Young People Tell U. N. Experiences

Last Sunday morning at the two worship services of the First Methodist Church, Clarkston, three youth of the church's Methodist Youth Fellowship, addressed the congregation on their experiences at the annual United Nations Seminar for youth held at the United Nations in New York City and Washington, D. C., recently. The three youth, Pat Thayer, Suellen O'Dell and Ira Pence, are all outstanding students in the Senior Class of the Clarkston High School.

There were among fifty youth from Michigan who were sponsored by the Board of World Peace of the Methodist Church who attended the seminar where they studied the organization and functions of the U. N. While there they were able to see King Ibn Saud of Saudi Arabia, observe the appeal the Hungarians were making against Communist Russia for their recent aggression, and the attempts to settle the Suez-Israeli-Egypt-Gaza Strip controversy.

The three youth addressed the more than three hundred and thirty members of the congregation on the text taken from Isaiah 24, "And He shall judge among the nations, and shall rebuke many people; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more."

Miss Pat Thayer indicated the attempts the U. N. was making in serving as an agency of peace among the nations of the world; Mr. Ira Pence pointed out the strength the U. N. has gained through the use of it in settling international problems, and Miss Suellen O'Dell, besides describing the physical features of the U. N. building, revealed the work UNESCO and other agencies were doing in relieving poverty, suffering, and ignorance around the world.

From New York City the three youth went to Washington, D. C., where they held interviews with Congressman Broomfield and Senators Potter and MacNamara. Following tours and conferences with several members of government they returned home to report their experiences to their community.

THE GARDEN GATE

When the calendar indicates that Spring is so tantalizingly near, and the view from the window belies our hopes, forcing cut branches indoors will bring a real lift to the winter-weary gardener.

Almost any early blooming tree or shrub can be forced; even later flowering plants, although these take somewhat longer. A good time to cut is on a rainy day when the temperature has risen somewhat. Stem ends of all branches are crushed with a hammer, then placed in deep, warm water and set aside in a cool place. After ten days or so, buds start to break. These early ones can be brought into a warm room where they will continue the opening process and provide a constant source of pleasure for many days.

Practically foolproof is forsythia, as are branches of winter jasmine, plum, cherry, apple or any other native fruit tree. Spirea and huckleberry will produce dainty miniature blossoms.

For buds that are hard and tight, such as horse chestnut and poplar, special treatment is needed to hasten the blossoming. Submerge them overnight in a washbasin of tepid water before placing in deep water. Wisteria and lilac branches also benefit from this treatment, and to get bloom from these two one must be sure to use those with flower buds. Branches of the multiflora rose as well as those of the garden climbers force easily and provide excellent material for arrangements.

The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

Sec. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954).

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

Sec. 506. Any registered elector or may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the (30) days next preceding any election or primary election, (unless such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day), provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

Sec. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have

the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

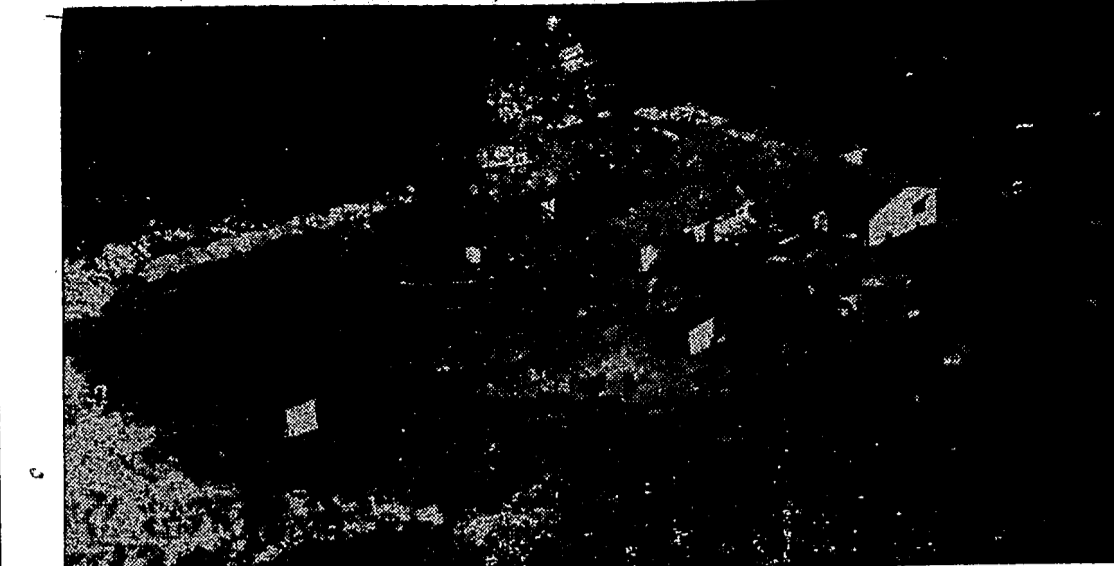

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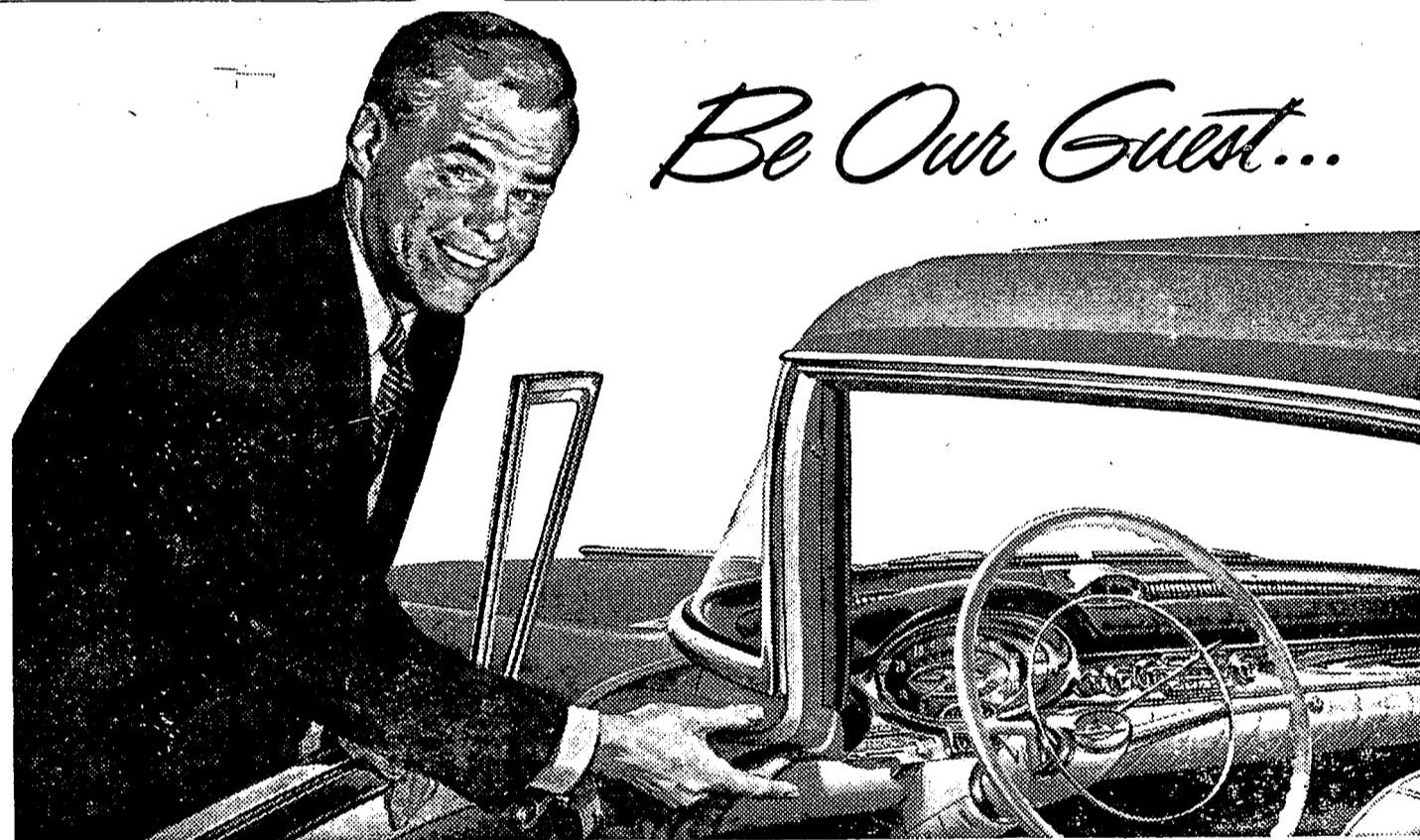

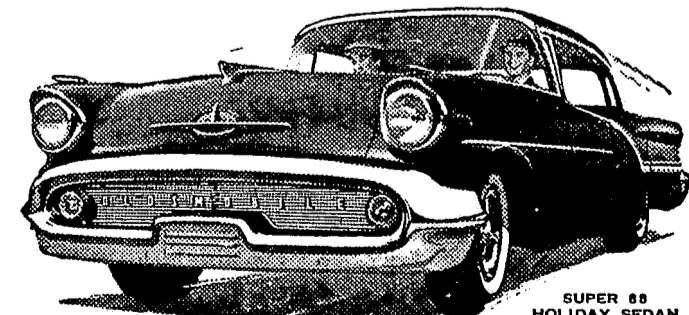

PRIMARY SCHOOL FUND GETS LARGE CONTRIBUTION FROM MICHIGAN BELL

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company's payment to the state Primary School Fund was the largest in the company's history and Michigan Bell remained the largest single contributor, in 1956.

The amount was \$9,792,322, in state property taxes. Michigan Bell, in common with railroads, Pullman, railway express, telegraph, and other telephone companies, pays such a tax earmarked for the Primary Fund in lieu of other property taxes.

Ray H. Storm, manager for the company, reported that \$11,857 of the total tax payment was allocated to the public school system of Clarkston.

Schools throughout Oakland County, including the village of Clarkston, received a total of \$801,601 from Michigan Bell's tax payment.

Storm said the payments were based on a school census of 2,208 in Clarkston and 149,274 in Oakland County.

Divided by the state school census of 1,823,080, based on 1955 figures, the tax amounted to \$5.37 for each youngster in the state between the ages of five and 19.

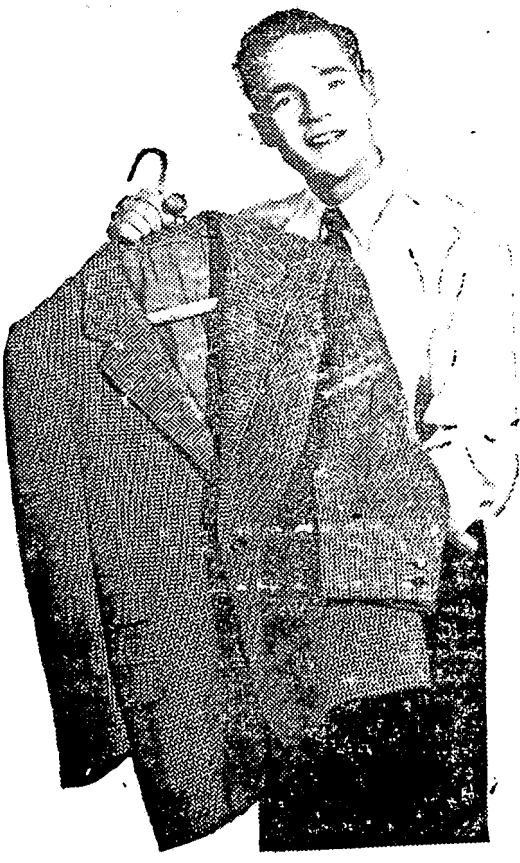

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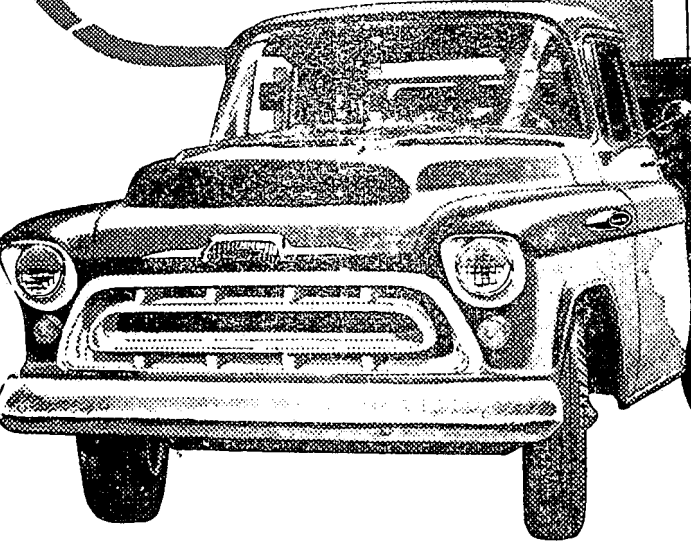
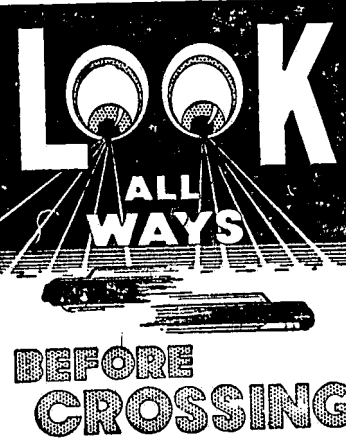
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WSU FRENCH STUDY TOUR TO VISIT FIVE COUNTRIES

The new pens are to replace the old quill-type, one of the main sources of dirty hands and smeared clothing. The new type of pen has been tried on an experimental basis in some schools with a noted improvement in legible writing and cleaner hands and clothes. land, points out that mother's woes may be doubled if she attempts to remove ball point inks from Junior's clothes with the use of water. The usual procedure for removing ink stains with spotting agents containing water may set the stain so that

it cannot be removed by any other method. The Institute points out that these stains must be removed with spotting agents that are basically made up with a drycleaning solvent base rather than a water base.

Ink stains are very complex in their composition. For removal from fabrics, they require all the skill and technique of an experienced spotter. Much time and patience are required, too, to remove these tenacious stains. The new ball point inks contain dyes that penetrate rapidly. They are much more difficult to remove by bleaching and soaking than are the dyes used in ordinary inks. So even though Junior's writing may be more legible with the use of ball point pens, it is wise to entrust his ink-marked clothing to the professional cleaner for removal rather than to set the stain permanently with home methods that just won't work!

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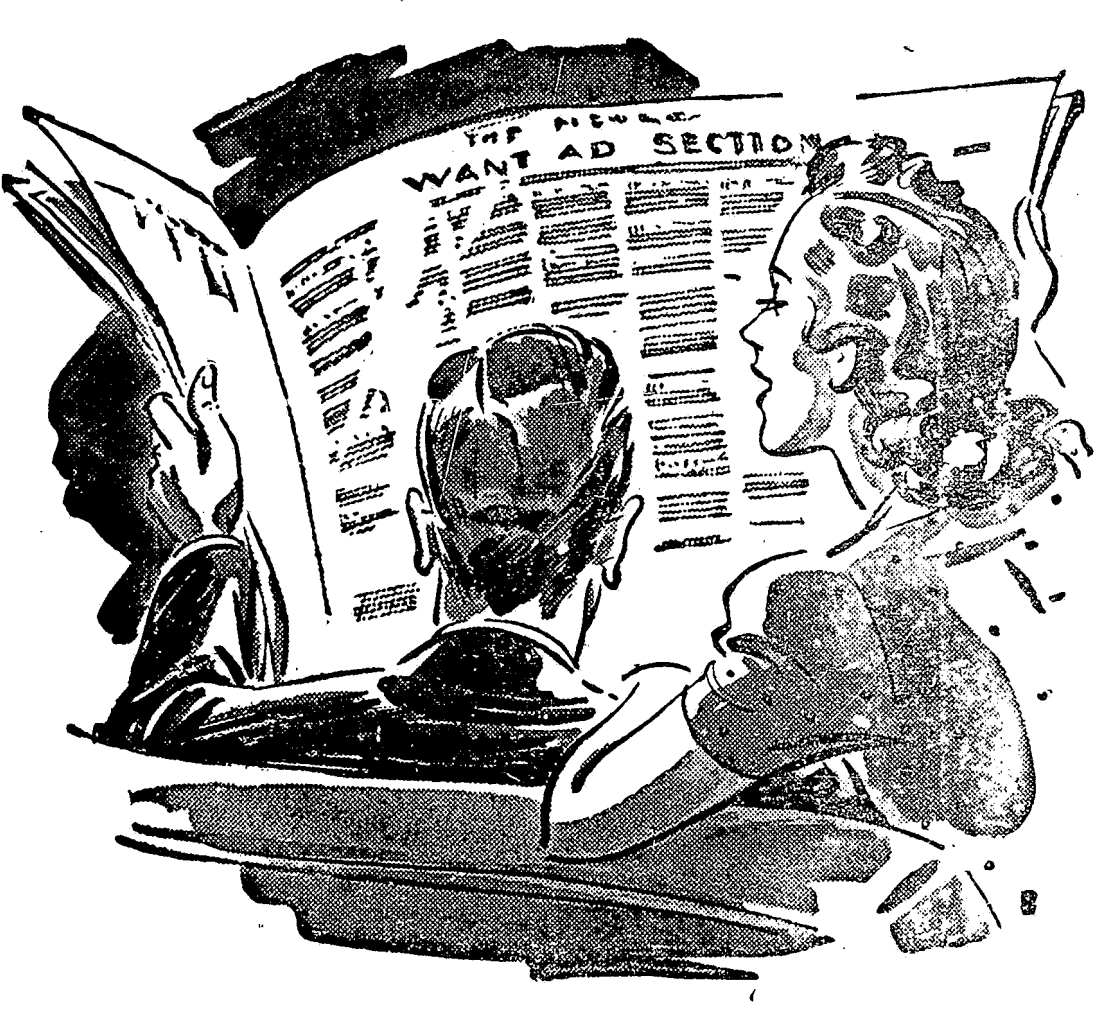

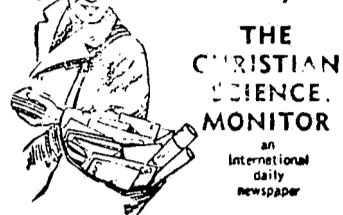
