Mrs. Dove Riley, who has been in Pontiac General Hospital with a broken hip, has now been transferred to the Hospital Annex building on Telegraph.

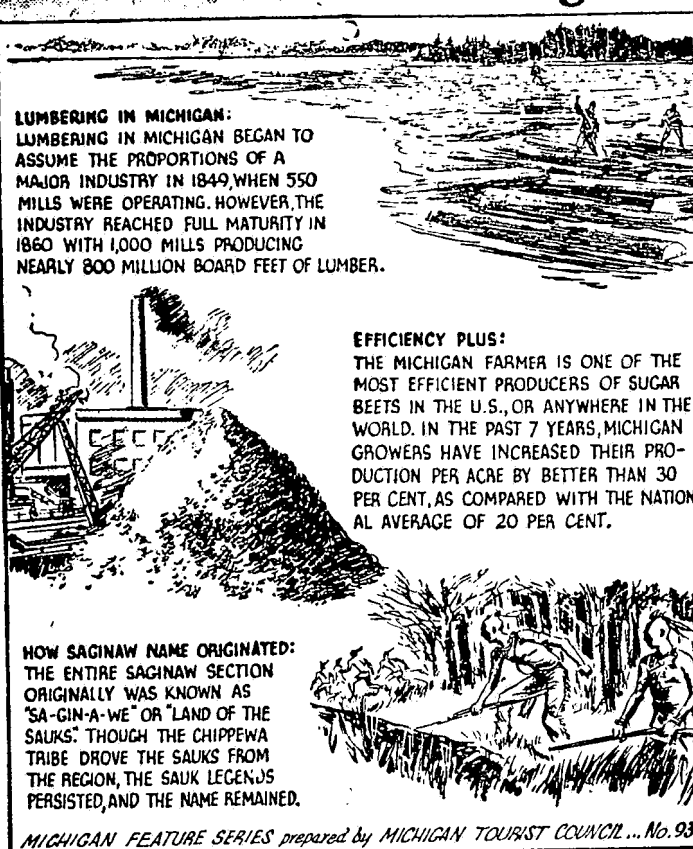

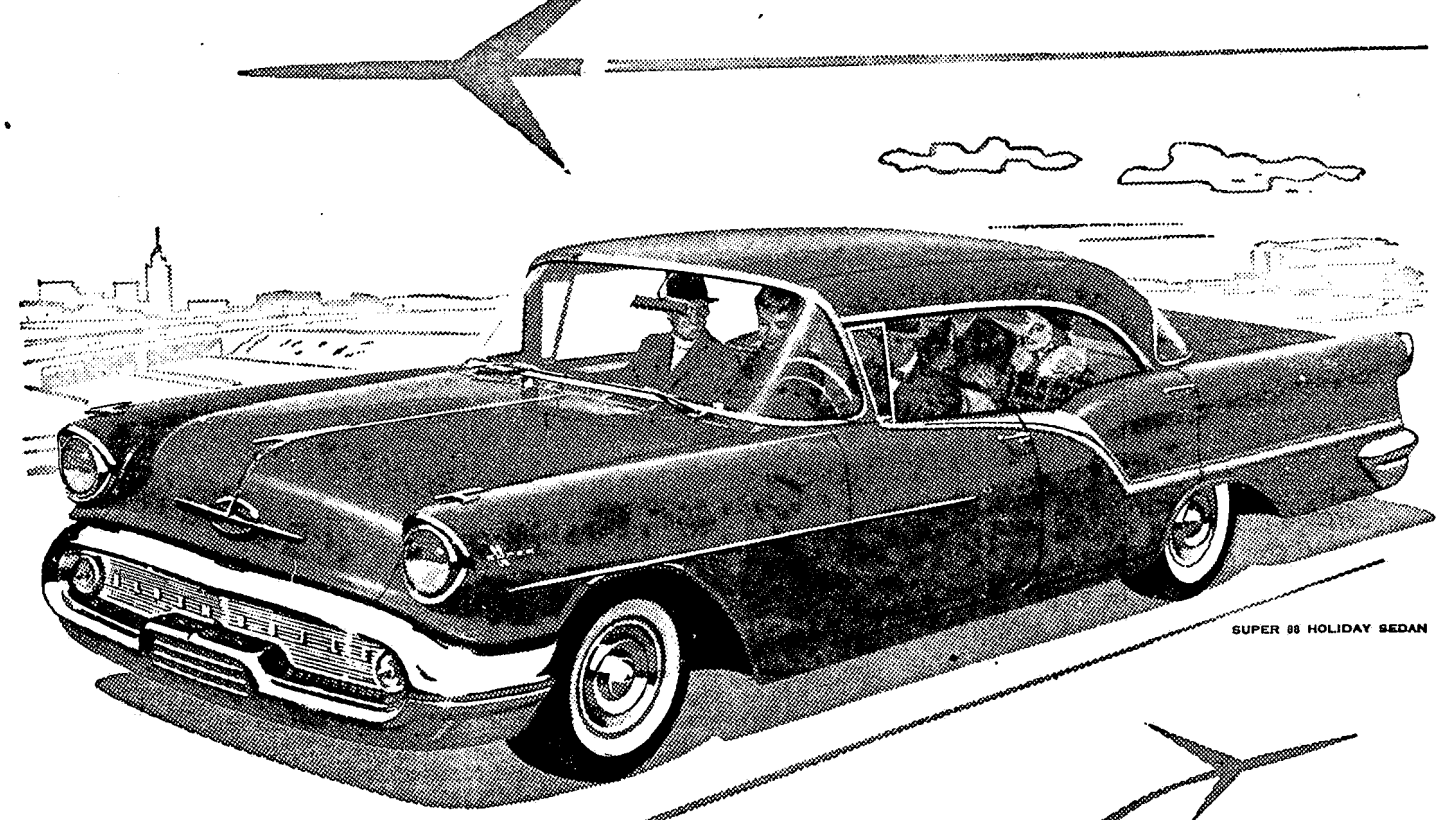

One wonderful week, of your choice, during July or August of 1957, is offered at Higgins Lake, near Roscommon, Michigan. Room and board are furnished. Instruction in Conservation may count for college credit (one hour toward a degree) or not, as you wish. The course is taught by college professors, each a specialist in his field. According to Mrs. Davidson, who has previously taken the course, it is one of the most wonderful experiences of a lifetime from the standpoint of fun and acquiring knowledge.

Transportation to the lake and back is the responsibility of the individual. Buses do run to Roscommon. Clothing required for the week is heavy duty outdoor gear for hikes and field trips, swimming togs are optional, but Higgins Lake has been named one of the six most beautiful lakes in the United States. It has crystal clear water. Upon completion of the course, trainees will be expected to help Girl Scouts plan conservation projects, and will work with the Board of Directors of the Northern Oakland County Girl Scout Council.
