#### Clarkston Senior Wins Scholarship

One senior at Clarkston High School has been named a finalist cipal S. F. Goedde. The local est scorers on a nationwide college aptitude examination given to 162,000 seniors in 12,500 high schools on October 24.

The Clarkston finalist is David Lissner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Lissner of 7800 Dixie Highway.

The finalists now face a stiff three-hour College Board examination on January 12, plus intensive screening of their leadership and extra-curricular records by a selection board.

At stake are more than 700 four-year college scholarships. many of them sponsored by business and industrial corporations. Included are 100 Sears-Roebuck Foundation Merit Scholarships and nationwide programs sponsored by such companies and foundations as Pittsburgh Plate Glass, F. W. Woolworth, Standard Oil (Indiana), International Nickel, and many others.

The January 12 examination will be given in designated testing centers throughout the country, and at least 7,000 of the Merit Finalists are expected to survive this hurdle, according to John M. Stalnaker, President of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

In the final phase of the competition, the other accomplishments and the character of the competitors will be evaluated. About April 25, a fortunate 700 will become the Merit Scholars of 1957.

The runners-up will each receive a Certificate of Merit, attesting to their high ability; and all colleges and universities will be notified, enabling these students to be considered for thousands of other awards and prizes.

The 700 Merit Scholars choose the colleges they wish to attend. The value of each scholarship varies with the financial need of the student, ranging upward from \$100 per year (minimum honorary) to \$2,200 per year or more.

The colleges chosen by the Merit Scholars will receive supplemental unrestricted grants averaging \$2,000 per scholarship (over the 4 years) to help defray the actual cost of educating the students.

The program is designed to search the nation for those students most able to benefit from a college education, regardless of means. Once discovered, the students are supported in college by funds provided by business dividuals interested in helping students of high ability. Some 23 of these groups financed Merit Scholars in 1956, and over 40 business organizations are planning to support Merit Scholars in

Nine rooms and the cafeteria kitchen in the north wing of the Pine Knob Elementary building have been completed. The eastwest wing will be completed in approximately three weeks. The elementary children attending school on half-day sessions in

the Sashabaw area began full-day sessions Wednesday, January 9, with the exception of the first grades. The first grade children will re-

main on half-days until the completion of the east wing. Everything possible is being done to expedite the completion of the school. The contractors and the sub-contractors have worked several week ends, employed additional help and so forth in an attempt to recover time lost due to the delay in obtaining steel.

A date for an open house will be set subsequent to the completing of the school at which time it is hoped that a great number of people will avail themselves of the opportunity to visit and examine the Pine Knob Elemenary school.

Enrollments in the Clarkston Community Schools were increased by 25 new enrollees following the holidays, bringing the total net increase in enrollment since September to 64.

The Pine Knob Elementary School located ane-half mile north of Maybee Road on Sashabaw, consists of 25 classrooms, cafeteria kitchen, office facilities, faculty and health rooms.

The structure is brick veneer exterior over painted cinder block interior walls. Spectra Glaze blocks were utilized for wainscoat in the corridors. Floors in the classroom and corridors are of asphalt tile over concrete base, and ceramic tile was used for

oilet room floors. Ceilings throughout the structure are of Robertson acoustical

The one-story structure utilizes aluminum sash and directional glass block. Aluminum sash being used on the northerly exposures and combinations of sash and glass block on the south and west exposures. Plastic roof ceiling bubbles supplement the natural lighting. Artificial lighting is obtained through the use of incandescent silver globe fixtures.

The building, designed to acomodate 750 children, is located on a twenty acre site and contains 32,000 square feet. The architect was Leo J. Heenan. General contractor was Bun-







If they can be washed, try using rich, lukewarm suds, washing the gloves on your hands. There is an exception to this rule, however. Chamois and doeskin gloves should be washed


The second step, according to to remove the gloves from your hands by rolling gently from the wrist, then rinse them in cool water. To knead out excess moisture, roll them in a turkish towel-starting with the finger tips and rolling toward the wrist section. Next, unroll the gloves immediately, blow into them to puff them into shape and dry ndoors away from excessive heat.






