She is one of the 460 Goodwill Industries' employees who are in an emergency situation with a shortage of winter clothing, especially men's clothing. It is an ironical position for Goodwill Industries, because indications show that it will be the best year since its founding in 1921, with a total payroll topping the million dollar mark for the first time.

The situation arises because Goodwill Industries is self-supporting as far as operations go. It is also a non-profit corporation.

For these reasons, when the flow of any particular type of materials slows down, the continued full time employment of the handicapped workers is in danger.

Having expanded in the past year to afford more and better jobs to handicapped persons, Goodwill Industries must accordingly have more material in the form of usable discards from householders.

There is no backlog of material at present in the Goodwill plant to draw from, and so the employment of its employees depends on the day-to-day pickups.

There is only one toll gate at the Mackinac Straits bridge, linking Michigan's two peninsulas. It is at the St. Ignace side of the span.

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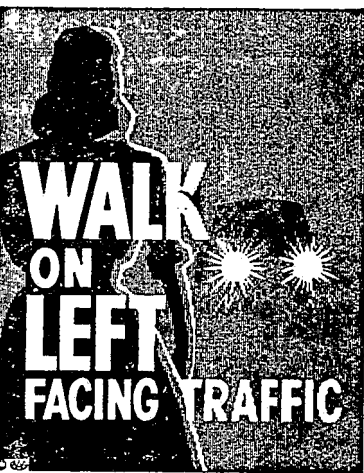
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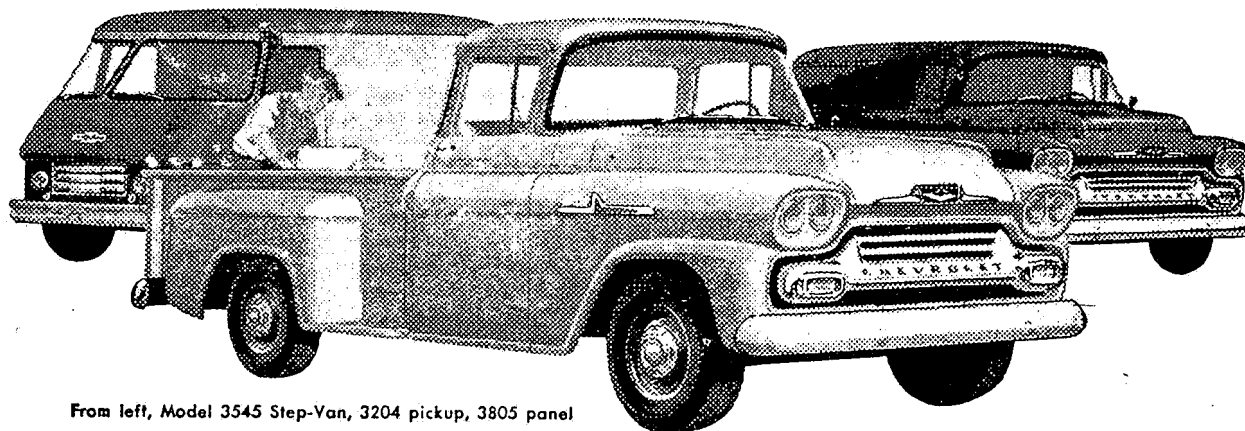
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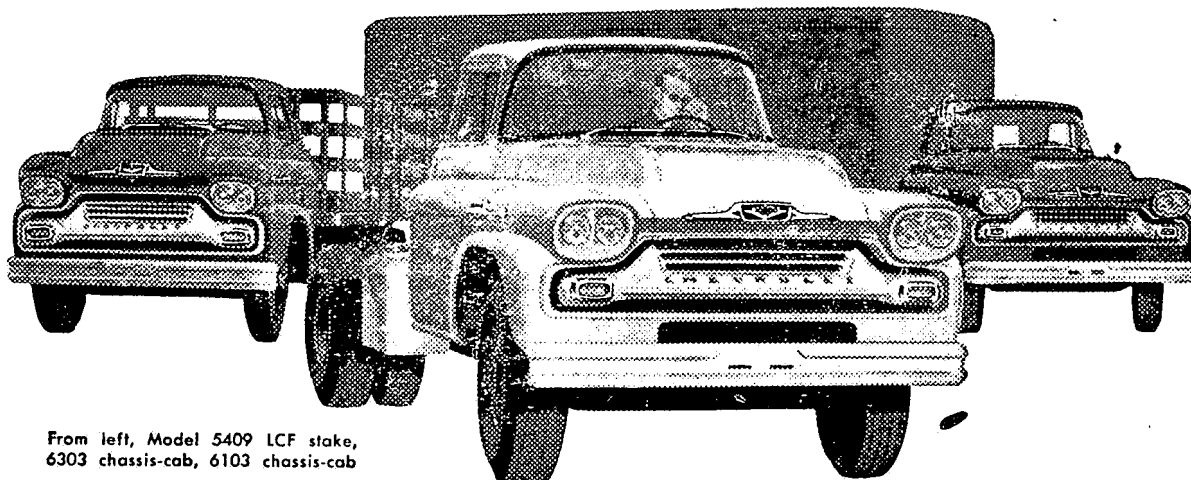
