CLARKSTON SCHOOLS TO HOLD SCIENCE FAIR

The Biology Club of Clarkston High School is sponsoring a Science Fair to be held at the High School. It will involve the Elementary, Junior High School and High School while short films will be shown continually. It will be the first Science Fair this school system has ever held and it is hoped that we will be able to include other schools in our area next year.

There are expected to be from twenty to thirty projects entered. The judges will be Mr. Green, Principal; Mr. Green, Superintendent and Mr. Hart, Chairman of the Biology Department at Commerce High in Detroit.

The purpose of this Science Fair is to create interest and to serve as motivation for students in the science area. Also to promote scientific attitudes and scientific thinking which is becoming a necessity in our way of life today.

Some of the projects already entered are:

1. A living starfish, sea anemone and sea horse belonging to Larry Stelmack and Bob Price;
2. Taxidermy displays by Chuck Hancock and Fred Turek;
3. Bone structure of a muskrat by Bill Jacobs and Don Jockwig;
4. Bone structure of a dog reconstructed by Pat Thayer;
5. A bacteria culture by Mary Inman;
6. The nutrition experiment made by the 7th grade.

nights. They are held from 7:00 to 9:00 p. m. although they usually run overtime. The first meeting there were 18 participants and there were 28 at the second.

Mr. Hart, who has been a science teacher, has helped tremendously with the Science Department at Clarkston.

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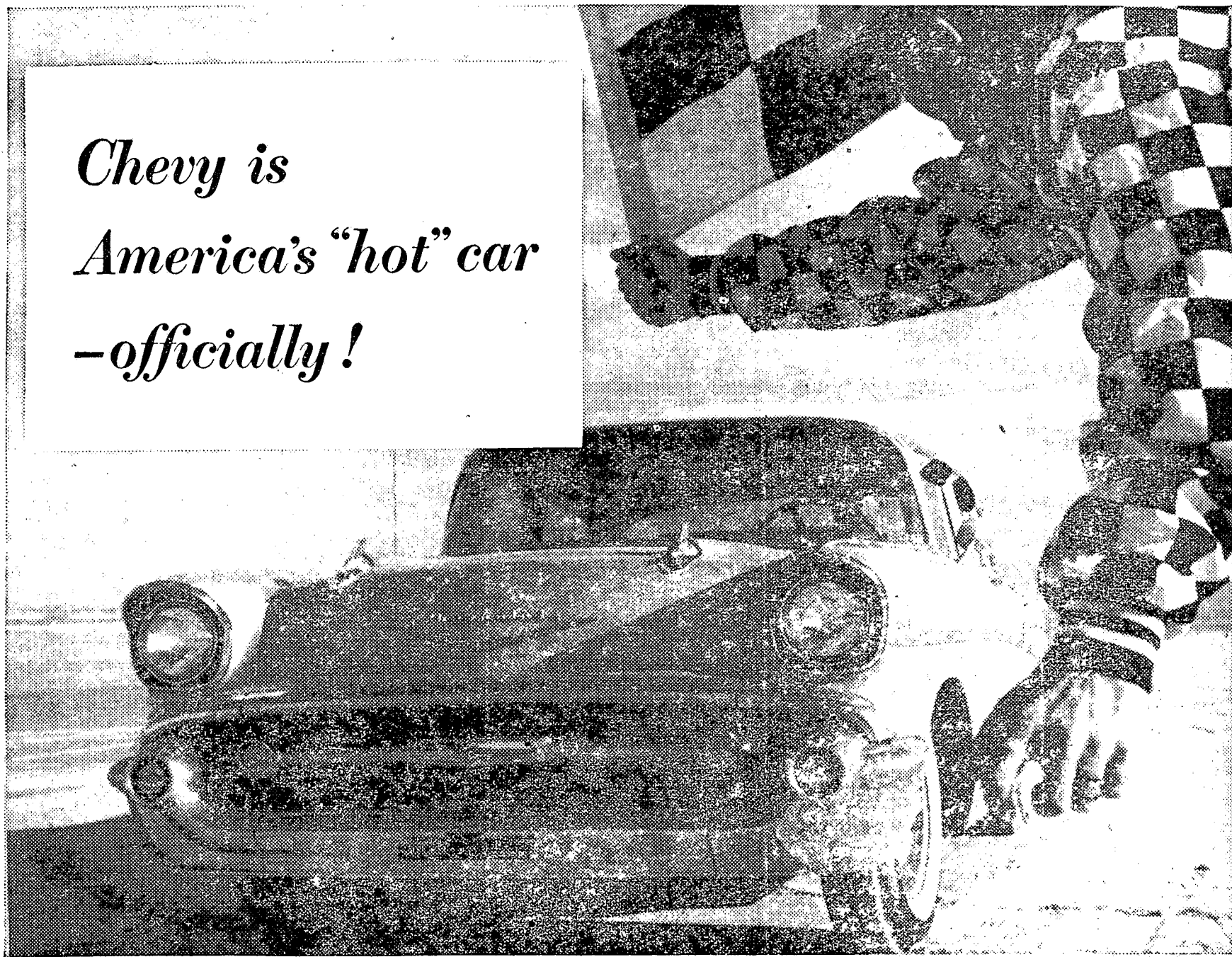

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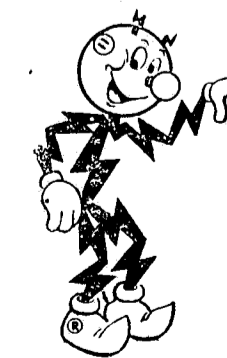

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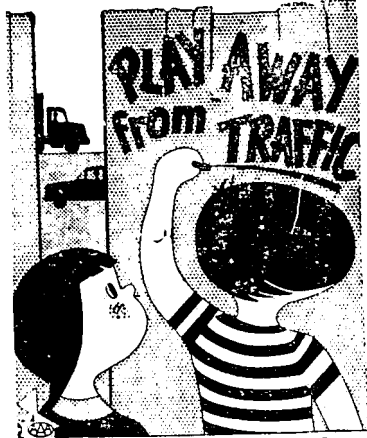
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IMMIGRATION OFFICER EXAMS TO BE GIVEN

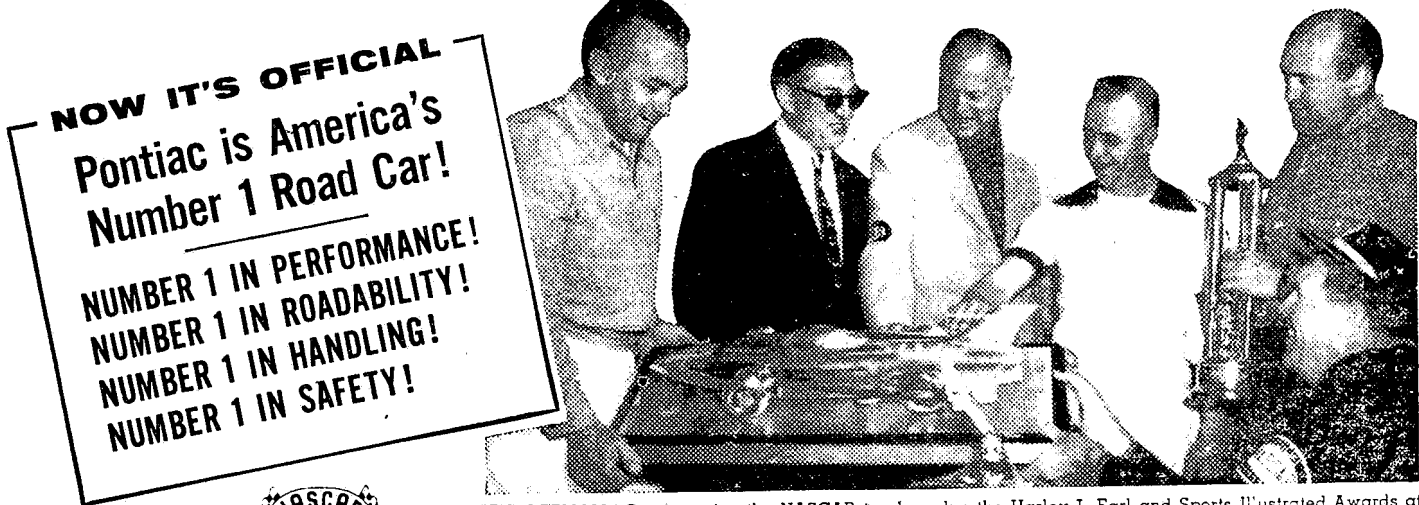

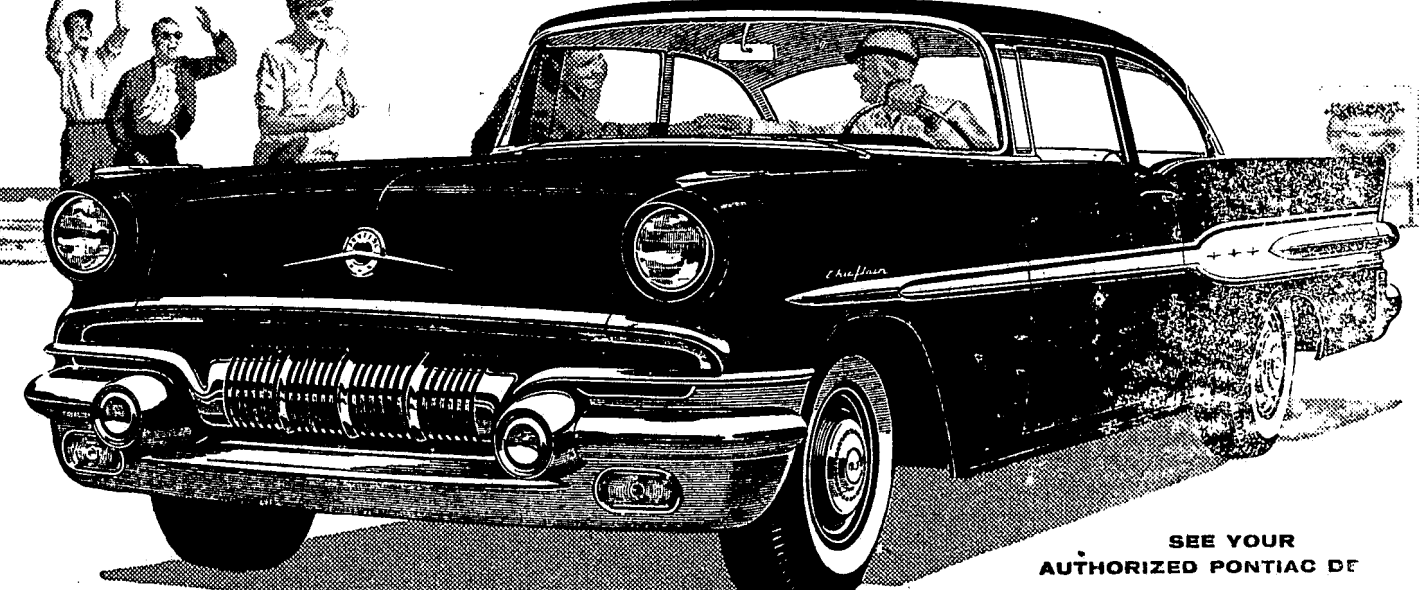

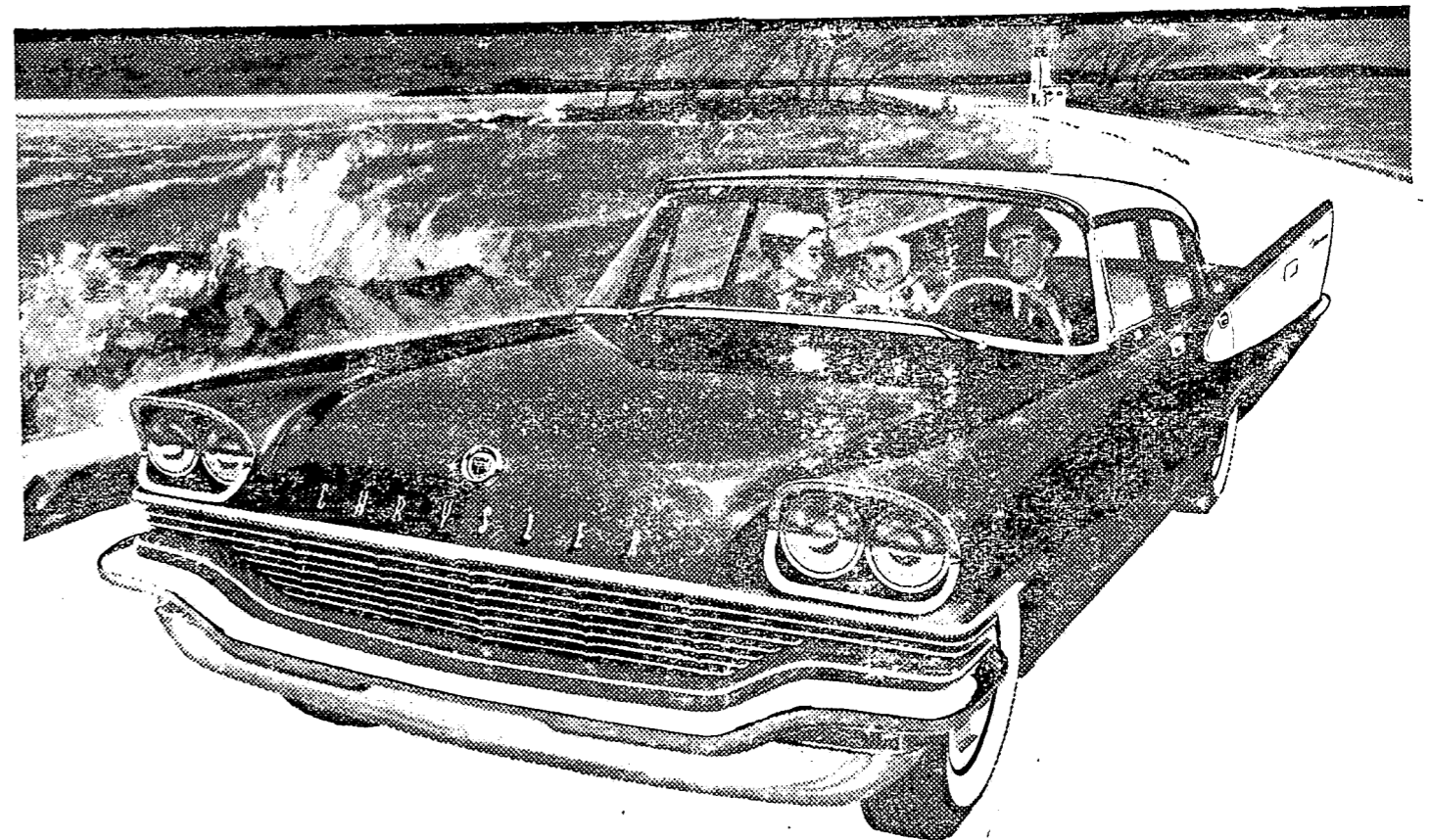
