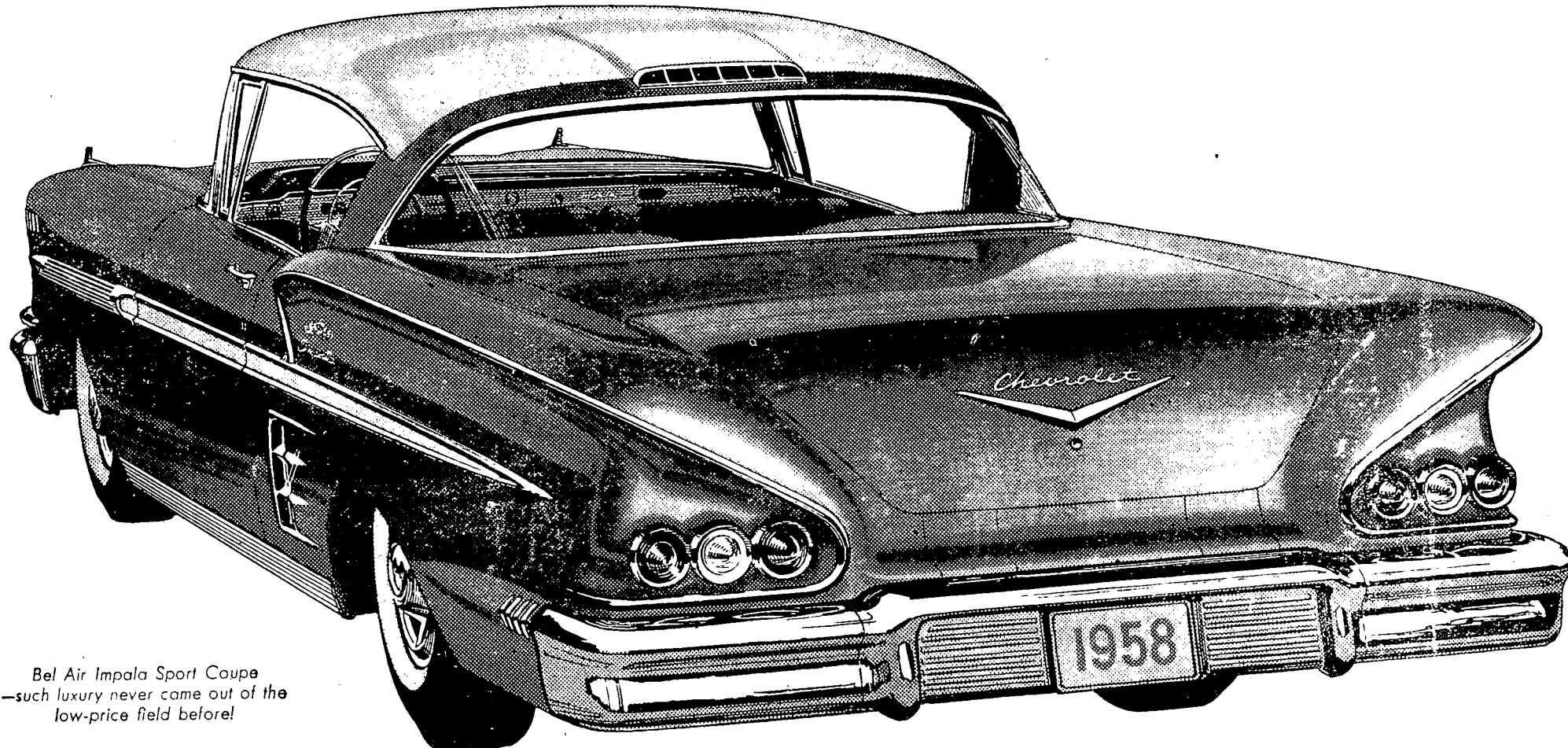

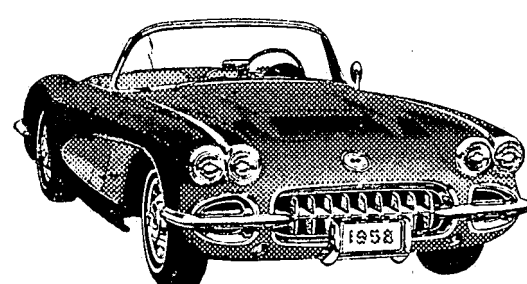

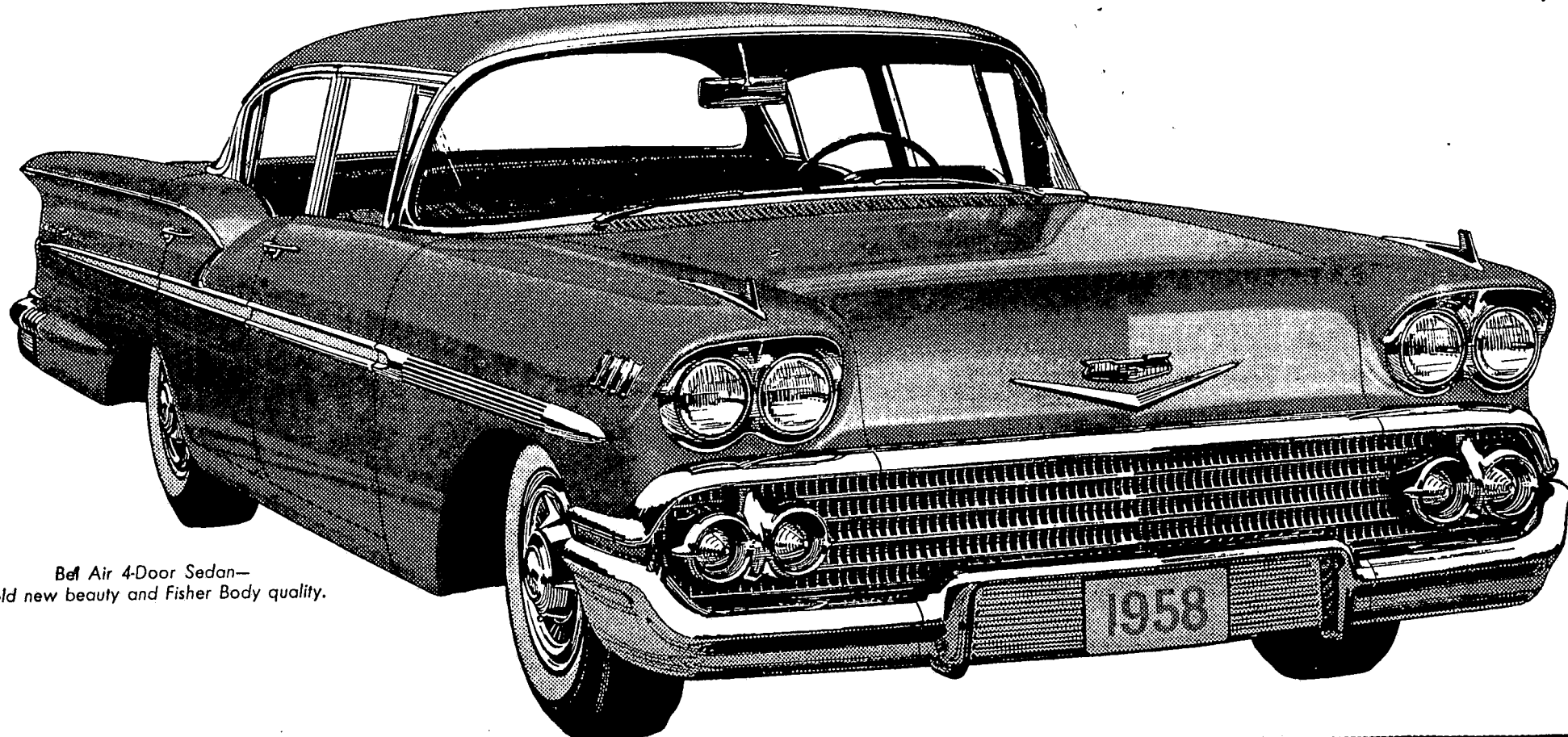

A GOOD TIME TO GET POLIO SHOTS

Although most public health interest is now centered in Asian flu, the state health department reminded Michigan residents today that polio shots should be started now to afford maximum protection next spring and summer.

The three-shot polio immunization series requires seven months to complete for maximum protection. If the first shot is taken on November 1, the second one can follow on December 1 and the third on June 1.

Polio shots can be received at the same time a person is vaccinated against Asian flu, stated Dr. Albert E. Heustis, state health commissioner. "The two vaccines do not conflict in any way when one is given in one arm and the other in the other arm."

Dr. Heustis credited polio vaccine with reducing paralytic polio in Michigan so far this year to less than a third of last year's level. Through September of

1856 there were 251 paralytic polio cases in the state and during the same period the year before there were 15 cases. "With plenty of polio vaccines on hand," Dr. Heustis concluded, "everyone in Michigan should take advantage of the opportunity to protect himself against paralytic polio. The protection will be needed most next summer and the greatest protection will be developed if the series of three shots is started now."
