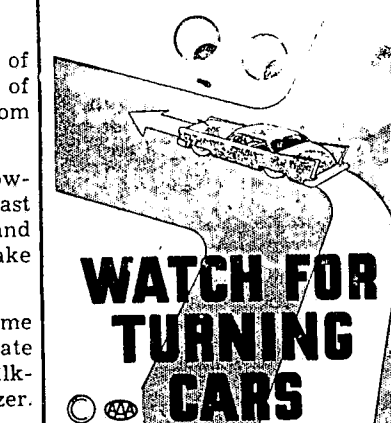
"Our Flight to Adventure" - Tay and Lowell Thomas, Jr. The extraordinary story of the authors' adventures in the out-of-the-way places of the world.

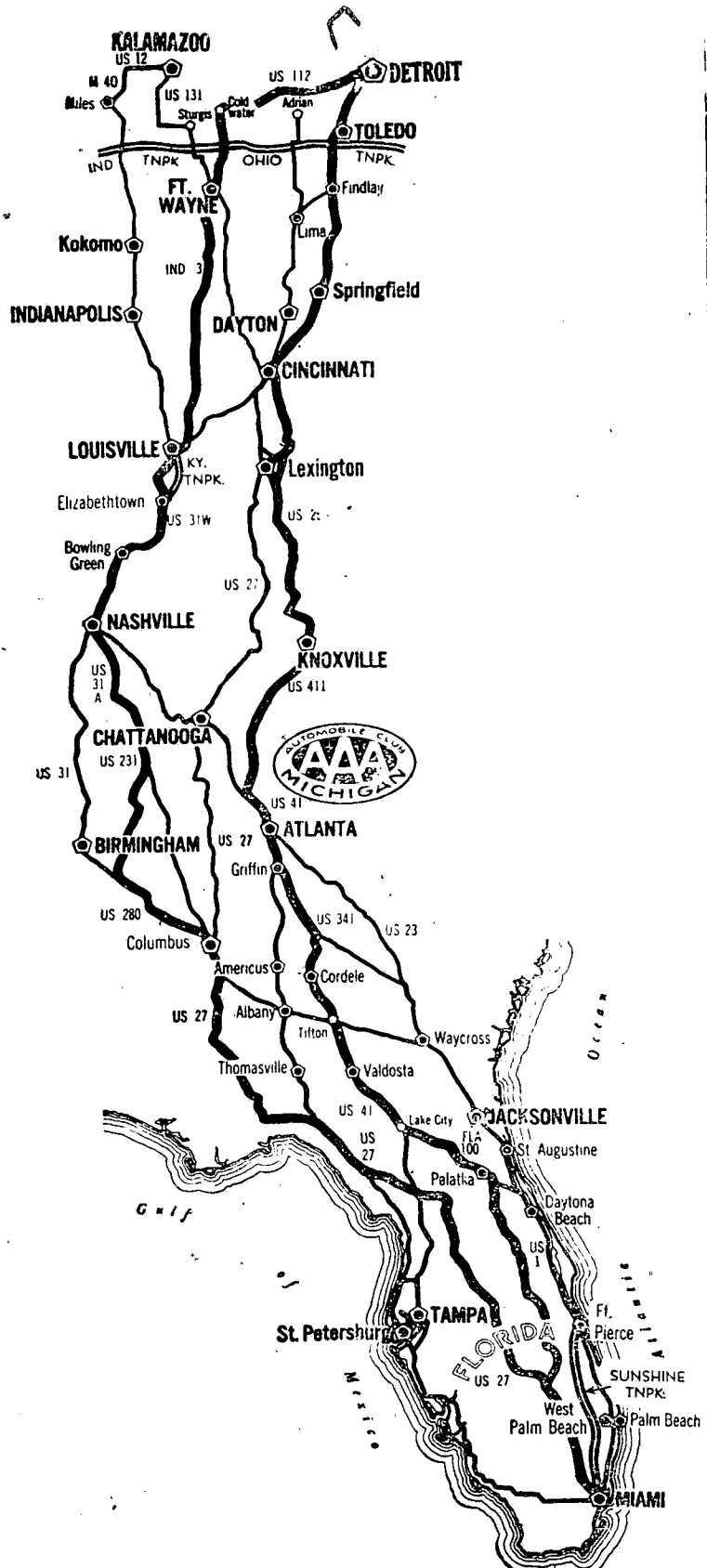

SUGGESTIONS FOR CARVING

Carving—the turkey at the Christmas table is part of Christmas tradition. To make it easy for the host to carve Mary Hixon, Home Demonstration Agent, suggests you plan to take the turkey from the oven 15 to 30 minutes before serving so that meat juices can be absorbed.

The platter should be large enough to allow ample space for the sliced meat. Unless the garnish is simple, provide a plate to which it can be transferred.

- 1. Remove the wing tip and first joint by grasping the wing tip with your fingers; lift up and sever between the first and second joint. Place the wing tip and the first joint portion on the side of the platter. This is not customarily served. Leave the second joint attached to the bird.

- 4. To slice the white meat, begin at the front end of the turkey and slice until the wing socket is exposed. Remove the second joint of the wing and continue slicing white meat until enough slices have been provided or until the breastbone is reached.

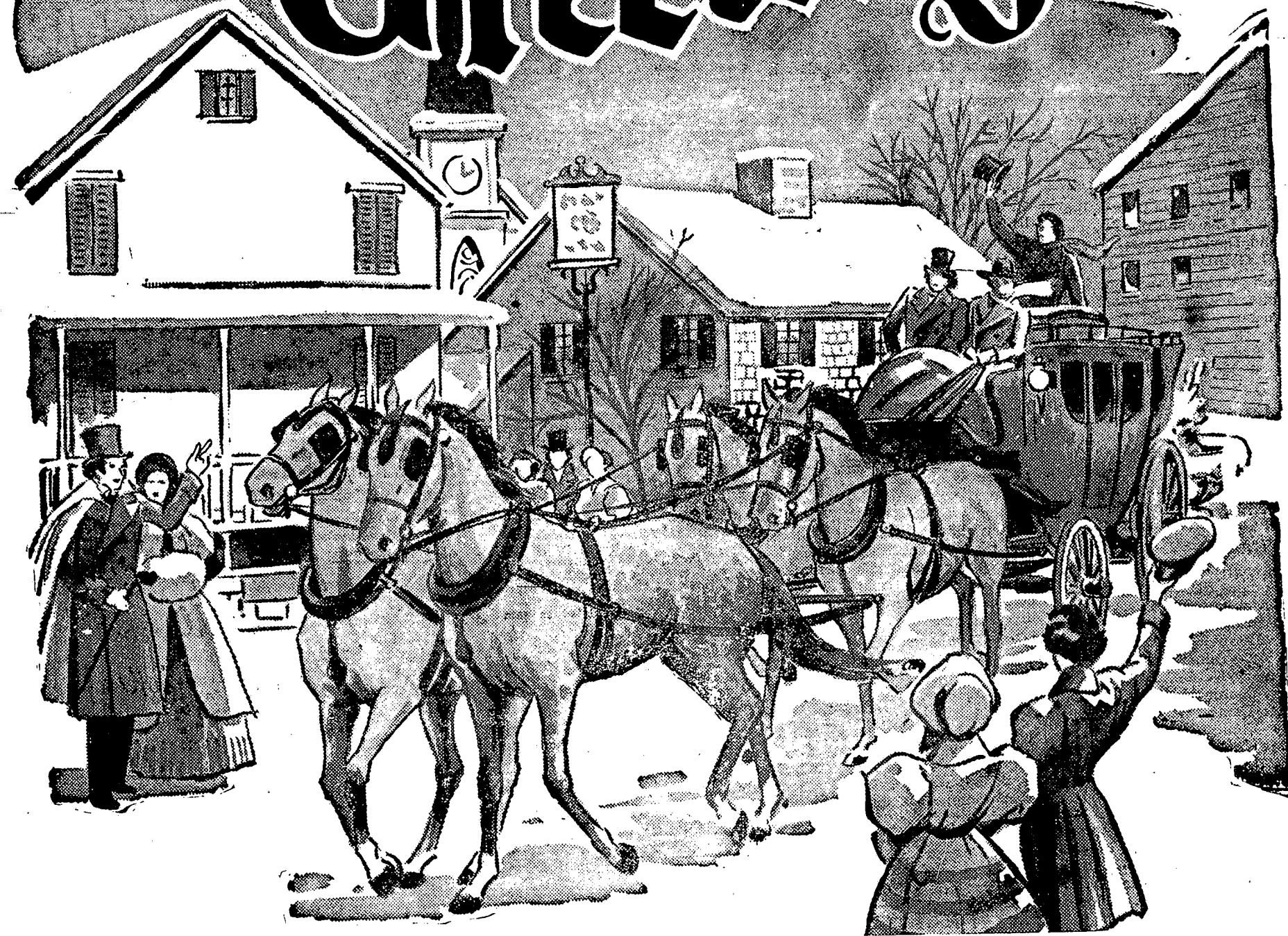

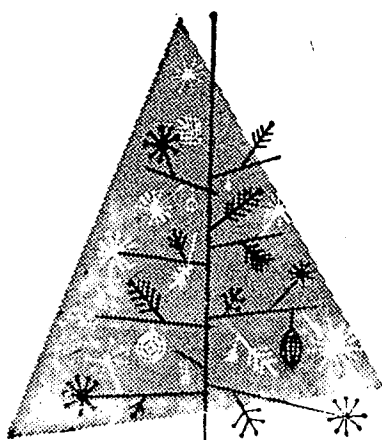

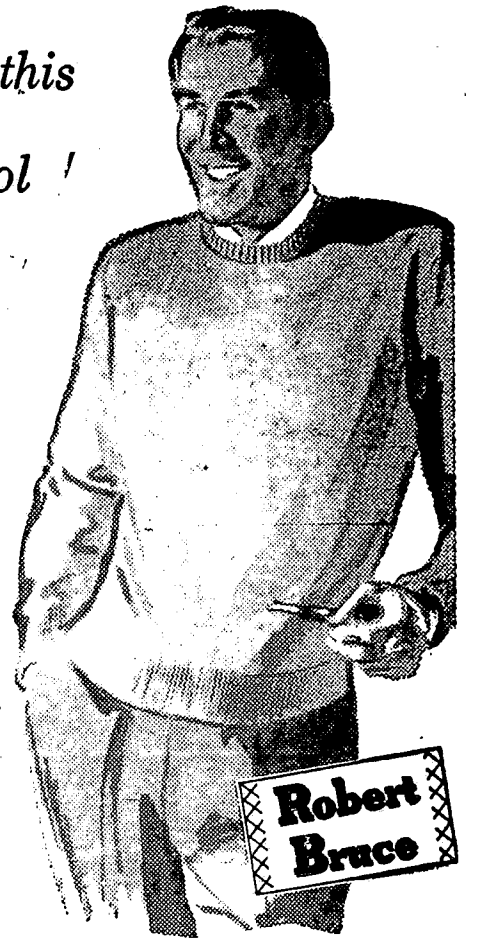
