## Methodist Church Plans Crusade

First Methodist Church, Clarkston, began preparations for its \$115,000 Building Fund Crusade with prayer at the Morning Worship Services last Sunday. Led by its pastors, Rev. William J. Richards and James C. Braid, the congregation prayed for strength and guidance with the service centered around the text from Zechariah, "Not by might, nor by strength, but by my spirit saith the Lord of hosts."

Under the leadership of Percy Lowry and John King with the guidance of James Braid, Associate Pastor, a Cultivation Committee of twenty-five captains has been organized. Attending the meeting held last week were: Fred Gettel, Dianne Chapman, Ronald Weber, Clinton George, Merle Bennett, Sam Bennett, Pete Rose, Lee Volberding, Jackson Byers, Charles Robinson, William Johnston, Richard Bullen, Leo Erickson, Harold Dobler, Dr. and Mrs. Heinrich Kobrak, and Charles Broadway, together with the pastors, Rev. Braid, who presided, and Rev. Richards.

The captains will be busy throughout the next two weeks recruiting visitors to make the calls during the Crusade Visitation Sunday, Sept. 15 through Wednesday, Sept. 18. They will obtain the services of over 200 callers. Each member of the congregation is being urged to participate, and give their devoted loyalty to the home visits which are to be made. Philip Smith and David Stewart have pointed out that in order to meet the goal of \$115,000, the interest and devotion of all members of the church must be sacrificially given. They are chairmen of the Crusade.

Last Sunday, Stanley White, Superintendent of the Church School, indicated to the congregation the urgent need for more Sunday School space, and Jackson Byers, chairman elect of the Official Board outlined the need of everyone's prayers and service.

An Advance Gifts Committee is being set up consisting of outstanding community leaders who will meet and set the objectives of the Crusade. Some thirty leaders of the community are being selected. Psalm 27:4 is being used by the Promotion Committee to begin arousing interest and guidance for the Crusade: "One thing have I desired of the Lord, that I will seek after; that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord, and inquire in his temple."

David Stewart and Philip Smith, chairmen of the Building Crusade of First Methodist Church, announce that the Director, The Rev. Mr. Grant Dunlap, will arrive in Clarkston on Thursday, September 5th, when the whole congregation is invited to a dinner at 6:30 P. M. Mr. Dunlap will speak briefly.

The Building Committee of First Methodist Church has thus far received 4 bids from general contractors in preparation to begin the building of the parsonage. It is hoped that construction will begin in September. The bids will be considered at a meeting on Thursday evening, August 22nd.

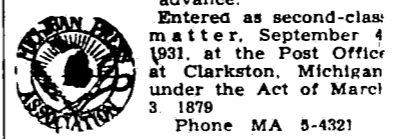

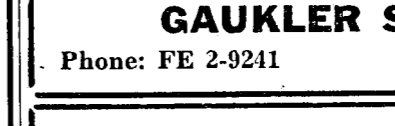

x-ray, General Manager Donald  
L. Swanson announces.

Every person 15 years or older,  
is urged to have the chest x-ray  
examination. There will be no  
charge to any visitor at the State  
Fair regardless of residence.

Dr. Joseph G. Molner, Detroit  
health commissioner, reports that  
out of the 16,051 persons exam-  
ined during the ten days of last  
year's State Fair, 439 were re-  
ferred to their physicians for  
some health reason brought to  
light by the chest x-ray. There  
were 76 inactive cases of tuber-  
culosis and seven active cases  
discovered at the State Fair last  
year, Dr. Molner said. He said  
there also were 26 cases of heart  
conditions and four cases of lung  
tumor found by the x-ray exam-  
ination.

"Even though you had a chest  
x-ray last year, get one again  
this year", Dr. Molner advises.

To have an x-ray requires  
only a minute and no undressing  
is necessary. All findings are  
confidential and no one except  
the person x-rayed and his doc-  
tor will be notified should there  
be positive findings. No report  
at all is given on a healthy  
chest.

The x-ray films are examined  
by Herman Kiefer Hospital phys-  
icians. The x-ray is taken at the  
State Fair in one of the mobile  
units operated by the Department  
of Health.
