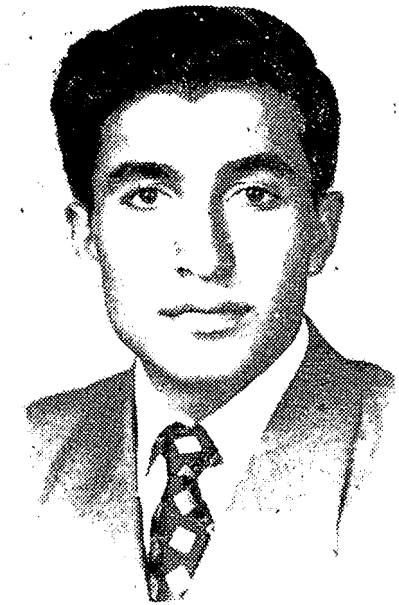

TORNADO PRACTICE DRILLS

The possibility of a tornado striking the schools is very remote. However, we want to assure you that the school administration and personnel have taken all possible precautions to provide maximum protection and care for your children should a tornado alert be sounded or a tornado strike.

1. It is recommended that children be kept in the school building. According to informed authorities, school buildings provide maximum protection if children are in designated areas.

2. Practice drills will be held in all buildings to acquaint your children with the procedure to be followed in getting to their designated protection areas in a tornado alert.

3. School personnel has been instructed as to procedures to follow to insure maximum child protection and care.

4. First Aid supplies have been made available in all buildings, and all school personnel has been given instruction in emergency first aid.

5. Please do not call the school during a tornado alert, as it is necessary to keep our phone lines open for emergency use.

The station is owned and operated by The Methodist Church, and just recently celebrated its 10th anniversary of broadcasting. First Church is proud to assist it in its celebration. The Worship Service will be broadcast at 3:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon. The Station has just doubled its power output and can be heard very readily in the Clarkston area, sometimes as far south as Ohio. Station WMRP is the only Methodist Church operated radio station in the United States.

Church Addition To Be Dedicated

The Dedication Service for the large, new addition to Christ Lutheran Church, Airport Rd., and Williams Lake Rd., will be held next Sunday, May 5, at 4:00 P. M. Special guest and speaker will be Dr. O. V. Anderson, President of the Illinois Conference of the Augustana Lutheran Church. The local congregation is a part of this conference comprising more than 175 congregations. Eleven pastors of the Eastern Michigan District of the Conference will also assist in the Dedication rite; Pastor Reuben Northing of Detroit is the President of this group. The Senior Choir under the direction of Mrs. Martin Wager will sing "A Mighty Fortress" by Mueller and "Alleluia" by James. The Children's Choir, under the direction of Mrs. John Wiley will sing "Dedication" by Mueller. A representative of the community churches and local government will bring greetings.

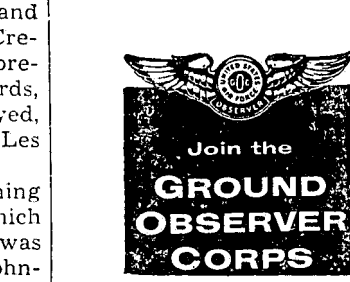
The recently completed addition to the Church is 40 ft. x 112 ft., and conforms to the Norman style of architecture of the first unit built in 1949. The seating capacity of the nave and choir is 460, and the overflow area in the narthex and Fellowship Room is able to accommodate 150. Included in the new facilities upstairs is a large pastor's office and the Fellowship Room with a fireplace. A basement under the entire structure provides facilities for parish education in the Sunday School, and the basement area has a stage and a seating capacity of over 350 at tables. The cost of the new building and furnishings was \$130,000. The Building Committee supervised the construction; the chairman was Robert Edwards, Mea of the Church constructed and installed the seventeen sanctuary lights in the Church.

The congregation was organized in 1944 under the leadership of Pastor Milton Lundahl, then pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church, Pontiac. Pastor Philip Jordan, now of Fresno, California, served the congregation until November, 1949 during which time the first unit was constructed. Arvid E. Anderson, present pastor, has been at Christ Church since June of 1950. The congregation now numbers 425 confirmed members and totals 700 baptized members. The Sunday School enrollment is nearly 500.

Following the Dedication Service next Sunday the ladies of the congregation will serve a light supper to all who attend. Pastor Anderson has announced that the public is invited to the Dedication events. At the 11:00 A. M. Worship Service the Lord's Supper will be celebrated and Pastor Anderson will preach the sermon on the theme: "We Dedicate Ourselves".

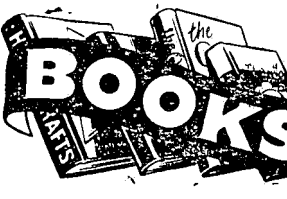

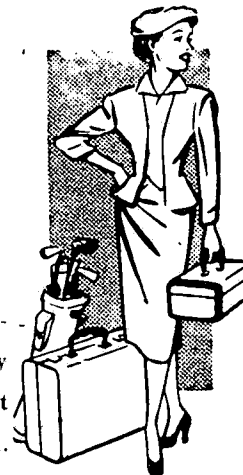

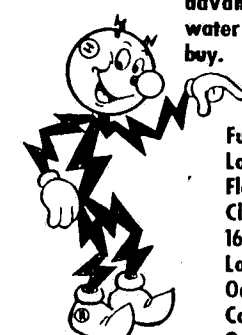
