SENATOR POTTER REPORTS

Mayflower II, famous replica of the ship which brought the Pilgrims to Plymouth Rock, may sail the St. Lawrence Seaway, calling at Michigan ports. Now being discussed in London is my invitation to bring the historic vessel into Lake waters.

When I presented the idea to Captain Alan Villiers, worldfamed skipper who sailed the Mayflower across the Atlantic, and Mr. Warwick Charlton, were enthusiastic. "Certainly the magnificent gesture of friendship which you have extended to the people of this nation", my invitation reads, "should be completed by bringing the Mayflower II into the industrial and spiritual heartland of America."

Such a voyage would focus world attention on the Seaway and the new Mackinac Bridge. As the Mayflower II anchored at Detroit, Port Huron, Saginaw Bay, Muskegon, Benton Harbor a spectacular tourist attraction all the way. Many of her original crew have dispersed and I hope that an experienced Great Lakes crew with a complement of Michigan Sea Scouts would be recruited to man her.

It's possible, but not probable, that plans could be worked out as she awaits formal transfer before the Seaway ices over. to Plymouth on Thanksgiving.

One of every ten veterans who apply for Veterans Administration benefits in Michigan have lost their discharge or separation papers, Lloyd H. Jameson, manager of the VA regional office in Detroit, estimated today.

Although a veteran may be able to obtain a certificate in lieu of lost discharge or a copy of his separation papers from his branch of service, this often takes considerable time, Mr. Jameson said.

"Veterans can save themselves both time and trouble by taking proper care of their discharge Jameson added.

The best way to assure the safety of your separation papers, Mr. Jameson pointed out, is to:

1. Have photostats made, including one in wallet-size that can be carried around with you. 2. Have them recorded at your county courthouse and returned to you; then you'll always be

3. Keep the original papers in a safe deposit box at a bank or 4. Make sure your family

knows where the papers are kept so that in case of emergency they'll be able to find them without delay.

There is no question that Michigan presently will have a revision of health insurance coverage to give greater protection of the average family's medical costs on a prepaid basis.

Just what form the extended benetits will take and how much they will cost will be influenced by what the public wants as expressed through the Michigan State Medical Society statewide study of medical-surgical coverage.

Hazen L. Miller, M. D., president of the Oakland County Medical Society, said today that the survey questionnaires must be returned to the Michigan Health Council by July 31 in order to be considered.

The mail survey is being sent to a cross-section of the state's population and 60,000 people are being given an opportunity to express their views.

Dr. Miller said that the monumental task of tabulating the survey answers must begin on August first in order for the otal analysis to be completed for presentation to the Michigan State Medical Society House of Delegates and the public on

September 23.

"The doctors of medicine of Michigan feel that the people should be consulted regarding any extension of benefits in existing medical protection plans. They should be able to say what they want and how much they are willing to budget for the extra-cost items", the president of the local medical scoiety said, "The public and the doctors

BOMBS BLAMELESS IN BAD WEATHER, SCIENTIST SAYS

Nuclear bomb explosions are not responsible for recent bad weather, and fallout from tests at the present rate is not a serious danger, a noted nuclear scientist has reported at Michigan State University.

Scientists "are not even in the same ballpark" when it comes to matching nature in energy production, said Dr. Ralph T. Overman, chairman of the special training division of the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies.

Hurricanes in one second use up energy equal to five hydrogen bombs; and the only weather effect from a bomb test is strictly "local", or confined to the general test area, he stated.

Dr. Overman said atomic tests could continue at the present increased hazard would be "insignificant".

The average person, the scientist explained, has been exposed to about four roentgens of natural radiation by the time he is 30 years old and receives about three additional roentgens from such things as dental and medical x-rays.

Additional radiation from all bombs exploded so far amounts to only one-tenth of a roentgen, according to Dr. Overman. Continued bomb testing at the present rate would increase radiation from fallout to four times the present level by 1986 and to six times the present amount by the year 2011. "But the increased hazard still would be negligible", he declared.
