Europeans Receive Warm Welcome

Many people from Eastern Europe, including East Germany, have found new homes in America through assurances furnished by individuals through the co-operation and support of church congregations. Up to December 7 over 12,000 have resettled this year. Over the three years over 1,500 have been resettled in Michigan by Lutheran congregations.

Last summer the Board and Pastor of Christ Lutheran Church made plans to co-operate in this program. The church was given the names of Martin and Ingeborg Elstermann and son, Michael. They come from Berlin, and Mrs. Elstermann is a refugee from East Germany. The processing was accomplished quite quickly, and on December 24, Reverend Anderson was notified that they would be in New York on December 27th. They arrived in Detroit on December 28th.

Already Martin and Ingeborg Elstermann and their three-year old son, Michael have won their way into the hearts of those who have met them. They are already at home in a little brown cottage on the Edmund Winderle property on Hatchery Road. Many articles necessary in a home have been given to them and the kindness and friendliness of the folks of Christ Lutheran Church has been wonderful.

There are many tangible things still needed and of great importance is foodstuffs—canned goods and staple goods. It won't be long before these new people are entirely established in home and work.

Chairman Named For March Of Dimes

Mrs. Everett Dennis has been appointed Clarkston 1957 March of Dimes Chairman, and Mrs. Jerry Montreuil is assisting her as co-chairman.

"Although the Salk vaccine has cut the incidence of polio during the past year," Mrs. Dennis said, "less than fifty percent of the children and adults who are subject to polio have received their vaccine shots. This means that we can still have a high incidence of polio in 1957, which will require raising large sums of money, and in addition to this, we now have over 30,000 children and adults who need help in their rehabilitation from crippling polio."

"Doing all we can to give these polio victims the care they need," she added, "is just as important a part of the March of Dimes victory over polio as the Salk vaccine. That is why we have chosen as our 1957 March of Dimes slogan, 'Let's Finish the Job!'"

Last year Oakland County contributed over \$161,000 to the March of Dimes, \$869 of this amount coming from Clarkston. As of today, Mrs. Dennis said, the local March of Dimes chapter is helping 240 children and adults to rebuild their lives as a result of polio. It should be pointed out that care in a case of polio can and does often exceed \$5,000.

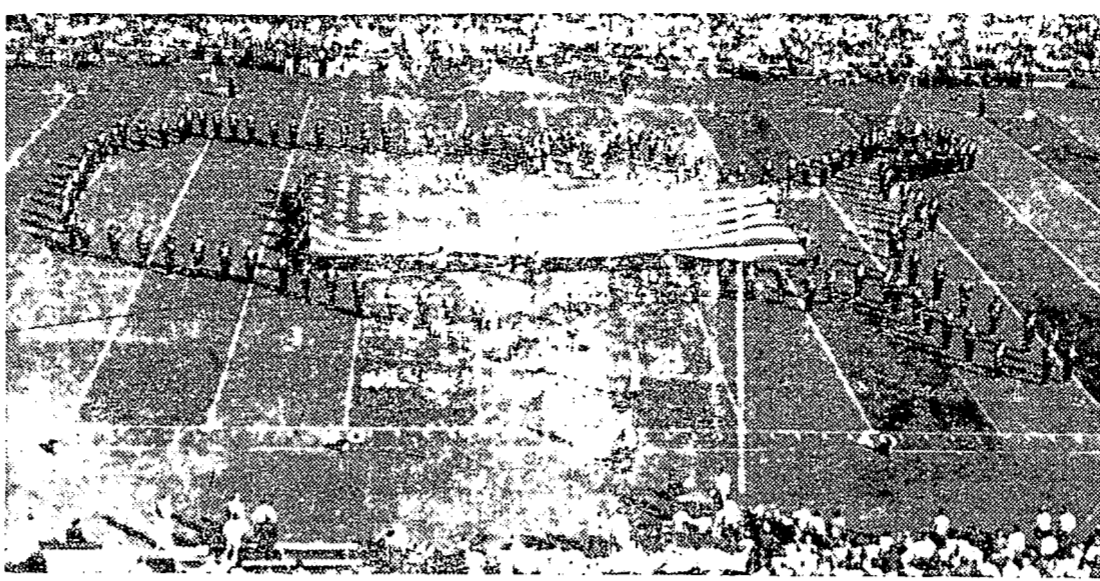

Did you know that three glasses of milk each day can provide more than one-third of the protein you need to maintain good health and vigor.

There are 19,000,000 doses of polio vaccine now commercially available in the United States. There are no restrictions on the use of this vaccine. It will be valueless unless used in the next few months.

60% of the children in the age group of 1 through 14 in Michigan have received at least two doses of polio vaccine. Another 16%

have received one dose. This means that 24 of every 100 children in this age group have received no vaccine at all. Teen-age group is very slow to get protection of Salk vaccine, despite fact they make up 15% of all polio patients. In California this fall (1956), only 7 out of every 100 in the age group 15 through 19 had received any vaccine at all. In New York City fewer than 10 of every 100 had received it.
