Beno and Sylvia Rabinof famous violin and piano team will appear in concert at 8:30, Saturday, March 16, in Isaac Cray Auditorium. This will be the fourth concert in the current series under the auspices of Waterford Civic Music Association.

just returned from a successful tour of the European continent. They are now on their 12th nationwide tour. The International Exchange has invited them to make a tour of the Near East in the future.

Mr. Rabinof was born in New York of Russian-American parents. He began his study of the violin with his uncle. After studying with Franz Kneisel and Victor Kuzdo, he was accepted by the great teacher Leopold Auer. At the age of 19 he made a brilliant debut at Carnegie Hall. He has since then appeared as soloist with every major symphony in the United States.

Mrs. Rabinof accomplishes the remarkable feat of accompanying her husband entirely from memory. She is an accomplished pianist who gave up her own career to become the accompanist of her famous husband.

She is a composer with a children's operetta and a suite for Chamber Orchestra among her works.

Mr. Rabinof will play this concert on his famous Guarnerius violin. This was made by the violin maker in 1742, and is one of the three "singing sisters" in existence. It is valued at \$40,000 and the bow which he will be using is a fine Tourte bow which is insured for \$3,000.

The last quarter found Avondale still in the race as they tied the game at 37 with only 6 minutes to play. Clarkston, not ready to call it quits, surged ahead.

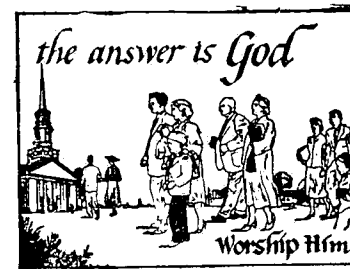
LeRoy Parks and George Lang put into action their well-known stall during the last few minutes of the game.

**SCHOOLS NEED FEDERAL AID**

Michigan's public schools need federal aid, says Howard R. Jones, professor of school administration at The University of Michigan.

"We must reach into the pocket where the money is, not which is exhausted", he declares. "The federal government collects 80 per cent of all tax monies and we have been overlooking our greatest source of revenue."

He points out that the state's drastic need for more school building has been brought about by a population increase which has mounted steadily over the last 16 years.

"In this period of time we have more than doubled the number of births in Michigan. We're adding about 70,000 school children a year. By this time, it's obvious that the people who thought the birth increase was a war-time bulge were wrong," he says.

What tax source are we going to draw on to meet this need? Says Professor Jones, "Many of us feel the property tax is already overburdened. This has been the traditional source of local school revenue for school building purposes."

"Generally, we would turn next to the state. In Michigan this would mean additional forms of taxation because the sales tax is at its present rate proving inadequate. We are running about \$20 million short in sales tax revenue to meet state aid to educate in full for 1956-1957. There's not much likelihood of additional state aid unless we have some additional revenue measure at the state level," he says.

In Professor Jones' own opinion "There is not the risk of federal control in aid to school building that there might be in current operations or school salaries. Further, we have at least two instances which show we can have federal aid for education without federal contract: the GI Bill which was administered with very little control, and federal aid to hospital building, which most people feel has been given without much control."

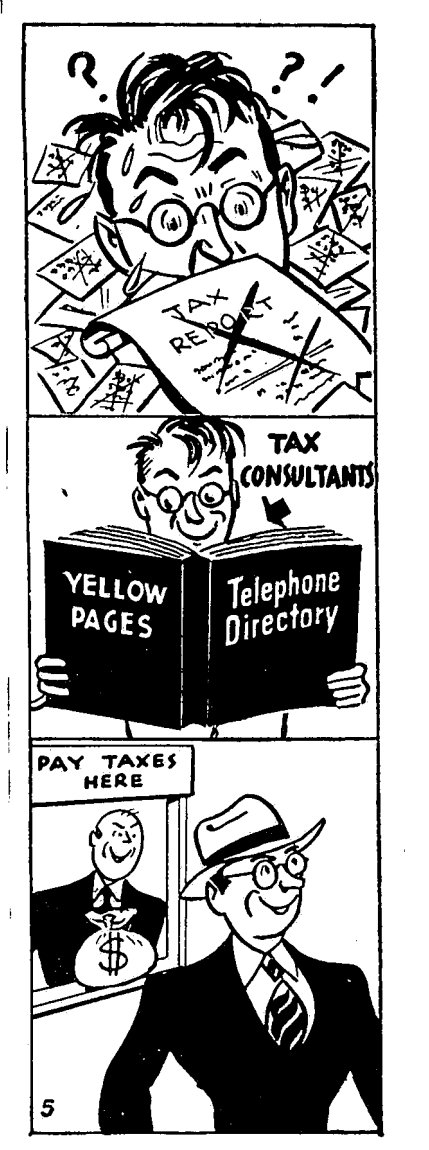

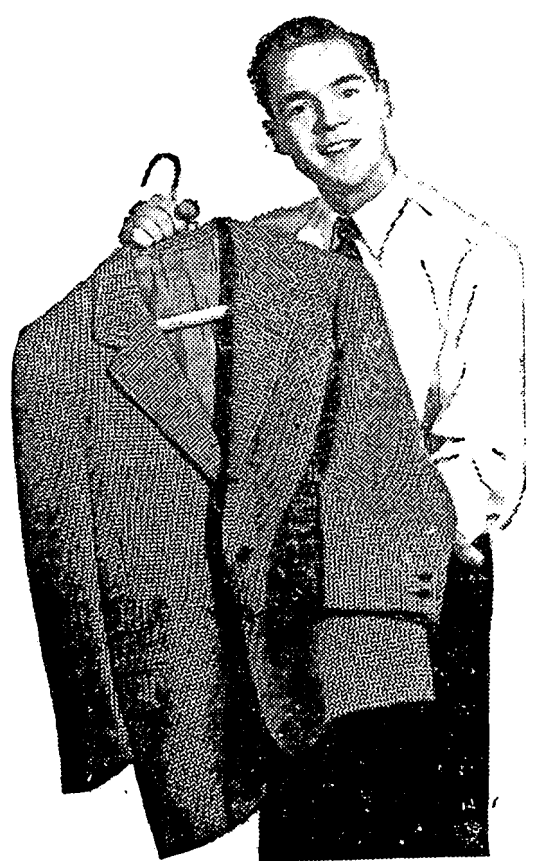

TELEPHONE CO. PLANS MOVING TRUNK LINES

Michigan Bell will excavate a trench to bury telephone cable along the Dixie Highway (U.S. 10) from the Pontiac city limits to Drayton Plains, district manager Ray H. Storm has announced.

In a project estimated to cost more than \$300,000, existing cable will be lowered from telephone poles and buried, and more cable will be added along this route.

The additional cable will bring more telephone lines to rapidly growing areas around U.S. 10, and provide more trunklines to Drayton Plains and Clarkston from Pontiac. The new cables will run underground to Waterford, and above ground on telephone poles on U.S. 10 and M-15.

The new cables, Storm says, will enable the telephone company to meet demands for new service, and allows upgrading of existing party lines when desired.

Some of the cable required for the job, Storm said, will contain as many as 3,600 individual wires and cost nearly five dollars a foot. He said the job is due to be completed this May.

The \$300,000 cable project is part of the \$4 million in new construction Michigan Bell has scheduled for the Pontiac area this year.

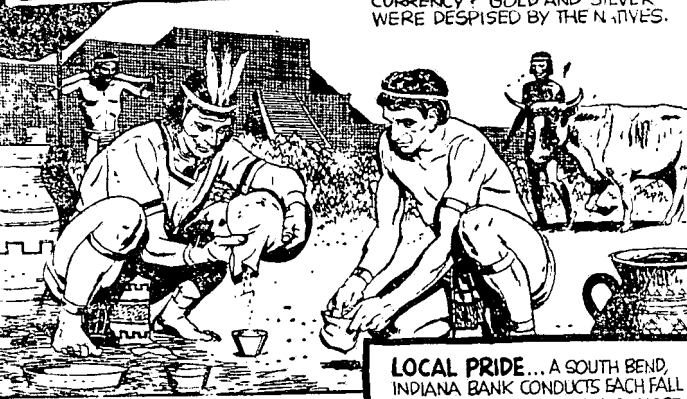

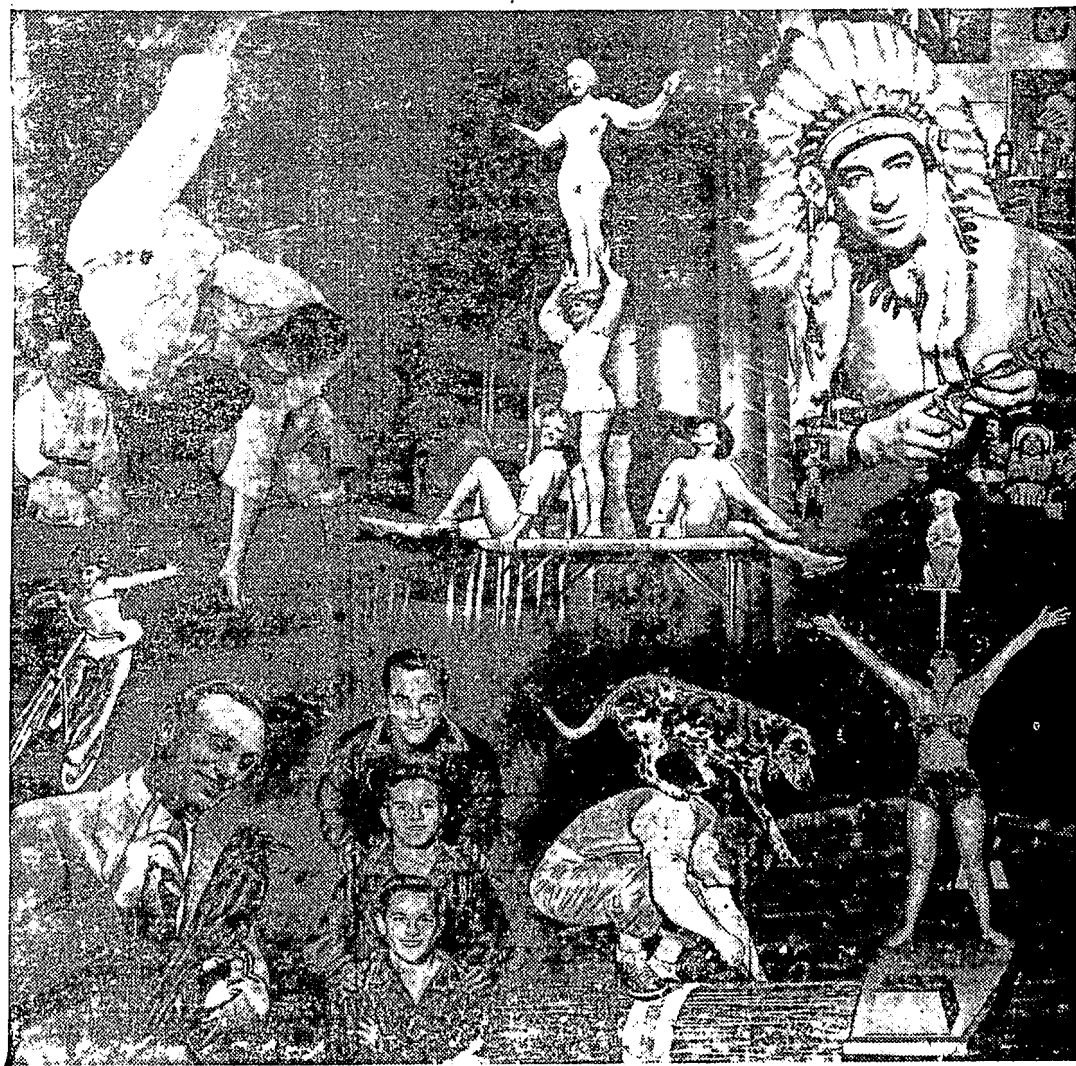

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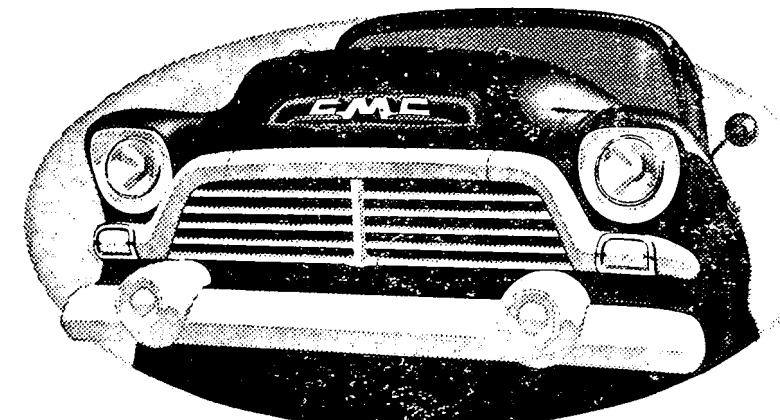
