With August 23 set as the deadline for entries, a score or Michigan Queens already have applied for entry blanks in search of the title "Miss Michigan State Fair of 1957".

As in past years, to qualify for the contest, the candidate must have won a sponsored Beauty Contest in Michigan since the last State Fair. She must be at least 17 years old, not over 25 years of age, and single.

Miss Michigan State Fair of 1957 thus actually will be the Queen of all Michigan Beauty Queens. She will be chosen by well-known judges and crowned by Governor Williams on Wednesday, September 4. The State Fair dates this year are August 30 through September 8.






