**THICKEN YOUR LAWN TURF IN AUGUST**

The best time to sow grass seed to thicken your turf is Aug. 15 to Sept. 1, in the southern half of the lower peninsula, according to James Tyson, turf specialist at Michigan State University, Aug. 10 to Aug. 25 is the best time in the northern part of the lower peninsula and the upper peninsula.

Rake the lawn vigorously with a steel garden rake before putting the seed on to remove the dead grass and to scar the surface of the soil.

Use about one-fourth the amount of seed used for a full seeding and after it is applied, sprinkle thoroughly to settle the soil around the seed.

Early spring reseeding are generally successful, too, Tyson says.

### STATE FAIR TAKING ENTRIES FOR CHILDREN'S DAY

Now is the time for all children to enter the contests to be held on Children's Day, Tuesday, Sept. 3, at the State Fair.

This was announced by Donald L. Swanson, general manager, who said that because of the big success of the 1956 program the various contests this year will be held in front of the grandstand for the comfort of the spectators. The program, free of charge, will begin at 10:30 A. M., and will be completed in time for the regular afternoon grandstand entertainment.

The children's contests are for two age groups—6 to 9 and 10 to 14. There'll be cash prizes of \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2, and \$1 in addition to trophies for the first five places of each contest.

Balloon bursting for both age groups will be new this year as will be a pogo stick race for the 10 to 14 groups.

The pie eating contest, favorite with the crowd, will continue with the blueberry variety scheduled for this year's event.

pony tail contest but the rules have been changed slightly. Last year it was the cutest and longest that was adjudged winner. But this year, audience applause will decide the cutest pony tail irrespective of length. In 1950, angry mothers all had their ideas about how to measure the length of a pony tail so this factor has been ruled out.

Also abolished this year was the entire freckled-face contest because of the difficulty choosing between children who are covered with freckles.

### NEWS OF INTEREST TO JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES

A delegation of 150 Jehovah's witnesses from Drayton Plains congregation is planning to attend their regular semi-annual area assembly at Royal Oak Aug. 30 through Sept. 1, it was announced today by Mr. W. P. Strong, spokesman for the local group.

"Some 1400 from 19 area congregations," Mr. Strong said, "will assemble as guests of the Royal Oak congregation to receive instruction and counsel on Bible teachings, right living and preaching the Kingdom Good News."

"We call it a 'Circuit Assem-

bly," Mr. Strong explained, "it is typical of such gatherings in 160 countries around the globe among 16,000 congregations totaling more than 700,000 Jehovah's witnesses."

Many newly entering the work of Jehovah's witnesses will be baptized.

The principal speakers will be from Brooklyn, N. Y., headquarters of Jehovah's witnesses.

Ten American missionaries were deported to Puerto Rico from the Dominican Republic August 3, W. P. Strong, presiding minister of the Pontiac congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, announced yesterday. Fare was paid by the Dominican government and the missionaries were escorted under arrest to the plane.

Action came on the heels of "a wave of persecution equaled only in Communist countries" climaxed by a total ban proscribing the work of Bible education conducted by the Witnesses in the Dominican Republic since 1945.

An ultimatum to the Christian missionaries to renounce all association with the organization and cease communication with their Brooklyn, N. Y., office or leave the country was made last month by Major General Arturo Espallat, Minister of Security, whom the U. S. government has sought to question in the disappearance of Dr. Jesus de Galindez. Some of the missionaries have been in the country for 11 years.

According to official news sources of the Dominican Republic, proscription of the Christian activity of Jehovah's Witnesses was legalized by Pres-

ident Hector Trujillo on July 25 and the law carries penalties of from one to three months imprisonment with fines of from thirty to one hundred dollars. It was announced that over \$1 million had been appropriated by the Dominican government to enforce the ban.

Mr. Strong said a full-scale campaign to restrict the religious freedom of the Witnesses has been underway since July 1. Kingdom Hall meeting places had been ordered closed and about 250 of Jehovah's Witnesses were brought in for questioning. The Witnesses have been subjected to beatings and violence by police and prison guards in an effort to make them renounce all association with the movement, Mr. Strong stated. About 50 are now in prison, some with sentences of two years.

### BUSH LAKE BEACH HAS BEEN FENCED

Holly Township's Bush Lake beach has been fenced and admittance restricted to residents of Holly area school district and their guests, members of the beach commission have announced.

A guard is posted from 9:00 A. M. to 8:00 P. M. daily, at the entrance in the six-foot fence, to enforce the restricted admittance rule.

Members of the beach comm-

ission have expressed their official "regret" at the action, but noted that crowded conditions at the beach made the \$1300 fence a "necessity".

### POISON CONTROL CENTER HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED

In an effort to reduce the illness and often times death associated with acute poisonings, St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Pontiac, announces the establishment of a Poison Control Center for the dissemination of information to all physicians as well as the public in Oakland County and adjacent vicinity.

This Poison Control Center is being set up on a 24-hour basis and will be housed in the Emergency Room of the hospital. Dr. Robert J. Mason will conduct the Center. The Center will contain information on some ten thousand commercial products and drugs as to whether or not the ingredients are poisonous or innocuous. External as well as internal toxic substances will be on file. A special treatment file will accompany this information file listing the latest accepted treatment for these various

harmful products. Any person who has come in contact with a poisonous substance should call their Doctor first, but may also call the hospital to ascertain whether or not the ingested substance is of a poisonous nature. The Center may be reached by calling the hospital at FE 4-3511 and a King for the Poison Center.

This is the first Poison Control Center established in Oakland County. There is one also in Detroit, Lansing and Grand Rapids. There are some twenty-three other Centers located throughout the United States.

Deaths from poisoning have become a major factor in both infants and adults of recent years throughout the nation, and it is now estimated that fifteen thousand persons die from acute accidental poisoning each year in this country.

A commemorative postage stamp might well be issued to honor Michigan's new Mackinac

Bridge, Lieutenant Governor Philip A. Hart has urged Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield. Hart has written Summerfield that "When the eighty million

dollar Mackinac Bridge is opened this fall, the hopes and dreams of nearly seventy-five years will be realized. This longest suspension bridge in the world will be an impressive tribute to the American engineering profession, to the construction industry and

to the foresight and perseverance of the Bridge's many advocates. The Bridge will constitute an important link in our country's developing highway system."

The Lieutenant Governor explained that he was writing to "respectfully urge that every consideration be given the possibility of issuing a commemorative postage stamp honoring the opening of the Mackinac Bridge. The significance of the event would seem to clearly merit such a step."


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**PROCEEDINGS OF INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP BOARD MEETING AUGUST 13, 1957**
