THE GARDEN GATE



JUNE

For many people ground cover has become the happy solution to the problem of areas where grass will not grow. It is used effectively in covering banks too steep to grow and maintain turf, and also under many kinds of trees and shrubs, that due to their shallow roots and dense shade, do not permit grass to grow beneath them.

Ground covers are low growing ornamental plants that spread naturally over the ground. Some are planted for their beautiful evergreen foliage, others for their attractive flowers or colorful fruit. Examples of those that remain green throughout the winter are: common periwinkle, English ivy, and the low junipers.

Ground covers that have outstanding flowers are: evergreen candy tuft, snow-in-summer, creeping gypsophila, wild sweet william, moss phlox and violets.

For especially colorful fruit we depend on such plants as barberry, checkerberry, wintergreen, and to some extent the winter-creeper, low junipers and creeping mahonia.

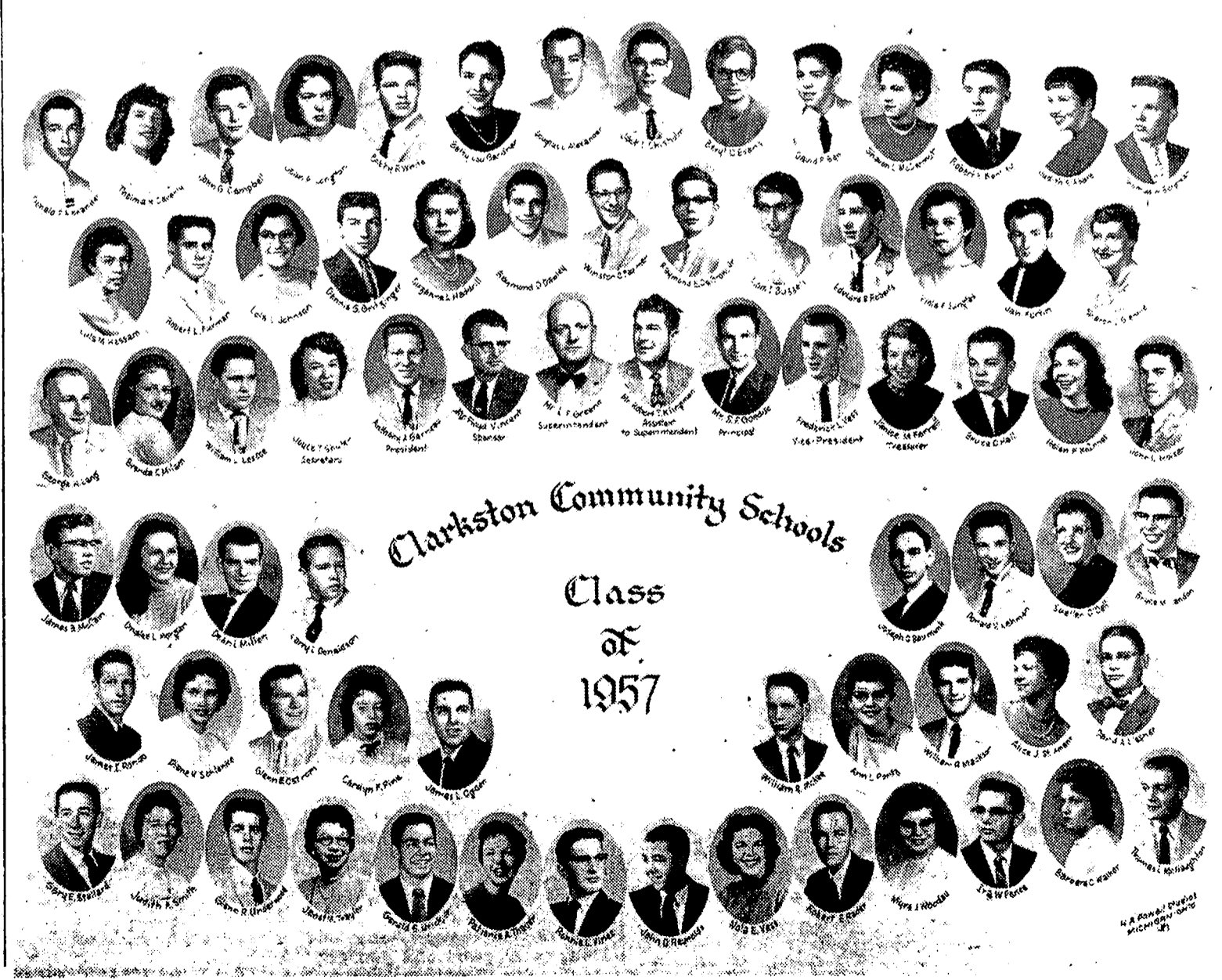
Ronald Roy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerard Roy, left Monday for Seattle, Washington, on his first step to Alaska.

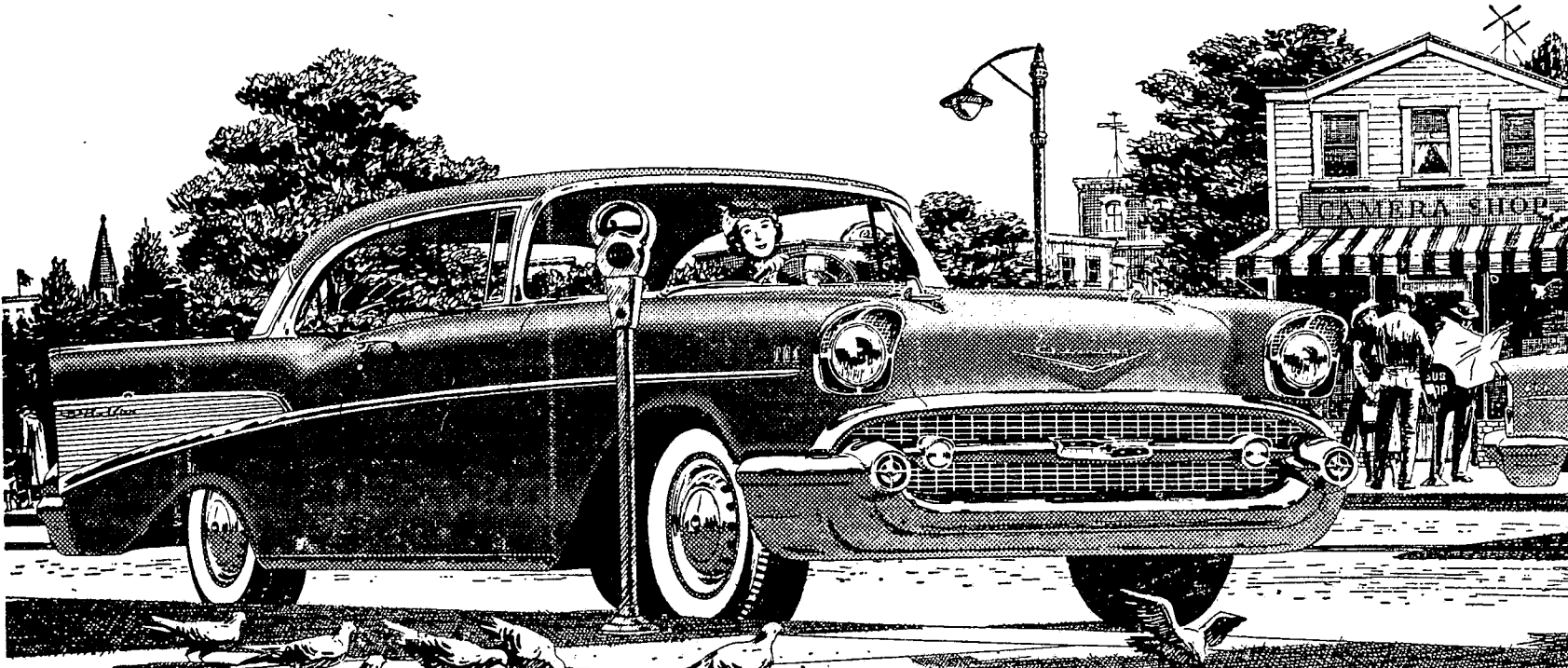

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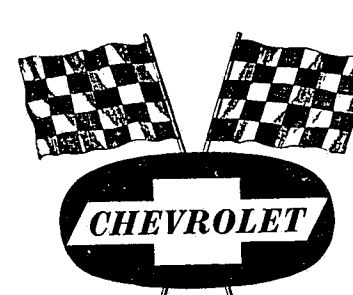
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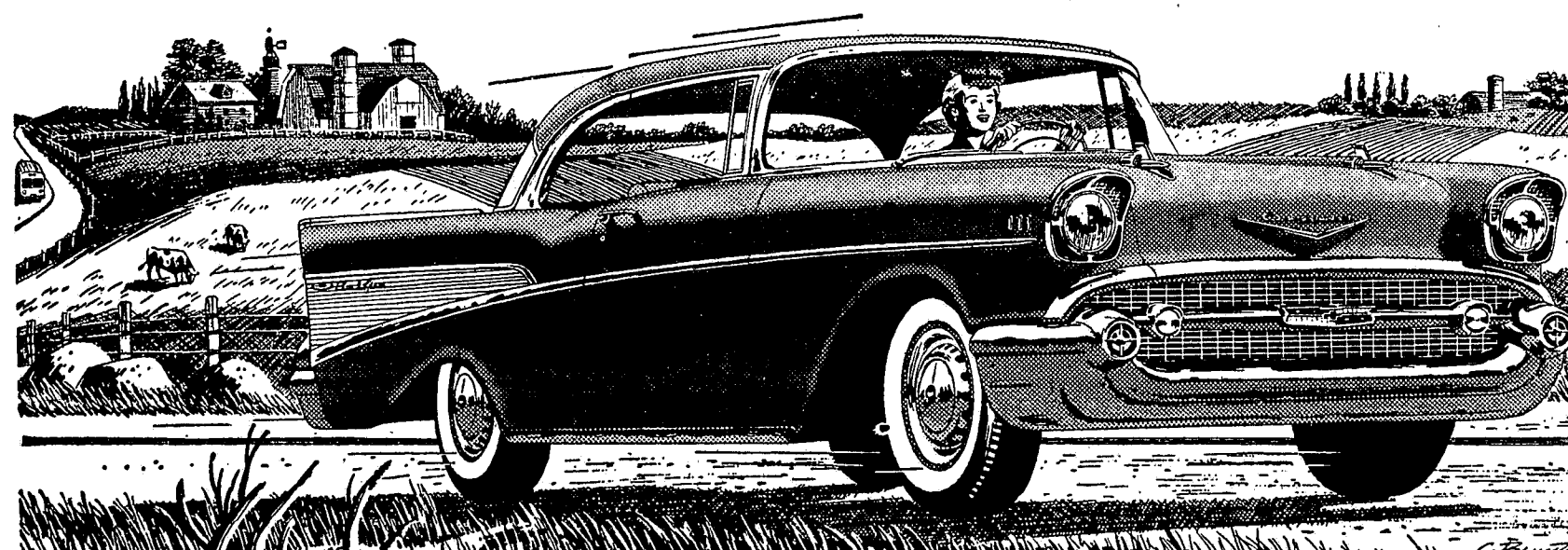
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BIG LAKE BEAVERS HOLD MAY MEETING

VICTORY LUNCHEON HELD MAY 24

One hundred forty Republican women attended a Victory Luncheon at Devon Gables on Friday, May 24, in celebration of a successful drive for funds in Oakland County. Mrs. Howard Liverance, vice-chairman of the drive, announced that she had \$8,850 on hand with several townships not yet reporting. The total figure is expected to reach close to \$12,000 when all contributions are in.

Mrs. Charles Dean introduced Mr. Kevin McCann, President of Defiance College and Special

Assistant to President Eisenhower. Mr. McCann gave high praise to the women for their enthusiastic efforts on behalf of the Republican Party and stated that the women were definitely responsible for the election of President Eisenhower.

In speaking of the National Budget and the furor which it created, Mr. McCann clarified the process by which the budget actually comes into being and stated that it is an expression of the will of the people, not just of the party or the President. For eighteen months prior to its presentation the budget is carefully prepared by permanent civil service men and women. Upon reaching the White House this year, the budget was cut 14 million dollars by President Eisenhower before it was sent on to Congress.

Mr. McCann stressed the fact that permanent organization in the Party, at county and township levels, is vital to the existence of that party and that herein lies the responsibility of women: to staff such an organization with volunteers and keep it going inasmuch as most business men have not the time to give to such a program of continuous planning and activity.
