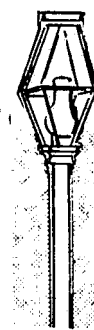

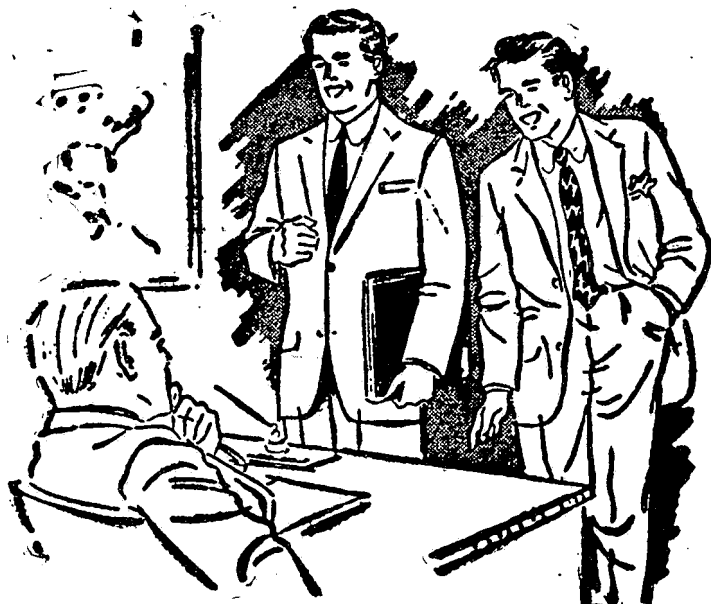

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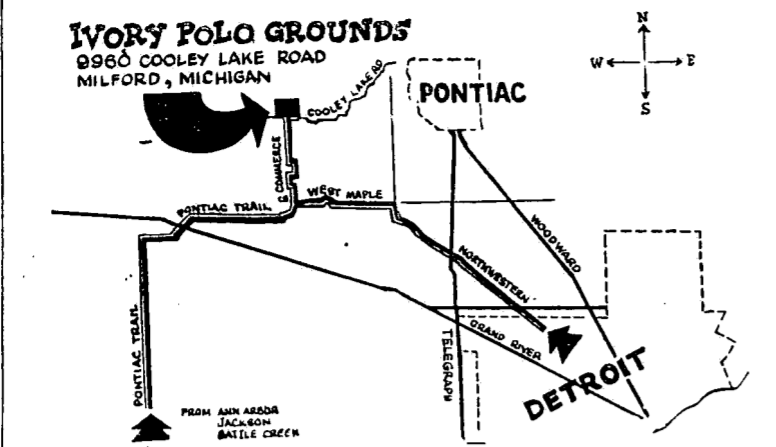
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The map shows the way to the place where there is fun for all the small fry—the new Ivory Polo Grounds at 9960 Cooley Lake Road in Milford, eight miles west of Pontiac. The grounds are easily accessible by good roads. And it's worth the journey, even for those who must travel some distance. For this is where the children can get free pony rides any weekend in the year, provided the weather is favorable. The ponies will be available every weekend from now on, after school on Fridays; after 2 p. m. on Saturdays and after 1 p. m. on Sundays. Approximately five miles of pony trails have been built on the 140-acre estate. Six handsome hitchies will be on hand to make sure that no young visitor is disappointed. Special arrangements may be made for pony rides on other days. Arrangements may also be made to have the ponies brought to outings and parties for children anywhere within a 50-mile radius. There is no charge for this service. While the snow lasts, the children can enjoy their rides in sleighs. In warmer weather, fine wagons will be available for the rides. And the weather will have to be very unfavorable before the ponies will be kept in the barns. Only in very wet weather or in extremely cold weather will it be impossible to offer the free rides.

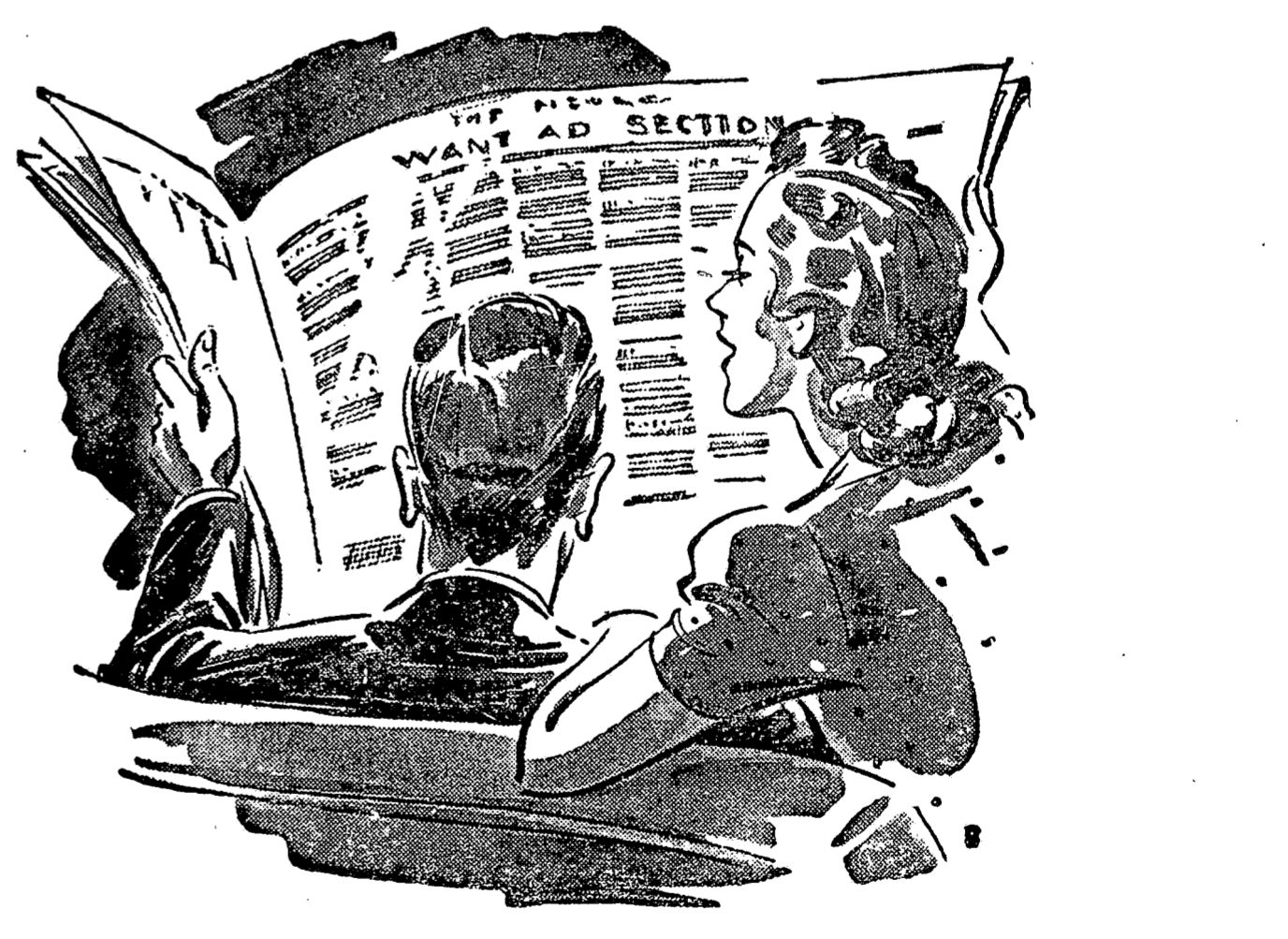
