WINTER MULCH

The purpose of winter mulch is not to keep our plants warm but to prevent alternate freezing A lot of our chaperones couldn't and thawing which are likely to come, and a lot others filled in heave them and expose or dam-

A heavy covering of the wrong material may easily smother the plants and kill them. On the other hand a light covering which simply protects from the drying effect of sun and wind, prevents violent fluctuations of temperature and preserves the moisture Clarkston Locals content of the soil, maybe the deciding factor between life and death.

Materials to be considered which are available here are: LEAVES: easy to obtain and cheap. If from hardwood trees, Sunday with the Donald Wright can be satisfactory, but softwood family of Ellis Road. trees, particularly maples, are to be avoided because they soak up water and freeze into a mat, shutting out air. If the leaves can be shredded they will not mat down and will enrich the soil more quickly. STRAW: usually wheat straw is cheap, clean and contains no weed seeds; is easy to lay down and looks well, but results in an overgrowth of wheat plants in the Spring. Its greatest value is for vegetable gardens and strawberry beds.

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



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

ADDING TO STUDENT SHARE OF COSTS IS OPPOSED BY HATCHER


Attempts to shift more and more of the cost of higher education to the student ignore the fact that democrace is dependent upon education, University of Michigan President Harlan Hatcher believes.

The idea, prevalent in some circles, that college training has econmic value to the mainidual, who therefore should assume the cost of his education, overlooks the benefits which society as a whole receives from higher education, he asserts,

"Such an idea can be extended to support the view that a person shouldn't go to college unless he wants to increase his earning power", he point: out. "As a result, the feeling that the student should pay more and more of the cost of higher education is tending to grow.

Current economic conditions coupled with an increase in semester fees has tended to reduce anticipated enrollments precisely at a time when there is critical need for more trained scientists and teachers, Harlan declares.

"The critics of higher education had better take another look and see what could happen to this nation if their idea of constantly increasing the students' share of the cost is extended beyond the present levels", he warns.
