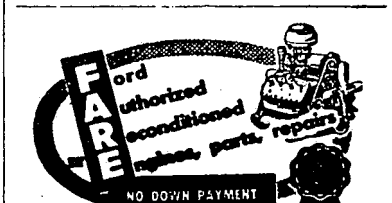
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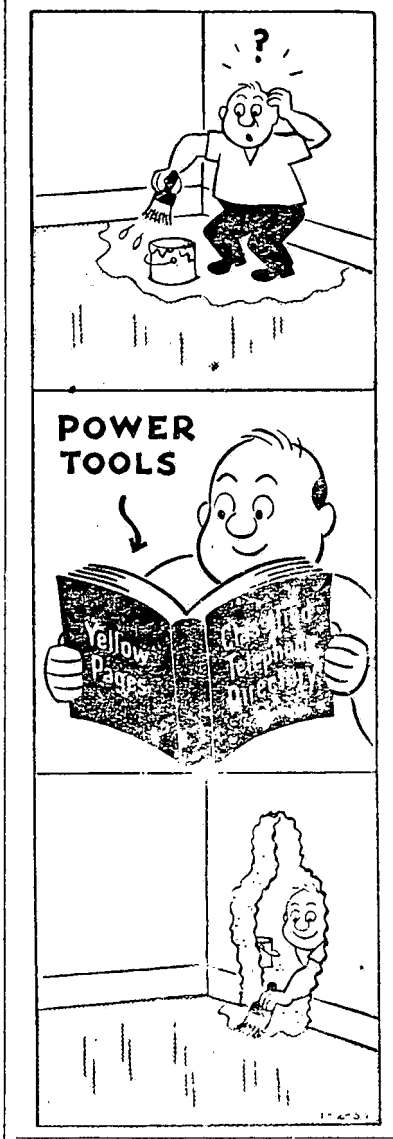

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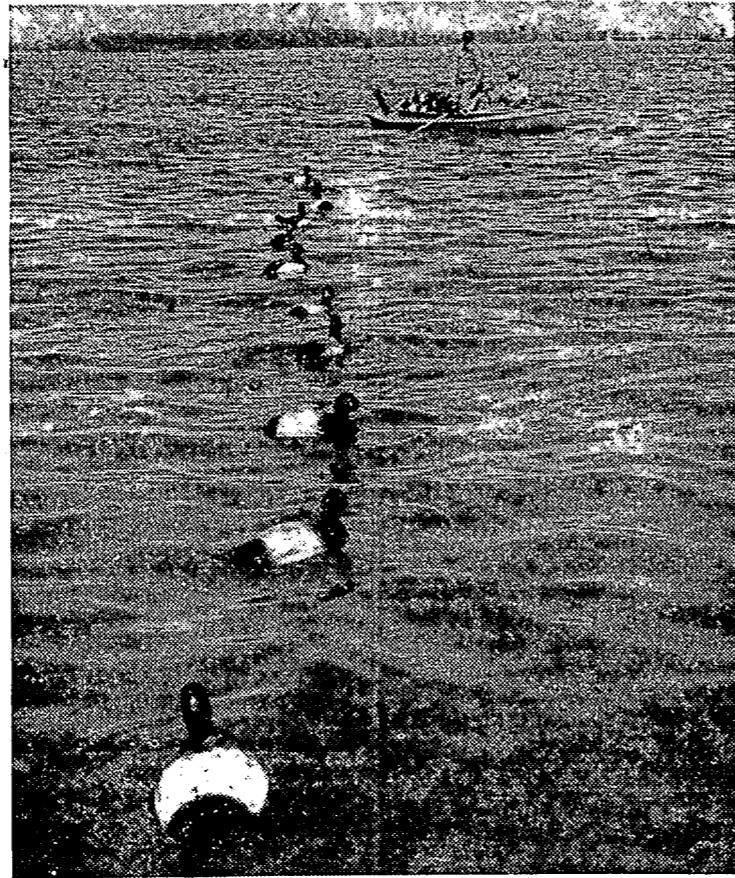

ADDING TO STUDENT SHARE OF COSTS IS OPPOSED BY HATCHER

Attempts to shift more of the cost of higher education to the student ignore the fact that democratic dependent upon education, University of Michigan President Harlan Hatcher believes.

The idea, prevalent in some circles, that college training has economic value to the individual, who therefore should assume the cost of his education, overlooks the benefits which society as a whole receives from higher education, he asserts.

"Such an idea can be extended to support the view that a person shouldn't go to college unless he wants to increase his earning power", he points out. "As a result, the feeling that the student should pay more and more of the cost of higher education is tending to grow."

Current economic conditions coupled with an increase in semester fees has tended to reduce anticipated enrollments precisely at a time when there is critical need for more trained scientists and teachers, Harlan declares.

"The critics of higher education had better take another look and see what could happen to this nation if their idea of constantly increasing the students' share of the cost is extended beyond the present levels", he warns.

Elk are protected on a year-round basis in Michigan and this is the first ever reported shot by an archer.

Officers had not yet apprehended the person responsible, but were working on the case.

An adult elk is about twice the size of a deer and even the novice deer hunter should have no difficulty in recognizing the stately animal.

Michigan's elk herd, which numbers about 600 animals, is concentrated in a few northern

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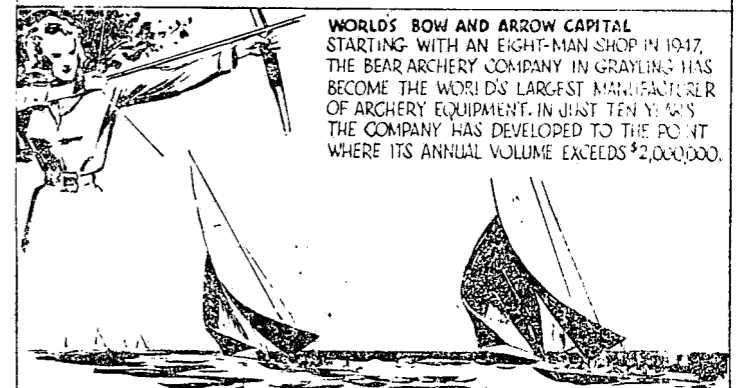
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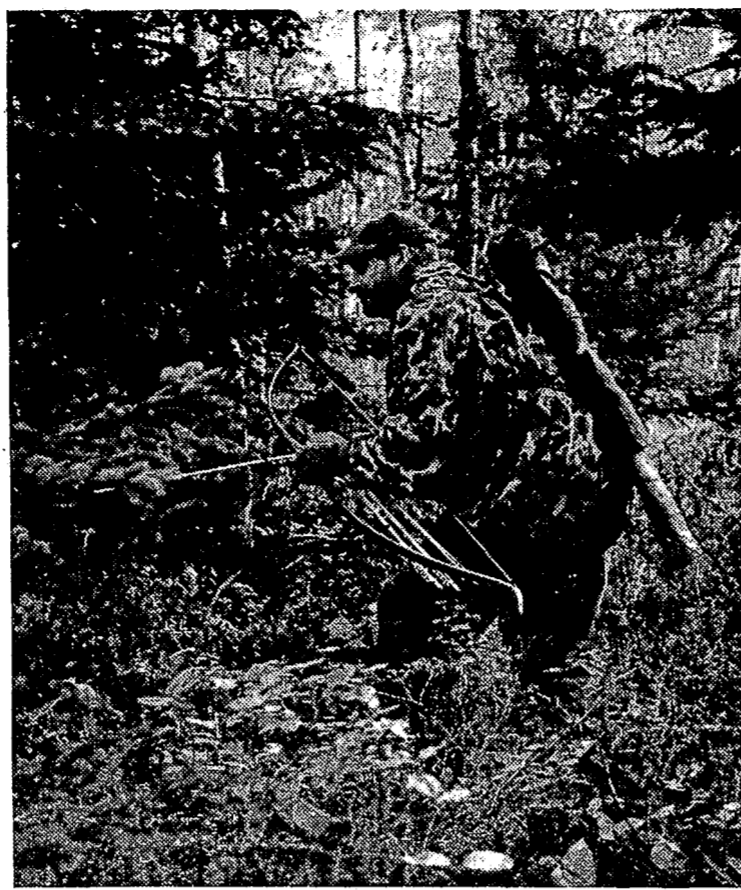
MSU BAND TELLS PLANS FOR GAME HOSTING PURDUE

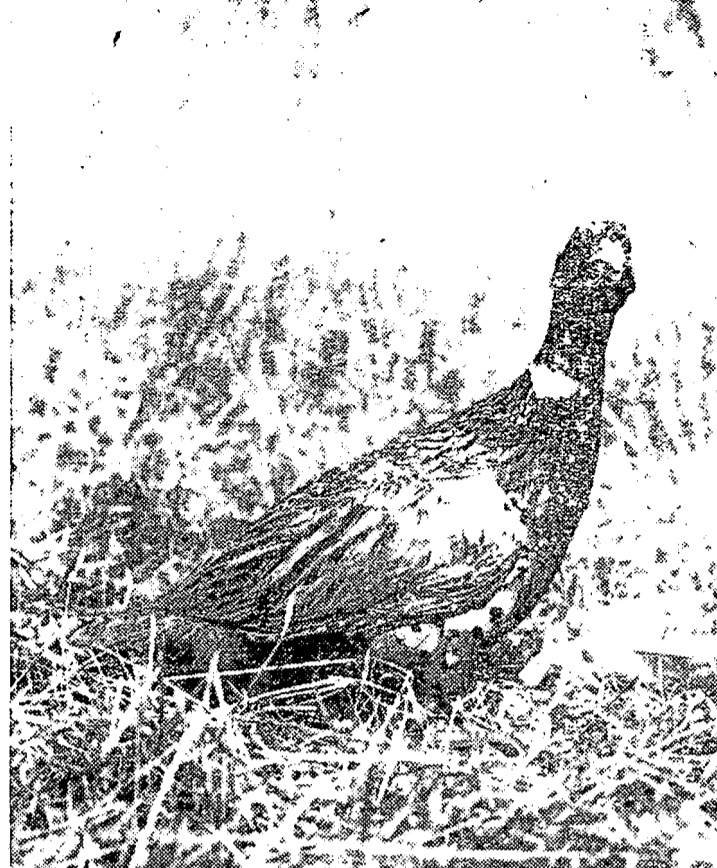

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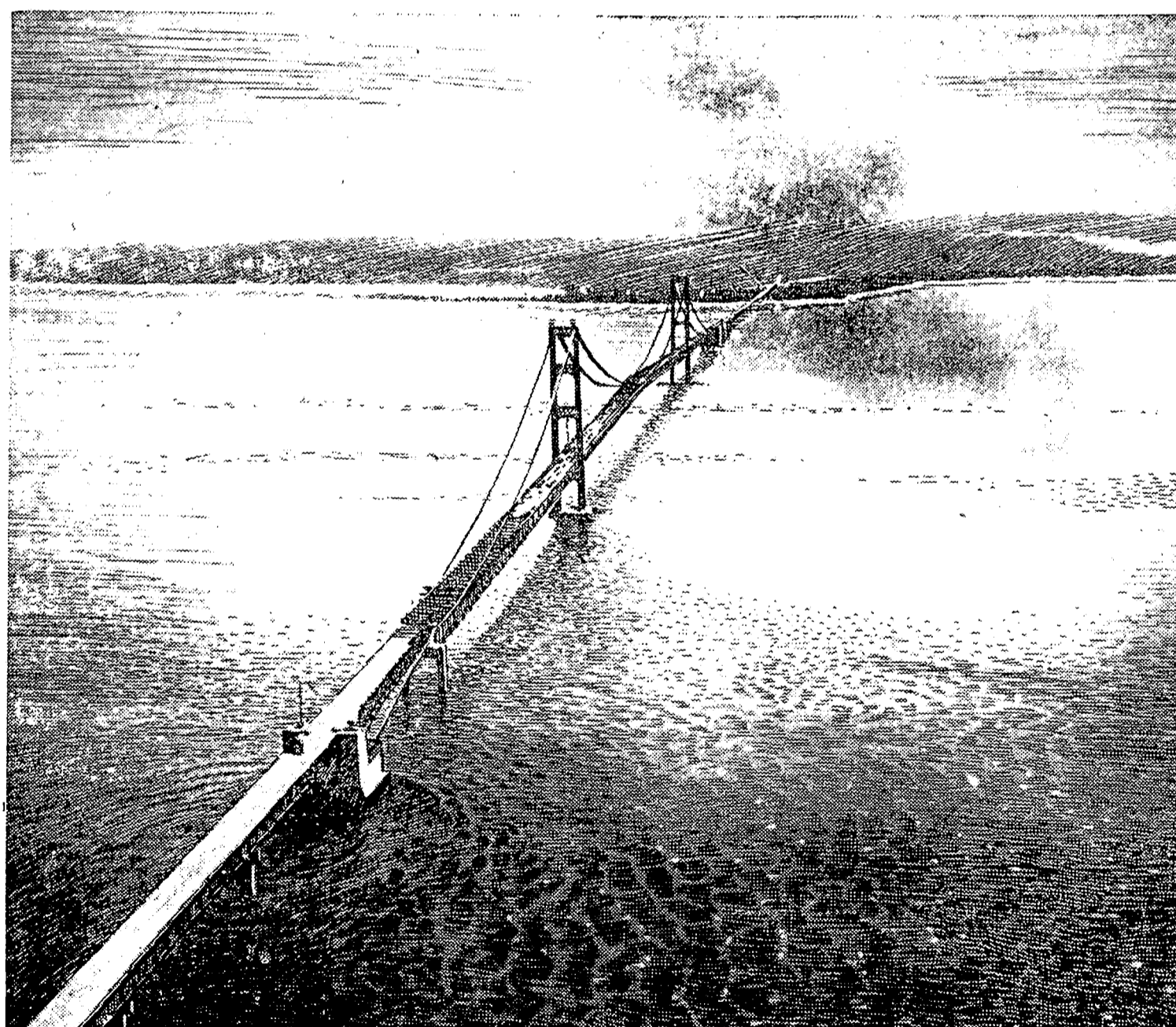
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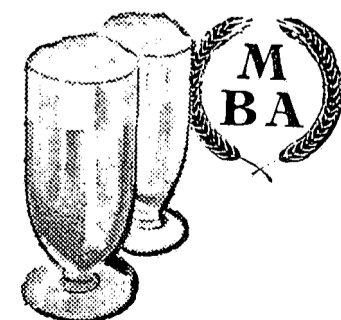

EXCELSIOR: cheap and available and provides reasonable protection but should not be used near house because of fire hazard.
PEAT MOSS: is attractive and makes an excellent mulch if you are careful not to let it dry out. It should be incorporated into the soil as it has a tendency to form a waterproof cover, thus during dry weather sheds the available moisture. It is excellent for acid soil plants and where bulbs have been planted.
PINE NEEDLES: natural mulch for base of pine trees but too acid for general or garden purposes.
SAWDUST or SHAVINGS: because they are made of cellulose which favors mold and other fungi they are not recommended. However, if thoroughly rotted and composted they will be alright especially for small fruits.
MANURE: thoroughly rotted cow and horse manure is excellent for mulching. And it also serves the dual purpose of providing plant food, but the material has become so scarce and expensive that its use is largely prohibitive.
CORN STALKS: provide a well aerated mulch laid criss-cross with tops and butts alternating. Be sure you do not obtain them from a field infested

with borers.
For roses the time honored practice of mounding dirt up to 6 or 8 inches is necessary in this locality, but it is doubtful that leaves, hay or other material should be piled on top.
Mulches for winter should not of course, be laid on the beds before the ground is frozen as rodents will greatly damage plant material while being themselves protected from the weather.
