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



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

#### JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

Jehovah's Witnesses of 'the three Pontiac congregations met Thursday night, September 26, to approve a petition asking the Dominican Republic to lift its ban of last July 25 restricting the religious activity of the movement there.

According to Mr. W. P. Strong, presiding minister of the Drayton Plains Congregation, the lengthy petition cited specific names and places of police brutality that were personally authenticated by eight of the ten American missionaries deported August 3 from the Dominican Republic. The missionaries related their experiences at a regional assembly in Baltimore. where the petition was originally adopted August 24 by 33,091 of Jehovah's Witnesses in attend-

The petition was addressed to Generalissimo Trujillo, acknowledged dictator of the Caribbean


Reporting on the atrocities described in the petition, Mr. Strong said, "In one sector whole families were taken to prison and the male members of the families were beaten senseless before their own wives and children. Other male Witnesses were kicked and hit with rifle butts until they were bleeding and fell exhausted. Some were beaten and left unconscious on the ground in the patio of the prison with blood running out of their ears, nose and mouth.

"Christian people all over the world abhor such brutality as this", Mr. Strong said. "We believe freedom-loving people should be informed of it and have published the entire statement of facts with the petition in the October 1 issue of our official magazine, THE WATCH-TOWER, which is published in 46 languages. At our meeting Thursday night we determined to try to reach every home in the Pontiac area with this ac-
